## GENERAL NEWS.

**A Paymaster Murdered and Robbed of \$30,000.**

**NEWS ITEMS FROM WASHINGTON.**

**A Fast Express Train Wrecked and Many People Killed—News from East of the R. R.**

WILKESBARRE, (Pa.), Oct. 19.—To-day was payday with the employees of James McFadden, who is building a railroad for the Lehigh Valley Co. He employs 400 laborers. This morning Alexander McCur, paymaster, accompanied by a young Irishman, left Pittsburg with \$30,000 to go to the works to pay off the men. On the way to the works they had to pass through a lonely strip of woods, and without warning both were shot from an ambush and killed. Three Italians are suspected of the murder. The entire \$30,000 was taken. There is great excitement and a posse of 150 men are looking for the murderers.

**ANOTHER RAILWAY HORROR.**

**A Cannon Ball Express Train Wrecked with Fatal Results.**  
PITTSBURG, Oct. 19.—It is reported that the Cincinnati express, on the Baltimore and Ohio road, was wrecked near Washington, Penn., this morning. Three persons are reported killed and a large number injured. Another dispatch says that a cannon ball express on the Baltimore and Ohio, which left Cincinnati last night, ran into an open switch near Washington, Penn., this morning. The train was precipitated over a trestle, a distance of ten feet. The train was running at a high rate of speed, and was almost a complete wreck. Two persons were instantly killed and about twenty injured. A number of them will die.

**EMPEROR WILLIAM.**

**News About His Visit in Italy—Grand Military Manuevers.**  
ROME, Oct. 19.—Emperor William visited the parade grounds this morning and witnessed the manuevers of the battalions of bersaglieri at Boquet, given last night in honor of the emperor. General Pelloux, commander of the Alpine division of the Italian army, made a speech in which he said the watchword of that division was "No passage this way." He expressed a hope that the frontier would not be attacked, but said if it should be, the Italian troops would defend it unflinchingly.

**WASHINGTON NEWS.**

**The Deficiency Bill Passed—National News Items.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The president approved the general deficiency bill this afternoon.

Col. Rufus Saxton, assistant quartermaster-general, was placed on the retired list to-day.

The president to-day approved the act authorizing the secretary to appoint Alfred Pleasanton major in the army and placing him on the retired list.

**A MAYOR LIBELLED.**

**The Colonist, of Victoria, sued by the Mayor.**

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 18.—Mayor Grant has instituted criminal proceedings against the proprietors of "Colonist," Messrs. W. H. Ellis and A. G. Sargison, for publishing a letter which asked some rather pointed questions on the defalcations of the abandoned City Treasurer. It is understood that the city auditors have discovered that the absconding Treasurer abstracted over \$200,000 this year from the city funds. He took this amount since the audit was instituted. When he left, some friends contributed a small fund for him. Russell had squandered all his stealings on whiskey, wine and women.

**A Costly Moulting.**

It will be a satisfaction to all peace and order loving people to read from the Portland News the following item, suggestive of the time when dogs cannot bite with impunity. On the 13th day of last August Edward Dunn was bitten by a dog by a dog belonging to William Pfunder, the well-known doggist. On September 19th Dunn began an action against Pfunder for \$100 damages and costs and disbursements. Yesterday morning the case came up for trial before a jury in department No. 1, state circuit court. Dunn testified that on the morning of the 15th of August he went to get Dr. Wheeler, whose office is over Pfunder's store to attend to his sick wife; that while on the stairs he was met by Pfunder's Siberian bloodhound, and was severely bitten by the animal. Other witnesses corroborated his testimony.

For the defense a number of people swore to the docility of the dog. Shortly before noon the case went to the jury, which returned a verdict of \$400 and costs against the defendant.

## A BOLD BREAK.

**Twenty-One Persons Escape from Jail at Spokane.**

**THEY OVERPOWER THE JAILER**

**And Walk Out Without Any Bloodshed—Efforts to Capture Them Fruitless.**

SPOKANE, FALLS, (W. T.), Oct. 19.—Twenty-one prisoners escaped from the county jail before daylight this morning. They overpowered, bound and gagged Jailer A. M. Rowe, whose cries were afterwards heard. They took the keys to the outside door and escaped, locking the jailer inside. The prisoners broke out of the cage by breaking an iron bar. None have yet been captured, but every effort is being made. Seven of the prisoners were in cuffs, which were not broken, and a like number who could have escaped decided not to go. The jail was in a crowded condition. Among those who escaped were George Miller, the murderer of Hall and Johnson, who robbed Ex-Gov. Connor's house.

**OUR DEFENSES.**

**Opinions of Secretary Whitney Concerning Our Navy.**

NEW YORK, October 19.—The Washington correspondent of the Sun reports an interview with Secretary Whitney regarding the competency of the American navy, with interesting statements regarding Canada's military strength, the probable result of an armed conflict between England and the United States over the fishery, and the Secretary said England would not go to war on the subject. She has already once actually conceded the correctness of our point of view, and he further said the final result of any war would be the annexation of Canada to the United States.

British naval supremacy and the geographical characteristics of the coasts of Great Britain preclude any idea of invasion and conquest by the United States. The transatlantic transportation of military forces would be limited to British reinforcements of the garrisons in her American colonies.

Hostile operations on the offensive would be carried on by the navy exclusively, and she would be confined to attempts to occupy harbors and ports which might be compelled to pay contribution and to a blockade of the coasts. Attempts to capture the United States seaports or to blockade her coast, cannot be successful except to a limited extent on the first outbreak of hostilities.

Concerning a naval conflict, Great Britain could make no conquest of territory by her navy. She could land no forces. Her navy would be to get into our harbors and destroy property. But two can play at that game, and our coast cruisers would go after her coasters. That is what the conflict would resolve itself into on our side.

In response to the query, "Your opinion, however, is that if we should get into a war with England we could make a good show for ourselves?" the Secretary said:

"With the vessels in course of construction finished, we certainly could. It is humiliating that we have no fighting ships but they will come in good time. We have a highly trained body of officers and men in our naval service and we are organized perfectly. We know from day to day where every one of our ships is and we have complete data as to their movements.

"Most of the cities are reached by narrow channels easily defended by torpedoes or mines, and shelling a city from a distance of six or eight miles is theoretically possible, but practically it is ineffective. Comparatively few American ports can be entered by the largest of British armed vessels and most of those have difficult channels capable of defense. San Francisco, Puget sound, Portland, Me., are, however, capable of perfect torpedo defense. Long island sound and the Chesapeake would have to be defended by naval forces."

It is reported that the Brooklyn Navy Yard that the machinery of the new war vessels, the Boston, which recently left for the West Indies, had broken down, and that the vessel was lying helpless at the Windward Islands. It also reported that the steamer Pensacola fitted out for the Southern squadron, had blown up her boilers on the Platte river in South America.
