MORE NEW COAL DISCOVERIES.

This Time the Article is Found Up on the Santiam.

New discoveries of coal are being made from time to time in the Northwest, and there seems but little doubt about coal being as plentiful in this section as in almost any part of the Union.

A coal mine which promises to be a very valuable one was discovered in July last, on the southern fork of the north fork of the Santiam, about eight miles above Sweet Home and twenty-five miles from Lebanon. The vein which crops out in places in the bed of the creek, is from five to six feet in thickness and is now being opened out.

Specimens of the coal have been analyzed by J. H. Fisk, who gives the following analysis: This is better than the average of Seattle coal, and is a higher grade than most of the Puget sound coal.

One hundred parts of the raw coal gave sixty-two of coke, which was composed as follows: Carbon, 78.70; ash, 21.30. This includes .71 of sulphur and a trace of phosphorus.

Now that so much attention is being turned to prospecting for coal and mines of all kinds, there is greater need than ever of a state geologist, who can investigate discoveries and make reliable and intelligent reports thereon.

Every other state has such an officer, and Oregon once had one, and a competent one, too, in the person of Prof. Thomas Condon, now of the University of Oregon, whose equal as a scholar and geologist but few states can produce.

The returns from the various states indicate that Harrison has 251 votes in the electoral college and Cleveland 150. The official count may give old Virginia to the democrats, making the plurality for Harrison 12 less, but the following are the figures considered accurate at present:

The Line of March—The Committees and Officers of the Day.

To various committees, which are arranging for the big republican demonstration on Thursday evening, have nearly completed the details of the evening's parade. The line of procession will be as follows:

Form at west end of First street, the line reaching south on Calapooia street. March up First to Lyon; out Lyon to Ninth; down Ninth to Washington; down Washington to Fourth; down Fourth to court house, where speeches and other exercises will occur.

Residences and business houses will be illuminated, and the display of fireworks will be fine. Music will be furnished by the Albany and Tangent bands in uniform.
