GENERAL NEWS.

The Sackville Letter Forms the Chief Interest.

SEARCHING MANY DOUBLOONS.

Railway Bonds Sale in London—Joy in Greece—News from East of the Rockies and the Orient.

The Herald Special Despatches.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—It is stated in government circles that Lord Sackville has reached his end. Sackville has not yet advised the government as to the date of his return. It is possible that some time may elapse before the new minister is sent to Washington. American circles here are anxious that Drifflinger shall be appointed to the post.

The St. James Gazette in referring to the action of the United States in the case of Sackville, says:

"It would be most creditable to English good sense if Bayard's instructions were treated with contempt. If the American eagle is soaring, let him soar. We are not exactly prepared to send ironclads to Long Island because Bayard is outrageously offensive. Respectable Americans, who stand in, and neither want Cleveland nor Harrison, are nearly as much disgusted with affairs as England."

The Pall Mall Gazette expresses hope that the ire of the democratic wire-pullers is assayed for Cleveland could do no more without bringing Lord Sackville into jail. What silly business it is all through. The British consolation is that Cleveland appreciates Lord Sackville's indiscretion. It is one thing to be tricked into making a slip and to plunge headlong into an abyss of folly and ill temper, and we owe Cleveland thanks for showing that that that silly man in Washington was not born in England.

The Star, T. P. Connor's paper, says:

"Bayard puts it very strong. The Irish vote is so pressing, and the desire to satisfy him so urgent, that Cleveland cannot wait till Salisbury takes action. The incident furnishes fresh evidence of the pernicious influence of the Irish vote in Anglo-American politics."

A BIG FIND.

Fifteen Hundred Doubloons at One Digging.

FALL RIVER, (Mass.), Nov. 1.—James M. Eddy, of Horsesick, R. I., has unearthed 1500 Spanish doubloons in his backyard and calculates there are 10,000 more on his farm. His father was once lieutenant-governor of Rhode Island. One of his ancestors, who sailed with Captain Kidd, returned to his Horsesick farm and sowed it with doubloons. Among his papers was a chart locating his buried wealth. The lieutenant-governor did not bring with him the plan, but James M. Eddy, in whose possession the property came at the same time as the farm, thought it would be worth his while trying trying.

YELLOW FEVER.

GRECIAN MONARCH.

King George Twenty-Five Years on the Throne.

ATHENS, Nov. 1.—The festivities yesterday, in honor of the twenty-fifth anniversary of King George's accession to the throne, were on a grand scale. The king headed a grand procession to the cathedral, where the deum was sung. Returning to the palace he addressed the people. Fearn, the United States minister, presented a telegram of congratulation from President Cleveland.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Tommy Flannery, of Cincinnati, and Pete McCabe, of Albany, fought a desperate battle of ten rounds at City Island last night. Flannery gained the victory after almost demolishing McCabe. The battle was so wicked toward the finish that many spectators turned their heads away to avoid the sickening sight. Just before the seventh round McCabe had the misfortune to take a swallow of ammonia, which the trainer gave him by mistake for brandy. It seriously injured his chances.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 1.—Pat Killen has signed articles for a fight with Dominick McCaffery, who is on his way to the Pacific coast. The fight will be fifteen rounds for \$1000 a side and 25 per cent. of the receipts. The time and place not yet decided.

UNION PACIFIC.

Remarkable Sale of Stock in London.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—The subscription for \$3,400,000 of the Union Pacific, Lincoln, Colorado railroad, on the first mortgage bonds guaranteed by the Union Pacific, was closed abruptly yesterday by a dispatch from London, which stated the amount had been taken. The success of the loan is remarkable in view of the efforts made against the legality of the issue.

SCRAPS OF SCIENCE.

An interesting ancient canoe, hollowed out by means of red hot stones, has been found in South Central Norway.

A recently perfected gauge for scribing around circles or on concave edges for turners' use is unsurpassed, as it takes the place of dividers and is far more accurate.

The singular "canals" seen on Mars are explained by M. Pizeau on the supposition that the planet has glaciers much larger than those of the earth, and with greater crevasses and movements.

A remarkable strip of the new railroad from Buenos Ayres to the Andes is probable the longest tangent in the world, extending 211 miles without a curve. It is further notable for having no bridge in the entire distance, and no cut or fill exceeding about a yard in depth or height.

A curious phenomenon of last January has just been reported from the fishing village of Kerschkaranzo, on the White Sea. The shore ice, piled to the height of several hundred feet, suddenly commenced moving from the northwest, and in four hours extended a mile inward burying the village.

Grant Allen suggests that the evolution of pottery may be traced to the gourd of various forms used by the primitive savages for containing water. The gourds were probably smeared with wet clay to protect them when held over the camp-fire, as is still done by savages, and the durable coating thus produced, outlasting the inner shell, gave the accidental lesson in moulding dishes from natural objects.

A successful Russian method of solidifying petroleum consists simply in adding to the heated oil from one to three per cent. of soap which dissolves, and on cooling the mixture becomes a cement-like mass having the hardness of compact tallow. This forms a convenient and economical fuel, which is hard to light, burns slow and without smoke, but develops much heat, and leaves about two per cent of a hard black residuum.

A "whistling language" of the inhabitants of Gomer Island is described by Lieut. Quadenstedt, of the German army, as ordinary speech translated into articulate whistling, each syllable having its own appropriate tone. It is unknown in other islands of the Canary group, and as it may be heard a mile away, it is supposed to have been adopted to enable the people to talk across the many deep, unbridged ravines separating their homes on this island.

THE NOVEMBER ELECTIONS.

All the states will elect presidential electors on Tuesday next. The electors then chosen will meet at their respective state capitals on Wednesday, December 3, and cast their vote for president and vice-president of the United States. The whole number of electors is 401; necessary for choice 201. The several states are entitled to representation in the electoral college.
