## STATE NEWS.

**Snag Puller "Corvallis" at the Capital.**

A FULL FORCE OF HANDS.

Leaving the Bars Starts up the River Monday—Will Arrive at Harrisburg in January.

**Special to the Herald.**

SALEM, Oct. 26.—The government snag puller "Corvallis" arrived at 2 o'clock this afternoon from down the river, having left Portland on October 6th. Capt. Smith has engaged a force of men on Matheny's bar below Wheatland and Lone Tree bar, increasing the depth of water by sluicing ten inches on each.

The "Corvallis" will remain here until next Monday, when she will start up the river again, and will work her way up to Harrisburg, where she expects to arrive about January 1st.

## LORD SACKVILLE'S LETTER.

**Cleveland Has at Last Found His Burchard.**

New York, October 26.—The Herald correspondents at Georgetown, Del., spoke to Secretary Bayard to-day about Lord Sackville West's letter, writing to a friend in California, advising him to vote for Cleveland, and the newspaper comment on the same. The Secretary of the State replied: "I have only this to say: Without full authentication, the private letters of Lord Sackville, West referred to, which upon their face were not intended for publication, can not be noticed by the Government."

**A special from Washington says.**

West, the British Minister, acknowledged the authorship of the letter to the British-born American citizens residing in California, dated September 13th. Democratic officials are not disposed to talk much about Minister West's campaign letter for Cleveland, but they are terribly annoyed at the state department.

The right of the British minister to give private advice on political subjects to an American citizen is a hard matter to defend, but the statement is definitely made that this administration will never ask for his recall.

**CHINESE EXCLUSION.**

The Latest Rollings of the Treasury Department.

WASHINGTON, October 26.—Acting Secretary Thompson telegraphed to the Collector of Customs at San Francisco to-day as follows: "Chinese laborers returning to China to Panama may be transferred in the harbor from incoming to outgoing vessels with out being landed on United States territory. They must be safely guarded while in United States waters, so as to prevent the infraction of the Chinese Exclusion act. These instructions may also apply to Chinese en route to Panama, provided the vessels sail direct to Panama without touching at intermediate ports."

**Chicago, October 26.**

The Michigan Central road notifies its Western connections that it cannot receive Chinese passengers holding through tickets. The road runs through Canada, between Detroit and Buffalo, and under a recent act Chinamen once taken out of the United States cannot re-enter.

**A GRAND AFFAIR.**

The Proposed Celebration of Washington's Centennial.

New York, October 26.—Without much apparent display the Committee on the Centennial Celebration of the Inauguration of George Washington has been laying out a plan and making preliminary arrangements for one of the grandest military, naval and civil displays ever witnessed in this country. It will be the last of the centennial celebrations, and will be held in and about the harbor of New York city on April 30th.

The President and Cabinet and Congressional delegates, the Governors of all the States and Territories, delegates from the State Legislatures, United States Supreme Courts of the States, army and navy, and the commanders and citizens of distinction are to be invited to take part in the exercises and to attend a banquet and ball in the evening.
