STATE DISPATCHES.

Newspapers from the State Capital—District Teachers' Institute.

Special to the HERALD. SALEM, Nov. 20.—Wm. R. Daly, a one year man from Multnomah county, for criminal assault on a girl in Portland last spring, was released from the penitentiary today, having completed his term.

Hon. Warren Truitt, president of the board of directors of the La Creole academy at Dallas, has called a meeting of the board for next Saturday, to discuss the advisability of erecting a new building for the school.

The work of placing a hydraulic passenger and freight elevator in the capitol building was completed today. The contractor, Capt. Gilman, of Portland, turned the work over to the board of building commissioners today.

John Smith, a half-breed Indian, who was serving out a 12-year sentence from Wasco county, for manslaughter, had his sentence commuted by death today. He was about 25 years of age and died of consumption.

George Myton, who died at the penitentiary yesterday, was decently buried today upon money furnished by his relatives in the East. The officers of the prison followed the remains to the L. O. O. F. cemetery, where they were interred, under an appropriate service, conducted by Rev. Anslem Brown.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction McElroy has called the annual institute for the Second judicial district to meet in Corvallis, Benton county, December 26, 27 and 28. The leading educators of Marion, Polk and Linn counties are expected to be present and cooperate with those residing in the jurisdiction of the Second district in making the institute a success.
