It Will Occur Four Weeks from Next Monday - The Vacancy.

The presidential contest has so overshadowed all other matters that little or nothing is being said concerning the city election in this city, which will occur four weeks from next Monday, November 26.

The offices to be filled are city marshal, treasurer and three councilmen, one from each ward. There are a number of applicants already for the office of marshal, but the real rustling for the office will not commence until after the all-absorbing election next Tuesday.

DAMAGE SUIT DISMISSED.

The Suit of Dr. E. A. McAlister Against the City for \$12,500.

The damage suit of Dr. E. A. McAlister against the city for \$12,500 damages on account of injuries and financial loss resulting from driving into an open sewer in course of construction on Elsworth street, was dismissed yesterday in the circuit court on a motion of the attorneys for the city.

The court held that the contractors who were constructing the sewer were responsible and not the city, the negligence in not properly placing a barricade or light at the excavation resting with them instead of the officers of the city.

To illustrate the enthusiasm, last Friday evening he spoke to a crowded house in Naugatuck, Conn., closing at 11 o'clock. The audience was dismissed and the speaker went to the hotel. The crowd did not leave, however, and at midnight he was waited upon and asked to return to the hall, where 5000 people had assembled, which he did, and spoke until 2 o'clock amidst the greatest excitement.

Every effort is being made to bring out every voter, and all the above named states are now confidently expected to cast their votes for the republican ticket.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Street Cars for the State Capital—Newspaper Notes from Salem and Portland.

Special to the HERALD. SALEM, Oct. 31.—A number of business men of Salem met at the Capital National Bank this afternoon to discuss the question of building a system of street railway in this city.

It was the general sentiment of those present that the time had arrived when such an enterprise is a necessity and that it is economically built and well managed would be a paying investment.

H. W. Cottle was elected president of the meeting, C. B. Moore secretary, and Hon. J. J. Shaw, Squire Farrar and C. B. Moore were appointed a committee to draft articles incorporating a street railway company, under the name of the "Salem Street Railway Co.," with a capital stock of \$20,000, divided into 2000 shares of \$10 each.

A small fire broke out in B. Co.'s armory this morning which was extinguished without an alarm being given. Damage nominal.

A NAUGHTY BOY.

Vernon Osborn, the 16-year-old boy who robbed a poor milk man near his place of \$70 a few days ago, was brought back to Salem by Marshal Ross this morning from Junction City, where he had been arrested while running a skating rink, in which he had bought a half interest with a part of the stolen money.

He had spent part for a new suit of clothes, revolver, watch and other trinkets, and had \$10 left. He will have a preliminary examination before Judge Strycker's court to-morrow.

COURT NOTES.

PORTLAND, Oct. 31.—The lawyers for Wilcox and McIsaacs this morning asked that the case be tried before Judge Shattuck. Judge Stearns gave them until Saturday to complete their application. A change of venue will probably be granted.

Great difficulty has been encountered in getting a jury for Ben King at his second trial. The case was begun at 2 o'clock, and is still open. King was a confederate of Frank Andrews in the \$10,000 robbery from the Northern Pacific Express Company.

Damages Awarded.

In the case of James McHargue against J. H. Wigle, for damages accruing from trespass of the defendant's stock upon the plaintiff's farm, the jury yesterday returned a verdict of \$222.29 for the plaintiff, the costs being also payable by the defendant.
