GENERAL NEWS.

A Big Mail Robbery Between
Chicago and Boston.

A VESSEL AND CREW LOST
A Villain Who Murdered His Wife to be Hung With Her Executioner—Old World News.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.
CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—A mail pouch which left Boston Tuesday, arrived in Chicago last evening over the Michigan Southern road, robbed of all the registered matter. The supposition is that a large amount of money was obtained by the thief. The bag had been cut open, the thief taking the package containing first-class matter out. This leads to the belief that the perpetrator is some one connected with the postal service. The robbery is supposed to have been committed between Boston and Cleveland.

VESSEL WRECKED.
All on Board But Captain and One Sailor Drowned.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Captain Covert, of the bark Silas Fish, arrived from Virk's island yesterday. His vessel was wrecked off Grand Turk September 2nd, and the crew of eleven men and three passengers were drowned. Only Covert and a sailor named Quenton Paul were saved.

WILL BE HUNG.
A Handsome Widow Leads a Man and Wife to Their Death.

CHARLESTON (S. C.), Oct. 25.—At Sparlandburg in this state yesterday R. Senn and Helen Bond were both sentenced to be hanged on December 14th, for the murder of Mrs. Senn two years ago. Senn was infatuated with Helen Bond, a handsome widow, and poisoned his wife to get her out of the way.

McAlister Dying.
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—A special dispatch to the Examiner from New York states that Hall McAlister, a well-known lawyer of this city, who is now in New York, is suffering from paralysis of the brain and that no hopes of his recovery are entertained. His medical advisers say that his death may occur at any moment.

Yellow Fever.
FERNANDINA (Fla.), Oct. 25.—The number of new cases of yellow fever is sixteen. Number of deaths were five.

The Parnell Fund.
DUBLIN, Oct. 25.—The Parnell defense fund amounts to £11,000.

ENGLISH POLITICS.

General Tubber Accuses Americans of Being the Worst Sort of People.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—On the re-assembling of the Parnell commission to-day Attorney-General Foster resumed his address in favor of the Times. He declared on the relations between the Parnellites and the members of the American League. He contended that the league originated in America. He declared that it was a conspiracy hatched up in America and effected by American money. That the members of the league in America were dynamiters and advocates of murder. They had the Parnellites as accomplices. He denounced Binney, Fedpath and Ross as dynamiters, who had plotted most villainous forms of outrage. He said it was absurd to say that Parnell had no relation with Patrick Ford, as a host of facts proved an intimate connection between the two.

Another strike.
NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—At Newburgh last night the statement was made that the conductors and drivers on the Brooklyn Cross Town lines would strike this morning. No strike has yet occurred, however.

BELGRADE, Oct. 25.—Bishops Demetrius, of Nish, and Niccannon, of Cacak, have been dismissed, because they opposed the metropolitan action dissolving the marriage of King Milan and Queen Natalie.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 25.—Today was the fiftieth anniversary of the entrance of Dagoirs, the foreign minister, into public service. A reception was held at the foreign office in honor of the event.

A Bold, Bad Puffist.
LONDON, Oct. 25.—Jem Smith, a pugilist, was arraigned in the police court this morning, charged with drunkenness, rowdiness and using obscene language while returning from New Market yesterday. He was fined.

Another Treasurer Goes Wrong.
KNOXVILLE (Tenn.), Oct. 25.—J. A. Swann, late treasurer of Knoxville county, is short \$25,000. He is some where in the East.
