LOCAL NEWS.

Our Usual Budget of News About the City.

THE ATTEMPTED BANK ROBBERY.

James Hanon Held in \$1000 Bonds to Answer to the Charge of the Crime.

James Hanon was arrested yesterday morning on suspicion of being one of the parties who attempted the robbery of the Lebanon bank. He was found in bed at the Depot hotel about 6 o'clock, accompanied by a young man named Costello.

The latter was not arrested. Hanon was arraigned before Justice Humphrey. It was shown that the prisoner had been in Lebanon for several months, and had been engaged in no particular occupation.

He had charge of some railroad material which had been shipped out from the summit work on the Oregon Pacific railroad, owned by Malone & Co. The material, consisting of drills, powder, scrapers and railroad supplies, had been attached, and remained in Lebanon for several months.

A whole kit of burglar's tools, such as a dark lantern, drills, augers and other implements, as well as the cement trap door, were found in the tunnel beneath the bank. Some of the witnesses testified that a drill found under the bank was very similar to one which was among the supplies in Hanon's charge. A lot of plaster of Paris was found under the bank and Yates & Beard, druggists of Lebanon, testified that Hanon had bought it at their store, although the prisoner denied it on the stand.

He testified that he was a railroad contractor and knew nothing of the attempted robbery until his arrest. A vest was found in the excavation which the deputy city marshal swore he had seen him wear, or one just like it.

The evidence showed that the attempted robbery had been skillfully planned and would have been successfully worked had it not been for the impervious condition of the burglar box, which would not yield to the work of the burglars.

A large number of witnesses were examined, and the examination was continued all afternoon and last evening.

The trial was concluded at a late hour last night, and Hanon was held in \$1000 bonds to await the action of the grand jury, in default of which he went to jail.

LARGE PRUNE ORCHARD.

Several Citizens in Benton and Linn Counties Will Plant Largely.

The climate and soil of the Willamette valley is so naturally adapted to the culture of fruit of nearly every description, that it is only a matter of time when the large fields now covered with stubble or oak groves will be replaced by thrifty and profitable orchards.

The land is too valuable to be used forever in growing grain to compete with the "pauper" soil of other localities and this fact is gradually dawning on many of our citizens.

The planting of fruit trees is annually growing greater all through the valley, but the largest acreage to be planted this year, that we have heard of, is in Linn county, about two miles from Corvallis, says the Times. By a mutual understanding between a few citizens and some of the farmers of that locality, they have decided to plant a large tract in Italian prune trees and by pooling their resources their financial success seems to be inevitable, as the demand for this fruit is almost insatiable. They expect to erect a dryer of enormous capacity when their trees commence to bear and ship their fruit under one brand. This can hardly be considered a speculation as the demand for fruit culture in the Willamette valley has already been demonstrated and it is predicted that the seventy-five acres then planted will be among the most valuable in the valley in a very few years.

Mr. Braden has held twenty-eight debates with the ablest representatives of skepticism, and is acknowledged to be one of the ablest living defenders of the teachings of the bible. Mr. Underwood has had much experience in debating and is regarded as one of the ablest defenders of skepticism. The debate will be a valuable course of teaching in regard to the most important themes in human thought.

GENERAL NEWS.

Political Notes from New York and Indiana.

\$15,000 WAGERED ON HARRISON.

A Seventeen-Year-Old Boy Murders His Father in Cold Blood—Forty Men Killed in a Mine Explosion.

The Herald's Special Despatches. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 3.—At the rooms of the democratic state central committee to-day Chairman Jewett expressed confidence that the democrats would carry the state by over 10,000.

Chairman Husted, of the republican central committee, when asked about the probable result, gave it as his opinion that Harrison's majority would range from 9000 to 15,000. "The people are beginning to think that in view of the Herculean efforts made by both parties the contest will be exceedingly close, and the final result not known for a week after election."

Speaking continues day and night throughout the state.

FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The papers are full of special dispatches from Virginia concerning the probable result in that state. One dispatch this evening says: General Mahone is confident that several republican members of congress will be elected out of the ten representatives apportioned to Virginia.

The canvass in Virginia is practically completed. A careful review of the situation is encouraging to the republicans. There is but little doubt but that the republicans will poll a majority of the votes to be cast on the 6th of November. If a fair count is had in the "Black Belt," mostly located in the Fourth and Second districts, the electoral vote will be given to Harrison and Morton. These districts give from 14,000 to 15,000 republican majority, and will elect republican congressmen without doubt.

SHOCKING CRIME.

A Seventeen-Year-Old Boy Murders His Father in Cold Blood.

BOSHAM, (Texas), Nov. 3.—Last night H. C. Bryans, who resided a few miles south of town, was stabbed by his 17-year-old son, Neely Bryans. The knife severed an artery, causing the old man's almost instant death. The difficulty was occasioned by the father asking the son, who had been away two years, either to come home and go to work or get his clothes and leave for good. Immediately after the murder the boy fled and has not yet been apprehended.

CONGRESSMAN HERMAN.

He Expresses His Opinion Concerning the Election on Tuesday.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Congressman Hermann, of Oregon, the only one of the Pacific coast delegation now in the city, in speaking to-day on the coming election, said that the result would be a surprise to everybody. "While the majority of the two parties," he continued, "are in a state of suspense over what the result will be, I have never yet had any doubt about our success. I think the vote in the close states of Indiana, New Jersey and Connecticut will astonish the democrats as well as republicans. This time the quiet democratic vote will be given to Harrison. It was this quiet vote that surprised everybody with Oregon's large majority."

BIG HARRISON MONEY.

An Ex-Congressman Gets \$15,000 on Harrison's Election.

EVANSVILLE (Ind.), Nov. 3.—William Herlan, republican ex-congressman from this district to-day bet \$15,000 that Harrison would be elected. He has \$10,000 more to bet this way. A syndicate of Cleveland men took the bet.

FORTY MEN KILLED

From an Explosion in the Mines in England.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—There has been a great explosion in the Campnac colliery at Avignon from fire damp. The pit was full of men at the time. Forty persons are known to be killed.

The Country's Finances.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The annual report of General Rosecrans, register of the treasury, shows that during the year there was issued 26,593 United States bonds, amounting to \$114,000,000 and cancelled 72,135 bonds, amounting to \$1,800,000,000.

Pacific Coast Hops.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Of the large arrival of hops to-day, amounting to 2540 bales, the Pacific coast contributed 1972 bales. It was chiefly consigned to Europe.

ROME, Nov. 3.—The pope has named December 31st for special thanksgiving services in Catholic churches throughout the world for grace during the year of the papal jubilee.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—More than 20,000 voters made up the procession of republican clubs this afternoon.
