ON THE OREGON PACIFIC.

How the Work is Progressing Over 42 Miles Completed Eastward.

Messrs. W. B. Barr and E. J. O'Connor, contractors of the Oregon Pacific, were seen yesterday by a Herald reporter, and some facts ascertained concerning the work on the eastward extension. The track is now laid seven miles beyond Melama, a distance of about 42 miles east of this city. Regular trains are now run as far east as Bates, and construction trains run to the end of the track.

The contract of Messrs. O'Connor & Barr will be completed in about ten days unless, as the company now proposes, the line is changed to cut deeper in the hillside to prevent landslides, in which event it will require a month's time to complete their contract.

Messrs. Searles & Deane still have a large force of men employed and are pushing the work vigorously forward.

Several news towns have been laid out along the line, which passes through a country rich both in agricultural and timber resources, and a noticeable activity toward setting it up is manifested all along the route.

The company of men from this city who purchased timber land and took up homesteads about 20 miles above Melama are now up there erecting houses upon the lands.

The saw-mill business in that section promises to be a profitable one. A number of Albany men propose to take in a mill of large capacity in the near future. The building of the road promises to add materially to the trade of Albany, and when it is pushed across the mountains next season to tap the great stock raising, agricultural and wool growing country of Eastern Oregon, this increase in the trade will be still more marked, and when the eastern connection is finally made, which promises now to be at no distant day, the full advantages of this important transportation route will be realized, at this city.

Amos Harvey in Danes for Giving Liquor to a Squaw.

The particulars of the arrest of Amos Harvey, of this city, for giving liquor to Indians was published in the Herald a few days ago. He was examined before U. S. Commissioner Paul Deady at Portland Friday. The Evening Telegram gives this account of his trial:

The direct charge was that he gave some alcohol to a squaw, because he thought it would cure her cold; but the law does not recognize merely as a figure in crime; hence his arrest. Harvey is one of the most wretched excusers for a man that has ever appeared in the criminal courts of this city. He has used morphine so long that his body is full of the deadly drug, and in his defense he stated that he gave the woman the alcohol while he was under the influence of morphine. He said to the court that he had to inject the poison into his flesh several times a day or he would die, and that he often took it in such quantities that he became crazed.

Messrs. Frank and George Cook, of Albany, for whom he worked, testified to his giving the dusky maiden the liquor, but said he was a good worker when he chose to apply himself, and that his only fault was the morphine habit, and that while he used that he was liable to commit any crime.

Commissioner Deady did not doubt but the crime was done while he was under the influence of some narcotic, but that would not clear him in the eyes of the law, so he held the prisoner to answer in the United States district court.

A Portland Druggist Killed by an Overdose of Morphine.

FRANK MILLER, a druggist, accidentally took an overdose of morphine about 2 o'clock this afternoon. Frank Miller, clerk, to a Telegram reporter furnished the following information: "I had been working for Mr. Breck some time ago, but quit last evening I stroided into the drug store, and Mr. Breck asked me how I would like to work for him a day or two, and I said very well. The moment I replied he took up his hat and, with a friend, Charles H. Ford, went down town. When he left the store I did not observe anything peculiar in his conduct. He and Ford returned to the store at about 10 o'clock and went up stairs. Before leaving Mr. Breck said to me: 'You need not bolt the door on the Fifth street side, because I may want to get in.' That was the last I saw of him, but I have since learned that he and Ford returned to the store between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning, when Breck swallowed something that he took from a shelf from behind the prescription counter. Ford, of course, did not know what it was. They went down street again, and a short distance from the store Breck fell down. Ford got a hack and had his friend taken to the Holton house."

Ford called at Breck's room a little later and observed that the latter was breathing heavily and that he did not look natural. He telephoned to Dr. Watkins, who promptly responded. Upon his arrival at the hotel the physician at once took the condition of Breck, stating that he had taken some narcotic poison, and that it was too late to effectually use the stomach pump.

APPOINTED MINISTER.

Perry Belmont, of New York Will Represent the U. S. in Spain.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Representative Perry Belmont, of the First New York district, has been tendered and accepted the appointment of United States minister to Spain, to succeed J. L. M. Curry, resigned. Belmont will at once forward to the governor of New York his resignation as representative, in order that his place may be filled by a special election. His resignation as a member of the house will cause a vacancy in the committee on foreign affairs, of which he is chairman.

TRAGEDY AT WALLA WALLA.

A Man Found Mysteriously Murdered and Horribly Mutilated.

WALLA WALLA, W. T., Nov. 17.—Ye olde city rung at four o'clock to-day. McKelney found the body of Toos, W. Davis alongside of the O. R. & N. R. R. track near the Blalock farm, about three miles below the city. The head was almost severed, as though with an ax. The vertebrae was broken and backed. When found the blood was yet fresh and the body warm. The body lay close to the rail. It was evidently a murder. The man had recently been discharged from the hospital here and had been working for Niles & Vinson. No knife or implement was found near. His overcoat was badly torn. The coroner went down and got the body last night and an inquest was held this morning.

OURAGE IN PORTLAND.

A Bell Boy Attacked and Savagely Beaten by Young Thieves.

PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—At 11 o'clock this morning Mrs. S. B. Hill, residing on Tenth and Morrison streets, sent a young bell boy down town to make a purchase for which she gave him a small sum of money. When he reached the corner of West Park and Morrison streets a youth about 12 years of age came up behind him and struck him on the back of the neck, knocking him down. The latter was reinforced by two more young thieves, and the trio robbed the bell boy first and then kicked and beat him unmercifully.
