CITY COUNCIL.

A Journed Meeting and Usual Routine of Business Transacted. The adjourned meeting of the city council convened last evening. Councilmen all present excepting Councilman Reed. In the absence of the mayor Councilman Gradwohl was elected to fill the place for the evening. The committee on accounts and current expenses reported sundry bills and asked for further time on officers' reports. The committee on health and police reported on the petition of A. Cunningham in relation to manure thrown out on adjoining property to him, finding it a nuisance and ordering it abated, which report was adopted. The committee on ordinances reported, recommending the adoption of an ordinance granting an exclusive right for gas works in the city to the San Francisco parties for 25 years, and also a like ordinance granting a like franchise to Mr. Allen for his electric light works. Committee on streets and public property reported recommending a new sidewalk on the east side of Lyon street between 2d and 3d streets, which report was adopted, and the work ordered built. Special committee on the Dr. E. A. McAllister damage case reported that they had engaged J. K. Weatherford and D. K. N. Blackburn to defend the case. The action of the committee was ratified. Same committee on petition of G. W. Smith for privilege of putting up a telephone asked further time. Marshal Hays reported in reference to property owners connecting with sewers. The committee on streets and public property was instructed to act in conjunction with the street commissioner and act upon the matter. The matter of railroad street sewer was brought up and the work accepted and ordered paid, and also the sewer at and across the street at the engine house. The street commissioner reported in reference to culvert on 7th and Jefferson streets, which was referred to the committee on streets and public property with power to act. The street commissioner was instructed by motion to see that the sidewalk shall be repaired immediately. The recorder reported that the insurance on No. 2's house had been procured reissued one year. The action was ratified. Application of the Chinaman who had started a wash house on 1st street for more time in which to move was not acted upon. Petition of J. Fox in regard to nuisance in block 8 was referred to the committee on streets and public property. The petition of N. A. Blodgett in regard to changing the flume supplying his mill from Broadblain street to Ferry street and thence by Water street to his mill was referred to the committee on streets and public property. On motion the Southern Pacific railroad was instructed to remove the rubbish on Railroad street within ten days. Contract was let to C. A. Creel for a sewer on Baker and Lyon streets at the rate of 75 cents per foot, to be completed in ten days. A committee of three were appointed with the mayor to look over the charter and recommend what amendments were necessary and report at the second meeting in November. J. N. Hoffman, F. F. Tabler and V. Parker, committee. The marshal was instructed to enforce the law as to the nuisances near the Baptist church and under the stairs leading to G. A. R. hall. BILLS ORDERED PAID. Daddy Nolan is as good a play as Edward Harrigan ever turned out. It is a genuine success, and has brought Mr. Sully into the front rank as an author and comedian. Petty Theft. Some petty theft stole a case of Cactus Bitters from Marx Baumgart's saloon last evening. Some drunken tramps were subsequently arrested by the police and incarcerated in the city jail. They are probably the offenders. One of these number was not caught, as he outran the policeman, who fired his revolver at him without effect.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Cases Disposed of Yesterday—Criminal Cases—The Oregon Pacific Suit. Nearly the entire time of the court was occupied yesterday in hearing the suit of the Oregon Pacific railroad against G. W. Hunt for damages, and it is still at issue. Geo. Maley and James Pitsford, who were indicted for selling liquor without license, were arraigned and gave until to-day to plead. Julius Graf was indicted for larceny in a dwelling. L. O. Schultz was indicted for selling liquor on Sunday. James W. Cross, who was indicted for larceny, plead guilty, and was sentenced to the penitentiary for one year. Charles Wilson, the alleged tramp journalist, was released from custody, not a true bill being returned by the grand jury, the charge being giving liquor to an Indian. CIVIL CASES. The floor beams of the suspension bridge at Oregon City are laid, and people can now cross the river on it. It only remains to lay the floor and build the approaches to complete the work. A number of the workmen, says the Oregonian, have been brought down here to lay the new track for the turn table at the Morrison street bridge. The iron is all here, and if the weather is propitious the work of laying the new track and putting in the new wheels will probably be begun to-day. The completion of this job will enable the draw to be opened and closed in less time than is required at present. Take Care of Them. STATE DISPATCHES.

Newspaper Items from the State Capital—U. S. Prisoner Pardoned. Special to the Herald. SALEM, Oct. 24.—Robert Maher, a U. S. prisoner, confined in the penitentiary, was to-day released. Superintendent Downing having received for him a presidential pardon. Maher was a private in Co. I, 2d U. S. Infantry, and was court-martialed at Cour d'Alene on March 13, 1885, and was dishonorably discharged and sentenced to seven years in prison for robbery, burglary and absence without leave. The Oregon penitentiary was designated as his place of confinement. Pardon is full and unconditional and the grounds upon which it is granted are stated to be the conflicting testimony against Maher at the trial. The same witnesses having charged the same offenses against another prisoner on another trial. THE ASTORIA RAILROAD. The Salem and Astoria railroad committee to-day received a letter from the Astoria R. R. Co. and will consider it in a meeting to-morrow. It is understood to be very favorable to the project. YOUNG DEBARD DISCHARGED. James DeBard, a Polk county boy, arrested on suspicion of being a burglar, was to-day discharged, there being no evidence against him. TROUBLE IN CHINATOWN. George Sun Lee Ho and George Hong, Chinamen, the former of whom is well known, were arrested last night on charges of gambling, at the institution of one Sing Song. To-day they were discharged and the cost taxed to the prosecuting witness, it appearing that the arrest had been caused by spite work. A GROSS INJUSTICE. Wholly Unfounded Statement of the Commissioner of Agriculture Regarding Oregon. SALEM, Oct. 23. I most strenuously object to the report of a so-called "government commissioner of agriculture," which appears in the telegraph columns of the Oregonian of Monday. He says that "in Oregon there is much complaint of a reduction of the yield from early freezing, rain in June, hot weather in July, and blight and rust" (the italics are mine), and I presume that if there were any changes he could ring on that "line of thought," the commissioner would have added them. He must have been perusing the June election returns, thinking they were so-called "crop reports," or else this democratic official is using this way to get even on our great state for the enormous democratic majorities that failed to materialize in the June election. If there has been failure of crops in Oregon this year, we of the Willamette Valley have failed to hear of it up to date, or even of rust or blight anywhere in the state. Who furnishes this sort of a report to be published broadcast about our state, anyhow? Would it not be a good plan, in the brilliant language of the Texas statesman, Roger Q.
