THE SYNDICATE BUSINESS.

The methods adopted by the leaders of the syndicates and trusts, in many instances bring their own destruction. The Baltimore Sun says on this subject that every dealer in the article knows that the tin syndicate has gone to smash. But the copper syndicate, French in its origin, and engineered by M. Secretan, still flourishes. He still holds a call upon a very large proportion of the world's production, and thus far has carried up prices at his will, paying more than the average price to the copper-mining corporations and sharing with them a certain portion of the additional profits. But the laws of trade are beginning to tell on the syndicate. It has forced the world to buy copper at a purely artificial and inflated value, and the consequence is that the consumption of copper has been materially reduced, stocks are accumulating and production is increasing. As the syndicate is compelled to take all the copper that is produced, the financial strain in carrying so much without finding a market for it is getting to be felt. The corner in copper may not break down immediately, but to realize on the constantly increasing stock on hand, the syndicate will have to lower its prices, and when this occurs the beginning of the end will not be far off. Consumers of copper have only to restrict their orders for a little time longer, and the syndicate will break down from overweight. In any event, let the collapse come when it may, it has been making large profits while the squeeze lasted. But other trusts can not be controlled as easily as the tin and copper trusts can, and other trusts cause more wrong and hardships upon the working people. Legislation should stretch forth its strong arm and regulate such matters so that innocent parties should not be caused to suffer.

P. T. BARNUM shows his appreciation of protection to American industries, by offering his entire real estate in Bridgeford, Connecticut, at 25 per cent less than valuation in case Cleveland is elected president. He says that he considers the change in the policy of the government, in that event, would depreciate the value of the property fully to that extent.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

This is the question in a nutshell, that the voter must decide before next Tuesday.

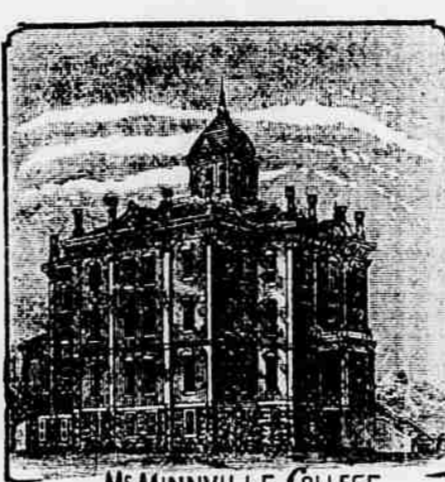

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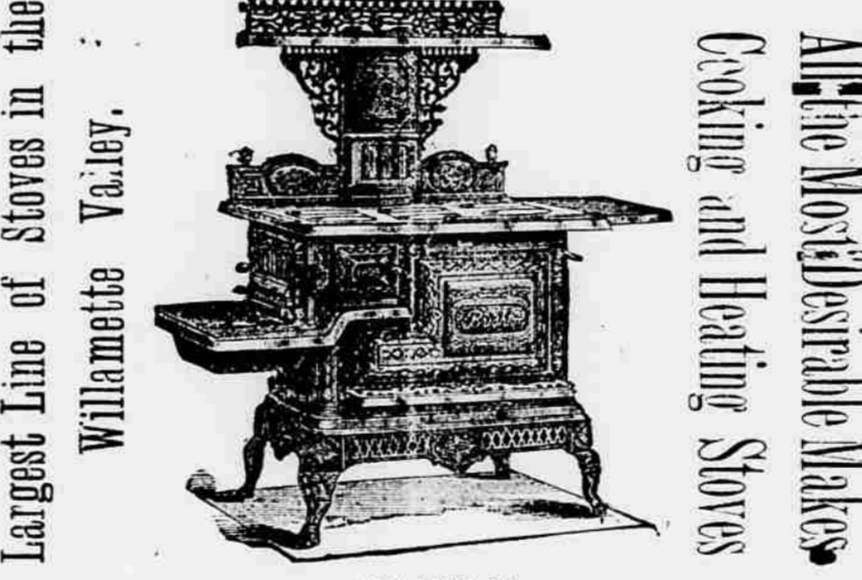
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
