NOTINGS ABOUT TOWN.

SERIOUS RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.

A Wagon Overturned on a Grade Near Lower So., With Serious Results.

The Lebanon Express learns from Silas Barr, who came from the McKinnon ranch, two miles above Lower Soda, that Mrs. McDowell and his sister, Mrs. James Cary, and her little boy, met with a severe accident on the grade three miles beyond McKinnon's Tuesday night. Mr. McDowell and his sister, with two or three of her children, had started to Harney valley in company with John Barr, and as Silas Barr was going to assist them to the top of Sand mountain. When they reached the above-named wagon overturned and the horses ran away and the parties were thrown from the wagon. Mrs. Cary was hurt very badly in the back, and her little boy's head was badly bruised, also one arm hurt. Mr. McDowell's face was badly disfigured; the flesh was torn from the lower edge of his forehead at the end of his nose across his forehead into his hair, making a circle over his left eye, and the flesh fell down over his eye. They sewed the flesh back as best they could, and Silas Barr hauled the unfortunate parties to Mr. McKinnon's and came back to the valley to report to their relatives near Crawfordsville and get medical aid. It is not known just how bad they are injured. Mr. McDowell seemed to be in his right mind while they were sewing up his wound, but when Mr. Barr left there he seemed to be becoming reconciled.

A Verdict Reached.

The jury in the case of Cobn & Bros., of Portland, vs. M. Peysor, in change of venue from Linn county, returned a verdict this morning in favor of the Northwest Fire and Marine Insurance Company. The suit is a rather complicated one and has excited much interest. Cobn & Bros. sued to recover \$1800, which they alleged was due them from Peysor December 27th, last, when his saloon in Albany was burned. Peysor had his saloon insured, they said for \$1500 and sought to recover this, but the insurance company held that the indebtedness was fictitious and that Peysor had himself been instrumental in having the saloon destroyed. After a tedious trial the jury returned a verdict in favor of the insurance company.—Salem Journal.

An Active Fight Begun.

The Southern Pacific Company has begun an active fight against the Northern Pacific and Oregon Short Line for the passenger business to the East. Up to the present time the Short Line has secured a very large percentage of the business, its rates being equal to those of the other routes. The Southern Pacific gets a very short haul on the business as it stands, carrying the passengers only to Portland. It is now proposed to turn the tide of east bound travel southward through California, and to accomplish this the Southern Pacific has placed coupon tickets to all eastern points at different points along the line of the Oregon & California line in Oregon, among them being Portland, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, Ashland and Medford.—News.

Dead Body Found.

A man's body was found floating in the Yamhill river, a half mile above McMinnville, Wednesday morning. The coroner summoned a jury and held an inquest when the remains were taken from the water. The deceased was unknown. He was about 30 years of age, and would weigh about 150 pounds; wore brown clothes; had a mustache, but no beard; was slightly baldheaded; five feet six inches high; moderately well dressed. It is supposed by some to be the body of James Cain, of Sheridan. It had been in the water about two weeks.

Violated the Fishing Laws.

James Williams, canneryman at Oysterville, has been fined \$50 and costs for leaving his fish trap open on Sundays. The case was tried before the justice of the peace at Elk City, and considerable interest was taken in the matter. The fish law is evaded every day, but the cases where punishment is inflicted for the offense at Yaquina are not frequent.

New Vessel.

The Newport News says: The steamer Favorite, Capt. John Beryna, arrived Monday evening from Siuslaw bay. The captain towed to sea the new schooner built this season at Siuslaw. The bar was very rough, but the staunch little boat made it all right. The Favorite goes into government service to-day, towing rock for the jetty.

History Repeats Itself.

Congressman Mills, of Indiana, having lost his voice, has canceled his engagements and engaged Col. John P. Irish, of California, to fill his appointments in that state. If Col. Irish is not careful his canvass may have the same result as it did in Oregon.

Paying Off.

Paymaster C. C. Hogue, of the Oregon Pacific, was in the city yesterday paying off the employees of that road. He will go out to the front and continue the paying off of the hands to-day.

A Painful Accident.

John Berry and son Charles while riding to town yesterday on the running gear of a wagon met with a painful accident. The coupling pole broke and precipitated them into the road. The wheels of the wagon passed over Mr. Berry's feet, severely bruising them. The young man was not injured.

IMMIGRANTS STILL FLOW IN.

There Would be More Were It not a Year for Electing a President.

Immigration still continues in a healthy state of activity. The immigrants now arriving, although not as many as at other seasons of the year, seem to be of a better class. Most of them have a little money and when they get here they have a little something with which to secure a home. At present the largest influx of immigrants comes from Kansas. However, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Dakota and Minnesota each send a good many. When they arrive here they buy tickets for all parts of the state; the majority of them, however, settle in the valley near Southern and coast counties. The fact that this year of presidential election has considerable to do with retarding what would otherwise be a heavy immigration. All good conscientious people are desirous of casting their choice for president in their native state, while some that are not so good and not so conscientious, are induced to remain for the sake of a few paltry dollars.—Oregonian.

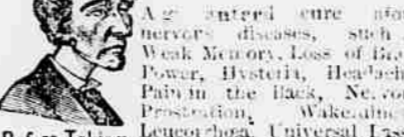
