### WELL SACKVILLE IS REMOVED.

New Items from the Old World and the Rest of the Globe.—London, Oct. 27.—The Sackville letter incident has caused considerable stir in diplomatic circles. Mr. Phelps, the United States minister, has gone to Hertsford house, Lord Salisbury's country residence. Here he is expected to see the British minister. He called first at the foreign office and finding the prime minister gone, immediately followed him to his country seat. He said Lord Salisbury favored the retirement of Lord Sackville.

AT WASHINGTON.  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—In reply to an inquiry as to what steps had been taken by this government in regard to the letter of the British minister, Secretary Bayard said today:

"We simply laid the facts at once, as a matter of course, before our minister at the court of St. James and communicated by him to her majesty's government." In regard to the cable dispatch of this morning, stating that the letter was in London that the recall of Lord Sackville, the secretary said, "That is merely London rumor, of which I know nothing."

OFFICIALS RETIRED.  
LONDON, Oct. 27.—The officials at the United States Legation are extremely reticent on the subject of the Sackville affair. When the first secretary of the legation, when questioned, declined to talk.
