THE PISTOL WAS LOADED.

Edward Will accidentally shot in the leg by A. Bernheim. Edward Will, of the firm of Will Bros., gunsmiths, received a painful pistol shot in the leg yesterday, from the accidental discharge of the weapon in the hands of A. Bernheim, the junk dealer. Mr. Will had accompanied him to his boarding place on Fourth street for the purpose of trading for the pistol. It was a 38-caliber, self-cocking revolver and was loaded. Mr. Will removed the cartridges before examining it and then replaced them and handed the weapon back to Mr. Bernheim. The latter thought it was still unloaded and while handling it carelessly it was discharged, the ball entering the thigh of Mr. Will's right leg and inflicting a painful but not dangerous wound. It was dressed by Dr. Maston. The patient says the wound will not prevent him from going to the polls to-day and casting a vote for Harrison and Morton.

POLITICAL PROGNOSTICATIONS.

Some Democrats Who Will Vote for Harrison in Linn County.

Mr. J. F. McCartney of Soda-ville, formerly a prominent citizen of Harrisburg in this city. He has conversed with many of the voters of Linn county, and says that he has noted 20 democrats who have avowed their intention of voting for Harrison. All of these men voted democratic at the June election. R. R. Humphrey, a staunch democrat, who runs a saw-mill above Lebanon, says that every hand in the mill will vote for Harrison. Mr. Humphrey will also vote for protection and says he has made a record of 40 voters who voted democratic in June who will cast their votes to-day for Harrison and Morton. A gentleman who has returned from the front on the Oregon Pacific railroad says that the reported wholesale voting of the railroad laborers for Cleveland is all a big "bugaboo." Of 50 laborers he conversed with 30 will vote for Harrison. Many of these laborers are foreigners and have not resided in the state long enough to entitle them to vote, and will not attempt to do so, while the legally qualified voters who are working on the road are probably equally divided. There are no reasonable grounds for expecting any change in the result of the election either in Linn or Marion counties from this source.

Death of Stephen Flinn

Stephen Flinn, son of Judge L. Flinn, president of the First National bank, died at the home of his parents in this city at 5:40 last evening of pulmonary disease, aged 20. He was a young man of bright intellect. He graduated with honor from the Albany Collegiate Institute in 1886, and afterwards entered upon a course at Princeton. He returned home during the past summer to spend his vacation. He was in moderate health, but soon began to fail in health, having contracted that dread disease, consumption. He went to California for his health, accompanied by his mother, but returned home a few days ago and has continued to grow worse until death came.

Sale of Hops.

Dove Bros., of Bird Island, a few miles above Salem, yesterday sold the 1888 yield of their hop yards, 42,000 pounds, to Phil Niss, of the San Francisco hop dealer, for 18 cents, net at their place. The hops are to be delivered on board one of the river steamboats next week, and the Dove Bros. will then receive \$7,560 in 1889 for their 1888 work.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

An Old Coder Arrested. A rich man with Paralytic Political Notes. Special to the Herald.

Salem, Nov. 5.—Wm. Peck, who was sent to the penitentiary from Multnomah county September 1887 for larceny from the store of Wm. Beck & sons, and whose term was commuted by Governor Penoyer July 31, 1888, was to-day arrested here by Sheriff Croisan on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. While in prison he occupied a cell with F. S. Curran, sent from Prineville for horse-stealing, and learned all his past history. About a month after he was released he went to Cottage Grove, Lane county, and by representing himself to be F. A. English, ex-book-keeper of the penitentiary, persuaded Curran's father to give \$180 to use in securing a pardon for his son's pardon. This money he appropriated to private use. He is now in the county jail, and will probably be taken to Lane county to-morrow for trial. The examination of the affairs of the Indian training school at Chemawa has been adjourned until Wednesday. U. S. special Agent Gen. Gordon is in the city. The city is quiet this evening. Betting has been very lively to-day, fully \$1500 having been wagered on the general result. In the morning democratic money was plentiful; to-night republican money goes begging. To-day \$500 was sent to Gervais by Salem republicans to cover a like amount offered by democrats there. It was not taken, the democrats failing to produce the money. A. Bush, chairman of the democratic state central committee, to-day received a dispatch from Chairman Brice, of the national democratic committee, stating that New Jersey, Connecticut, Indiana and New York were safe for Cleveland and Thurman by majorities ranging from 5500 to 35,000. Calvin Neal, a well-known pioneer of Marion county, was stricken with paralysis of the right side at his home four miles from Turner last Thursday. He is reported somewhat better, although the chances for recovery are poor. About \$5000 has been subscribed to the stock of the Salem Street Railway Co. without any work having been done by the committee. The balance of the \$20,000 is assured. Contracts for the work will be let immediately.

TO-DAY'S ELECTION.

All the states will elect presidential electors to-day. The electors then chosen will meet at their respective state capitals on Wednesday, December 5, and cast their vote for president and vice-president of the United States. The whole number of electors is 401 necessary for choice 201. The several states are entitled to representation in the electoral college.

Portland, Nov. 5.—District Attorney McGinn to-day recommended the discharge of Ben King, accused of having been a confederate of Frank Anderson in the theft of \$10,000 from the Northern Pacific express company. He stated that King had had two trials, neither jury being able to agree, and he felt it doubtful as to any better success in the future in this case. Judge Stearns agreed with the district attorney, and an order was made to release King. DEATH OF AN ATTORNEY. ARLINGTON, (Or.), Nov. 2.—W. G. Brown, a lawyer and prominent citizen of this place, died last night at 11 o'clock.

LEBANON, Nov. 5.—Yesterday the little 9-year-old son of Joe Keckler near this place, while leading a horse to water, was badly kicked. He was unconscious for about ten hours, and for a while small hopes were entertained for his recovery, but at last accounts he was doing well. To-day's investigations of the attempted bank robbery resulted in the finding of various other tools and implements. Ralston and sister, Miss Fannie Griggs, are visiting relatives and friends in Albany. Mr. Carr is erecting a dwelling in Ralston's addition.
