Examined 250,000 Acres. The land examiners of the Willamette Valley and Cascade Mountain Wagon Road Company have about completed the examination of the entire grant with the exception of a few thousand acres of heavy timberland in the Buck mountain in Grant county.

Miller is seventeen years of age, and was on trial for the murder of a boy named Elmer Wright, at Mill Four last May. He will receive sentence on Friday at 2 o'clock.

Word came here last night that a man named Leathers was run over at Harrisburg on yesterday evening by the freight train, and killed.

On last Friday at Jefferson bridge Mart Van Rankin of this place had the misfortune to fall from a box car. He received a good many bruises, and his right leg was broken above the knee.

John Swartz, son of H. Swartz, and brother of Mrs. John Lawrence was killed on last Thursday on the Siuslaw while out hunting. He was in company with Frank and George Montgomery, and they had seen a bear when one of the Montgomery boys shot at it, and the bullet glanced and passed through the body of Swartz killing him instantly.

The firm of Millard Shurtleff and Kitridge, who recently established themselves here seem to be doing a good business. They are advertising a great deal of land and are inducing strangers to stop here. This is a step in the right direction as there is large tracts of valuable land in this vicinity that ought to be divided up into smaller farms and improved.

Work on the North Jetty.

Arrangements for beginning work on the north jetty at Yaquina bay are well along toward completion. Wharf privileges at Newport are being negotiated for where barges can land for the work. From the wharf a railway is to be constructed around the beach to the end of the jetty, and the right of way for this is to be secured. The old light house property the point beyond Newport has been ordered turned over to the engineers by the lighthouse board. The jetty will run out 2300 feet, which will bring the ends of the two jetties opposite each other, and there will be an entrance between them 1000 feet wide.

The Presidential Electors.

According to the new law the presidential electors will not meet at the state capital until January 14th at 12 m., instead of on Dec. 5th as heretofore stated. On the above mentioned day C. W. Fulton, William Kapus and Robert McLean, presidential electors for Oregon, will meet in Salem and proceed to vote by ballot for president and vice-president of the United States. They will also select from their number one to act as messenger to Washington. It is needless to say that they will cast their votes for Harrison and Morton.

Returned from Washington.

J. H. Burkhardt and wife returned yesterday from Washington. Mr. Burkhardt says he put in one month's faithful work for the government, but he did not relish a \$100 salary in a city where it costs \$1500 a year to live. He says there are many vacant clerkships which go begging because the salary is too small. He will go to California, and thinks some of locating in that state. He returned via New York and says the streets of that city are as muddy as those of Albany.
