MUST SETTLE FOR \$60,000.

His Litigation Against the Oregon Pacific Railroad Compromised and Settled. Oregonian. It has been known for several days that negotiations looking toward the settlement of Contractor G. W. Hunt's suit against the Oregon Pacific railroad were pending.

The law firm of Williams & Wood, conducted the negotiations for their client, Mr. Hunt, while Whalley, Bromough & Northrop looked out for the interests of the Oregon Pacific. Thursday the compromise was effected.

Mr. Hunt accepts a check for \$60,000 for his claim against the company and another for \$5073 to cover the costs of the suit. Both are drawn on the banking firm of Ladd & Tilton and bear the signature of Hamilton, Job & Co., of Corvallis.

After Mr. Hunt annulled his contract with the Oregon Pacific last winter, the compromise began suit against him in Albany for \$150,000. He defended the suit and was recently awarded judgment for \$76,000. He has consented to settle for \$60,000. That is more than the work amounted to. It was worth about \$2,000. After the Oregon Pacific had filed suit against Mr. Hunt at Albany he began another suit in the state circuit court in Portland for \$160,000, of which \$80,000 was claimed for work and \$80,000 for damages.

This suit has been transferred to the United States circuit court, Mr. Hunt having become a citizen of Ohio. The probabilities are that this suit will be dismissed, now that a settlement has been made. HISTORY OF THE LITIGATION. A little history of this litigation might be of interest at this time.

Mr. Hunt held the contract to build fifty miles of the Oregon Pacific line, beginning at a point forty miles east of Albany. Nelson Bennett's contract called for the building of the forty miles between Albany and the western end of Mr. Hunt's work. On the 13th of last December both contractors annulled their agreement, discharged their men and suspended work.

Mr. Hunt said that he had taken this course because he had received no money for four months and could get no satisfaction from the company as to when he would be paid; that he had been dealt with unfairly. Both gentlemen stated they were induced to take the contract from the company on the positive assurance that it had \$2,000,000 in the treasury, with \$800,000 more available; that it had 100 miles of steel rails in Francisco.

On the 29th of December, Mr. Bennett set the legal ball in motion by suing the Oregon Pacific in the state circuit court in Portland, for \$551,825, of which \$201,825 was claimed as balance due for work performed, \$150,000 for decreased valuation of his plant, by reason of the abandonment of the contract and \$200,000 for damages. Mr. Hunt followed by instituting suit for \$160,000. Mr. Bennett's suit is still pending in part 1 state circuit court.

In connection with the Hunt settlement it was stated that steps were being taken to compromise the Bennett suit. A BRAKEMAN'S TERRIBLE FALL. Knocked from the Train on the Bridge at Jefferson—He Falls Many Feet. SALEM, Nov. 23.—As this morning's freight was coming down from Albany, and was nearing Jefferson, an accident occurred which may result in the death of Brakeman VanRankin.

The train was in full motion and VanRankin was between two cars examining the bulk-heads. He swung out and started to mount the train. At just this moment the train was passing over the bridge, and as he started up the ladder he was struck by the timbers of the bridge and knocked to the solid rock twenty-five feet below.
