THE COWS BEST GO.

The Cow Question Likely to Form an Issue at the Coming City Election.

On every side the sentiment is freely expressed that the cow nuisance in Albany ought to be abolished, and that candidates ought to be elected who will favor the passage and enforcement of laws requiring all cows kept within the city limits to be kept up by their owners.

The existing ordinance on this subject requires owners to keep up their cows at night, but instead of allowing the authorities to take up and impound the bovines found running at large in violation of the ordinance, it requires the owners to be arrested instead of the cows, and the ordinance is practically without force or effect.

The feeling is abroad now that this evil and menace to the peace, quietude and good order of the city ought to be corrected, and that a favorable attitude on this question ought to form one of the requirements on the part of the aldermen who expect to meet with success at the polls at the city election. There probably will not be a distinct issue formed upon the question, for the reason that very few will oppose the enactment of such a law, but there seems to be a determination on the part of voters to support only such men for councilmen as are known to be in favor of measures ridling the city of the cow nuisance as it now exists.

A BOLD BAD MAN.

He Has Shaken His Boots and Acts Very Crazy.

An itinerant individual named James Toed was taken from the city jail yesterday morning and examined before the county court as to his sanity.

He had been arrested for attempting to break into the residence of Judge H. S. Strahan and acting in a violent and crazy manner. He attempted to break the door down, and when ordered away he refused, when Judge Strahan took a shot at him for the purpose of frightening him away, taking care not to hit him. This only made the fellow worse and he was finally led away by the police.

He was found to be simply suffering from delirium tremens, having been drinking to excess. He still remains in the county jail, where he was incarcerated, and will probably be arraigned on a charge of vagrancy.

As far back as 1885 steps were taken to have a monument erected to the memory of Col. J. B. Nesmith, says the Independence West side. The last legislature appropriated \$250 for the purpose. The monument has arrived and is being placed over his grave on the old home farm, near Derry, Polk county, but the state is not paying for it. The family is bearing the total expense and the sum appropriated, we understand, will not be drawn from the treasury. The reason is that the amount was so small as to scarcely be worth applying in the manner intended.

The monument is of marble and granite and is sixteen feet high with a polished base covering sixteen square feet. It will mark the last resting place of one of Oregon's noblest pioneers and one whose hand was ever ready to take hold of any public measure which promised advantage and advancement to the state of Oregon.

Brothers Shoot Each Other.

The Baker City Democrat furnishes the following account of a body duel between two brothers: "A horrible duel between the Hutehinson brothers took place at Blackfoot last week. A feud has existed between the two brothers, John and James, for some time. James had threatened to shoot John on sight, and that afternoon they met in a billiard hall. Both pulled their revolvers and began firing simultaneously. Four shots were exchanged and John turned and ran down the street, the blood streaming from a wound in the side of his neck. James fell to the floor on his face, while the blood streamed out of a ghastly wound in the right temple, the ball came out at the base of the brain, which oozed out through the hole made.

STRUCK BY THE COW-CATCHER.

A Man at Yaquina City Narrowly Escapes Death on the Track.

A gentleman from Yaquina states that on Saturday evening a man named Thomas Little was walking on the track near Yaquina City when he was struck by the cow-catcher of a passing train. He was thrown over against a side track, striking upon his head, the man was picked up and taken to the Yaquina City hotel. He was at first thought to be killed, but he soon recovered having apparently been only stunned, and in a short time afterwards was seen on the street gloriously drunk. It was to say the least a narrow escape. It is thought he had been drinking before he was struck and was too drunk to get off of the track. If the train had not been moving at a slow rate of speed he would doubtless have been killed.

Presidential Postoffice.

A list has been prepared at the postoffice department which shows that the commissions of eighty presidential postmasters appointed by President Arthur will expire between now and the end of Cleveland's term. The list includes every state in the Union. Those from Oregon and Washington territory are Salem and Vancouver.

COAST NOTES.

Over 1000 men are employed on the Oregon Pacific above Mehama. Dwelling houses are in great demand in Baker City, and rents are enormous, bringing 20 per cent. on all investments in this kind of property.

Ed Barry, the brakeman who was so badly injured during the collision near Blue Mountain station, and was given up to die, has fully recovered.

The schooner Una, that was so badly burned at Gardiner, has been repaired at a cost of about \$4000 and has gone to San Pedro with lumber from Coos.

All the shares in the La Grande creamery enterprise have been taken. The grounds, building and machinery will cost \$7500, which amount is subscribed in shares of \$100 each.

Mr. Chamee Cole died at the residence of his son, Dr. J. W. Cole, in Astoria, last Monday night and was buried Wednesday. Mr. Cole was born in Erie county, Pennsylvania, in 1812. He came to Oregon in 1852, where he has since resided.

A Mrs. Reynolds died in Cove, Union county, last Saturday, who was perhaps the largest woman on the Pacific coast. Her weight was 450 pounds. It required for her interment a coffin seven feet long, three feet high and four feet wide. It was said that she was a sister of the "big woman" with sells Bros. circus.

The survivors of the Astoria & South Coast Railroad Company on Friday completed the work of taking soundings across Young's bay, and have returned to the city. Plans and specifications of the trestle work and draw bridge to be constructed across the bay will be next in order, to be submitted to the secretary of war for his approval as the law directs.—Astorian.

R. M. Riner, the Portland contractor, was in Salem Friday for the purpose of examining the specifications of the street railway line, with a view to making a bid on the same. He met with the directors of the road, and after hearing their plans and looking over the proposed line of the road, he gave it as his judgment of the matter that the enterprise would be a paying one.
