GENERAL NEWS.

The Supreme Court Refuses to Release Judge Terry.

MURDER ON SOUTHERN BORDER.

Many Dead Bodies Removed from the Pennsylvania Mine Disaster—News East of the Rockies.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The supreme court of the United States denied an application for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of David S. Terry, of California, convicted of contempt of court and for a violent scene in which he and his wife attacked the officers of the court. The application for the writ was made on the ground that Terry was not in the court room and did not have a notice of intention to bring him trial. Justice Harlan, who rendered the decision, says the offense was committed in full view of the court. It followed practically without any intermission, that the case is not one in which this court should interfere. Justice Field took part in the case.

A FRIGHTFUL DISASTER.

RECOVERING THE BODIES FROM THE Mine Explosion in Pennsylvania.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 12.—Up to Sunday evening at 6 o'clock 39 dead bodies had been recovered, also 20 wounded. Of the latter not to exceed five will live and probably not that many. Volunteers are still searching the entries and rooms of the underground workings for bodies, but it is thought they are all discovered. There were about 150 men in the mine at the time of the explosion. There are over and above the number of killed and wounded, three who escaped soon after the explosion by way of the air and escape shaft. The officials of the company are on the ground and all being done that can be for the relief of the sufferers and distress of all the wounded men and destitute families.

TROUBLE ON THE BORDER.

Reported Assassination of Governor Guerra in the Chickasaw Nation.

GAINESVILLE, (Tex.), Nov. 12.—News has been received at Tishomingo, the capital of the Chickasaw nation, that Gov. Guerra was assassinated Saturday night. Advice from the Chickasaw nation are that serious trouble is brewing between the followers of Gov. Guerra and his opponent at the late election. At Byrd the report of the assassination is not yet confirmed.

Out in Rate.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—The New York Central has cut on the west bound trains to Chicago 25 cents per 100 pounds for first and third class, and other classes proportionately. The cut was made on account of the inroads made by the Pennsylvania railroad. All lines are taking business at cut rates.

Another Body Found.

ROCHESTER (N. Y.), Nov. 12.—This morning another body was found in the ruins of a lamp factory, which was burned. It was unrecognizable. In all seven charred bodies have been taken from the ruins.

Gen. Warren Resigns.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Gen. Warren, chief of police, has tendered his resignation. It is understood this action is due to severe criticisms upon his efficiency in connection with the Whitechapel murders.

The Alaska Aground.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—A dispatch from Sandy Hook at 1:30 this morning says: The steamer Alaska has grounded in the channel in the lower bay. She will probably come off at high tide without damage.

Later.—The Alaska came off at high tide and arrived safe.

Demanding Order.

MADRID, Nov. 12.—At noon today the authorities issued an order prohibiting street assemblies and instructing the police to disperse all gatherings. The city is quiet.

Barnum Improving.

LIMEROCK, (Conn.), Nov. 12.—At 4 a. m. W. H. Barnum showed a slight improvement. The physicians have a slight hope that he may pull through.

A Shocking Murder.

NEW HAVEN, Nov. 12.—This morning a cooper of Portland murdered his wife by cutting her head open with an axe. Jealousy was the cause.

Mrs. Jay Gould.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—The condition of Mrs. Jay Gould remains unchanged. She cannot survive more than a day or two.

CORVALLIS NEWS.

Official Council of Voters—Republicans Will Ratify—Notes.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 10.—The official council of Benton county gives Harrison 1306, Cleveland 969, Fiske 66, Labor 18.

A meeting of the Corvallis republican club is called to take place to ratify on or about Wednesday evening. An amount of money has been raised, and torches from Portland ordered. Anvils will be fired at three different places in the city.

It is learned that a church building for the Christian denomination is to be erected at an early day, and that the site may be filled by a well-known Salem deity.

A farmer's institute is to be held at the chapel of the state agricultural college Nov. 15 and 16. The address of welcome will be by President Arnold, and the response by Governor Penoyer. S. A. Clarke, of Salem, reads a paper. The rest of the programme is very interesting. A series of these institutes are to be given at Salem, Roseburg and Hillsboro.

There are ninety students in the state agricultural college.

CURIOUS MARRIAGE LAWS.

Girls Put in Cages Until Wanted by Men.

At the meeting of the British Association at Bath, on Nov. 10, Rev. B. Danks read a paper on "Marriage Customs of the New British Group." He said that for marriage purposes the people of New Britain are divided into two classes or divisions. No man may marry a woman of his own class. To do so would bring instant destruction upon the woman, and if not immediate death upon the man, his life would never be secure. Preparations for marriages are various. On Duke of York island initiation into the sacred society, which is called the Unkoko, seems a sufficient preparation, though not absolutely necessary to marriage for the boys, and there appears to be no needful preparation for the girls. On New Zealand some girls wear a fringe across their shoulders until they are marriageable. These are the poorer classes.

Others are put into cages, in which they remain four or five years without being allowed to go outside the house in which they are confined. These cages are conical structures, about seven or eight feet in height, and about ten or twelve feet in circumference at the bottom and for about four feet from the ground, where they taper off to a point at the top. They are made of the broad leaves of the pandanus tree, sewn quite close together, so that no light and very little air can enter. About three feet from the ground the interior stage of bamboo, which forms the floor. There is only room for the girl to sit or lie down in a crouched position on the bamboo platform, and her feet are never allowed to touch the ground at the time she is confined in the cage.

Great marriage feasts are provided for these girls when they are taken out of the cages. Wives are purchased with small money, and are often married at an early age on Duke of York island. When a man marries a second wife, after the death of the first, the female relatives of the dead wife gather together and are permitted to do as much damage to his property as they can. A man may have as many wives as he can purchase; but if he cannot afford to buy one, and his credit is low, he may have to remain single. Sir John Lubbock said: "In some parts of Australia, when a man married, each of the bride's relations gave him a good blow with a stout stick by way of a warm welcome into the family. Among the Kalmucks of Central Asia the marriage ceremony was very romantic. The girl was put on a horse and rode at full speed. When she got a fair start the lover set off in pursuit; if he caught her she became his wife, but if he could not overtake her the match was broken off, and as we were assured that a Kalmuck girl was very seldom caught against her will. The idea of capture in marriage occurred almost all over the world. Hence, no doubt, the custom of lifting the bride over the doorstep, which occurred among the Romans, the Redskins of Canada, the Chinese, the Abyssinians and other races.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—A Charleston, S. C., special says: The News and Courier publishes the opinions of thirty county chairmen on the situation. One of the old line democrats created quite a sensation by saying:

"I, for one, am getting tired of being used as a cat's paw to rake chestnuts out of the fire for Northern politicians.
