LINN COUNTY BUSINESS COUNCIL.

November 3rd 1888.

The Council met with Grand Prairie grange. At the hour of opening a large number were present and the communications laid were soon filled. President J. G. Powell called to order and the Secretary Miss Kate Price was on hand with her efficient and thorough records of the preceding meetings.

Committees appointed at previous meetings asked further time to report which was granted.

A resolution upon governmental finances was offered by C. S. Nighswander of Lane county, who discussed the subject in an able manner. The same question was taken up and fully handled by Judge Boise who was present. On motion the question was referred to the committee on good of the order to report after dinner.

A resolution upon the subject of petitioning for a change of the National Constitution to make the election of the United States senators by a vote of the people instead of by the legislatures offered by N. F. Payne of Grand Prairie grange and discussed by Payne, Train and Boise and adopted.

A series of resolutions relative to matters of necessary legislation were offered and motion made to adopt the whole as read. The resolutions were discussed and on motion of M. H. Wilds were separated and considered seriatim. Those discussing them were Judge Boise, M. H. Wilds, J. Simpson, H. Freerkson, J. H. Scott and others and the resolutions were adopted.

The applications of two granges outside of Linn county, for membership in the Council were presented and on motion they were enrolled as members.

The hour for dinner having arrived the Council took a recess and partook of one of the bounteous feasts for which the ladies of Grand Prairie are famous for preparing.

The Council resumed work. F. M. Nighswander offered a resolution upon the subject of marketing beef cattle, moving its attention and explaining the same. It was ably discussed by J. Simpson, A. S. Powell, Benjamin Schofield of Hillsboro, N. Payne, Hon. S. A. Dawson, Judge Boise, M. H. Wilds, Hon. R. A. Irvine and others. By motion the matter embodied in the resolution was submitted to a committee of five consisting of F. M. Nighswander, Mart Miller, T. Franzen, and J. H. Scott to report at a future meeting.

Harmony grange announced that on the 2nd Saturday a class would be initiated at their hall and invited patrons to meet with them on that day.

The matter of the place of holding the next meeting was made the subject of much good natured discussion but was finally settled at Shedd with Oak Plain grange.

Reports of good of the order committee upon matters referred to them were read and adopted.

Benjamin Schofield of Hillsboro grange announced that their association had a tie ditching machine which they wished to introduce and recommend. Remarks for good of the order were made by Train, J. Davis, Freerkson, Boise, Schofield, M. H. Cochran and others and after giving a vote of thanks to Grand Prairie for the bounteous dinner and for the use of the hall the meeting adjourned amid expressions of pleasure and satisfaction.

PUT THEIR HEAD IN A SACK.

An Express Robber Single-Headed Secures Between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

New York, Nov. 3.—The United States express messenger on the New Orleans & Northeastern railway, which arrived here this morning, was robbed at 5 A. M. between Lacey and Derby stations, fifty miles from this city. The express officials decline to state the amount of the robbery, but it is understood the loss is between \$40,000 and \$50,000. The robber entered the express car, where Henry McElroy, the baggage master, was sitting near the middle of the car, and the express messenger, Charles Lawrey, at one end checking off freight. The robber came first to the baggage master and presenting a pistol, required McElroy to hold up his hands, then quickly throwing a sack over McElroy's head, the robber gave his attention to the messenger, who was required at the point of the pistol to open the safe. A sack was then placed over the messenger's head, while the robber proceeded with the work of securing the money. After securing the contents of the safe the robber pulled the bell rope, and when the train stopped, he left the car unobserved. When the express car was finally reached by the conductor both McElroy and Lawrey were found standing with hands up and sacks over their heads. They were under the impression that the robber was still present.

AN ELECTRICAL TRIUMPH.

The New Railway System Which Climbs the Swiss Alps.

An account of an electric mountain railway, the first of its kind, which has recently been opened to the public at the Burgstöck, near Lucerne, says that it has hitherto considered impossible to construct a trolley mountain railway with a curve but the new line up the Burgstöck has achieved that feat under the superintendence of Mr. Abt, the Swiss electrical engineer. The rails describe one grand curve formed upon an angle of 112 degrees, and the journey is made as steadily and smoothly as upon any of the straight trolley railways previously constructed. A bed has been cut for the most part out of the solid rock in the mountain side, from the shore of the Lake of Lucerne to the height of the Burgstöck—1330 feet above its level, and 2500 feet above the level of the sea. The total length of the line is 958 meters, and it commences with a gradient of 32 per cent, which is increased to 58 per cent after the first 400 meters, and this is maintained for the rest of the journey. A single pair of rails is used throughout, with the exception of a few yards at half distance to permit two cars to pass. Through the opposition of the Swiss Government each car is at the present time only allowed to run the half distance, and they insist upon the passengers changing in order, as they say to avoid collision or accident. I have made a number of journeys up and down the mountain in company with an engineer, and the experience is sufficient to prove that the prohibition is altogether unnecessary. The motive power, electricity, is generated by two dynamos, each of twenty-five horse power, which are worked by a water-wheel of 125 horse-power, erected upon the River Aar at its mouth at Buechi, three miles away. Only one man is required to manage the train, and the movement of the cars is completely under his control. One dynamo is sufficient to perform the work of hauling up and letting down the cars containing fifty or sixty persons. At the end of the journey completed in about fifteen minutes at an ordinary walking speed, the car moves gently against a spring buffer, and is locked by a lever, without noise and without jolting the passengers. This interesting undertaking has been carried out at a cost of £25,000.
