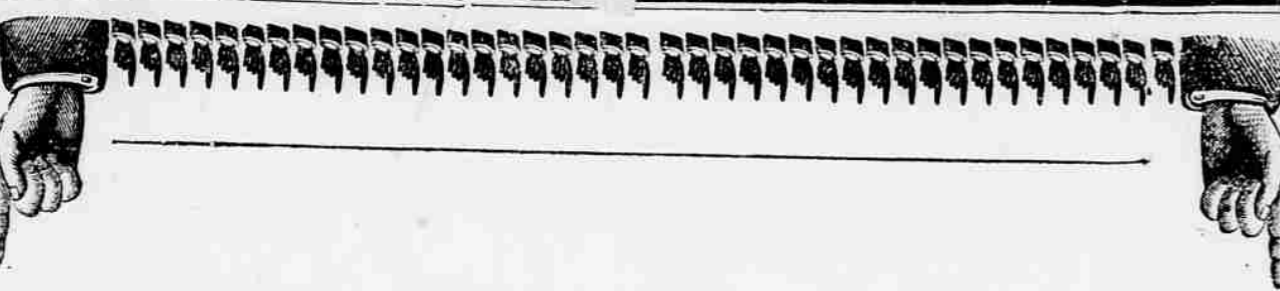

### GENERAL NEWS.

#### Disastrous Railway Disaster on the Lakeport Road.

#### A VOTE ON THE TARIFF BILL.

#### England Wants £10,000,000 To Increase Her Navy—The Suit Against the Sugar Monopoly.

THE Heralds Special Dispatches. YOUNGSTOWN (N. J.), Dec. 5.—This morning on the Lakeport road a mixed passenger train collided with a freight, while both were running forty miles an hour. Conductor James Kennedy of the passenger was instantly killed. James McCoy, fireman, and Patrick Riley, brakeman, were fatally injured. Albert Lindsay, an engineer, was badly hurt. Both engines and ten cars were wrecked.

### THE SUGAR TRUST.

#### The Case of the People Against the Big Sugar Monopoly.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The case of the people against the North River Sugar Refinery Company was continued this morning. Jas. C. Carter, counsel for the defense, continued his argument. He said the combination of the sugar refining companies was not intended as a monopoly for the manufacture of sugar, but was for the purpose of increasing the price of sugar. Sugar, he said, was a commodity limited only by inability to manufacture raw material, which is unlimited in supply, and all that was required for its manufacture was capital and labor. There were other commodities that were by nature restricted in supply, and a combination to control the supply for the purpose of increasing the value might come under a charge of violation of the law. Sugar is not a necessity of life, although bought much by people all over the globe, it might be nearly so considered.

### THE SENATE BILL.

#### A Motion to Lay It Over Defeated by a Strict Party Vote.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—When the tariff bill was taken up in the Senate, it was moved to lay on the table the amendment to the house bill proposed by the committee on finance, which is the whole senate bill, and demanded yeas and nays. The motion was rejected by a strict party vote. Yeas 19, nays 26.

### A MODEST LOAN.

#### England Only Wants £10,000,000 to Strengthen Her Navy.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Raymond Heath, conservative, yesterday said that he believed that the government would at the next session of parliament ask for a loan of £10,000,000, to be devoted to strengthening the navy.

### THE INDIANA BANK ROBBERY.

#### President Lucas Recovering Some of the Stolen Money.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 5.—President Lucas, of the First National Bank, of Columbus, Indiana, who was recently robbed of a large amount of money by William Schruder, his book-keeper, is in the city in search of some of the plunder. Lucas came from Windsor, Ontario, where he made a settlement with Schruder and secured a memorandum of the places where he disposed of his ill-gotten gains. Schruder arrived in this city Friday and placed \$189,000 in securities in the Merchant's Exchange Bank. He then went to Wauksha, Windsor, and placed \$4500 in the Wauksha National bank, after which he skipped to Canada. President Lucas secured the Wauksha money yesterday, and this morning the Merchant's Exchange bank delivered over the bulk of the plunder. Lucas is on his way to Chicago, where he expects to add \$6500 from some Chicago bank. Schruder has been given freedom from prosecution.

### AT WASHINGTON.

#### Newsy Comments from the Herald's Correspondent.

### DISCUSSION ABOUT THE CABINET.

#### Another Pocket Veto Against the Rights of Settlers—The Political Axe Continues to Fall.

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE. WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Senator Quay has increased the enmity of all the democrats, and a few nabby party republicans because he has decided to make a fight in the courts for the electoral vote of Virginia which he believes honestly belongs to the republicans. The vote of Virginia is not necessary, but it belongs to the republicans he desires that they should have it. That's all there is about it, and good citizens everywhere should give him their moral support in his efforts to secure an honest count of the vote cast in Virginia. Honest men never fear the most rigid investigation, in the courts or elsewhere of their actions. It is impossible to see Mr. Cleveland or any member of his cabinet just now, no matter how important your business is. They are all engaged in making up their reports for Congress. These reports will also it is said, include a general resume of the stewardship of the democratic administration, made up of course, from a strictly democratic standpoint.

The President did not sign a bill which was sent to him in the last days of the last session of Congress. The bill permitted persons who have abandoned and relinquished their homestead entries to make another entry. The measure was got through the senate and house and sent to the president, but he allowed it to fail of becoming a law for want of his signature. Senator Dohp proposes to re-introduce the bill and secure its passage, if possible, through the senate at an early day.

The administration evidently intends to wield the decapitation axe very lively during the short time left to it. On Saturday Mr. C. W. Vickery, superintendent of the third division, railway mail service with headquarters in this city, was requested to resign in order that his place might be filled by a democrat. Mr. Vickery has been in the mail service twenty-one years, and has long been known as one of the most capable officials connected with the services. He began as a clerk and won his promotion by his efficiency. No charge of any kind has ever been brought against him. He was compelled to resign simply because he was a republican, and yet the democrats have the cheek to talk about a non-partisan civil service under Gen. Harrison.

Vice-President elect Morton surprised his many friends in this city by paying us an entirely unheralded visit last week. While here he was the guest of his sister Mrs. Hobson. His purpose in coming here is to have a look at an immense apartment house, which he is having built in this city. He refused to talk about the probable policy of the coming administration to the newspaper reporters, but to his intimate friends he showed no such reticence. He says that no date has yet been fixed for the visit of himself and Mrs. Morton to Gen. and Mrs. Harrison at Indianapolis, but intimates that they will go at an early date. He does not think that he will take a house in this city until next winter, though he expects to remain here a month or so after the inauguration.

No republican has ever black-guarded Cleveland to the extent indulged in by the returning democratic congressmen. They have absolutely no pity on him, and are not willing to allow that he has even a single redeeming point in his entire ascension. Cabinet speculation continues to be the popular pastime here. Now that about every available name has been mentioned the know-alls are somewhat at a loss, but they kill time by rearranging the names. General Harrison's proposed visit to this city is off, he having decided not to come here before his inauguration. Republicans here are much disappointed.
