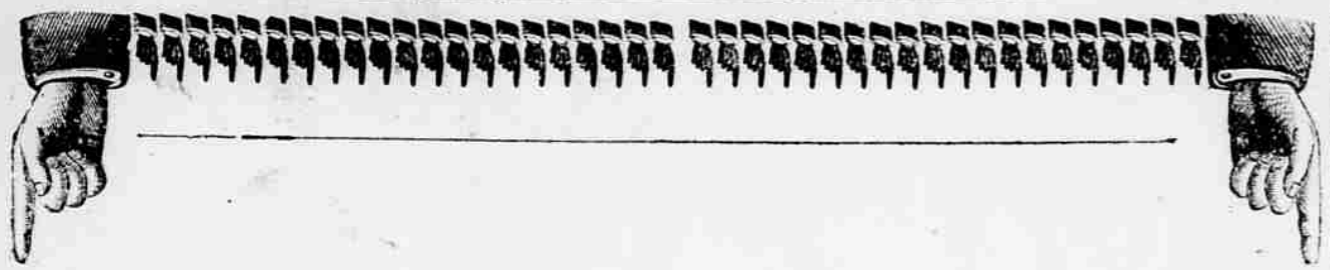

## GENERAL NEWS.

Proposals for Constructing Coast Defense Vessels.

**ONE THOUSAND REBELS KILLED.**  
The Dominion Government Will Aid the Sufferers from the Storm—Eastern and Foreign News.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Proposals were invited to-day by the secretary of the navy for the construction of armored coast defense vessels of 4000 tons exclusive of armament. Bids are to be opened on the 20th of February.

**DEVASTATING STORMS.**  
The Dominion Government to Aid the Sufferers from the Storm.

QUEBEC, Dec. 20.—The most serious consequences from the storms are following back the country villages. Crops have been bad and are hemmed in by snow. Many of the families are suffering for the actual necessities of life. Farmers are killing their stock. Cardinal Tassicherean and the premier have been appealed to. They held a consultation with the cabinet last evening and it was decided to ask the government to send immediate aid to the sufferers.

**A BRITISH VICTORY.**  
They Fight and Kill Thousand Egyptian Rebels.

SUEZ, Dec. 20.—The combined forces of the British and Egyptians made an attack yesterday upon the rebel position. They stormed the rebel trenches, and after a brilliant engagement lasting half an hour drove them from their position. The rebels reported the loss of a thousand killed. The British loss is light. The British have encamped in the rebel position. The victory was complete.

**Electric Lights for Vancouver.**  
VANCOUVER BARRACKS, (W. T.), Dec. 20.—At a special meeting of the city council last night a contract was entered into with a California electric light company for a plant of 45 light of 1200 candle power at a cost of \$8400. The plant will be in operation by Feb. 1st. sold for \$30,000.

## THE WOMEN OF MAHARATTA.

Lovely Beings Who Are Perfect Daughters, Wives and Mothers.

Sir George Birdwood, in an article in the Asiatic Quarterly Review, draws the following picture of the Maharatta women:—  
The Cut-pavan women are the most refined type of feminine loveliness, and in the sweetness, grace and dignity of their high-bred beauty—at once modern in its exquisite delicacy and antique in its fearless freedom—they might well be taken for the Greek originals of the Tanagra "figurines" awakened to a later life among the tropical gardens and orchards and coconut groves of the Southern Konkani.  
One never wearies of watching them, as seen in the dewy morning in their gardens, perambulating in archaic worship, the altar of Holy (tuasi, Ocyum sanctum) placed before every Hindoo house or of an afternoon as they pass, in fetching water, to and from the riverside, or the lotus-laden tank of the village temple, all in flowing robes of cotton, or shalwar, white, or dyed a single color, pink, scarlet, black, green, or primrose yellow, presenting as they move along the red laterite trails in the deepening shadows of the trees, and illuminated across the blue sea by the side-long rays of the declining sun, the richest aromatic effects, with the bright gleam of a glowing Turmer or a Gladiolus.  
And the cut-pavans do not but faithfully mirror the innate virtues of their pure and gentle natures; for they are perfect daughters, wives and mothers, the severly disciplined self-sacrificing Hindoo ideal—the idea also of Solomon, I know, and St. Paul remaining unchangeably true to the proper sphere of their duties, unknown beyond their families, and seeking in the happiness of their children their greatest pleasure, and in the reverence of their husbands the amaranthine crown of woman's truest glory.

**THE ASTORIA RAILWAY.**  
Secretary Manning, of the board of trade, received a letter to-day from E. C. Holden, secretary of the Astoria & South Company, saying that at a meeting of the board of directors Monday night the letter from the Salem board of trade was placed before them and fully discussed. He was instructed to say in reply that the A. & S. C. board will now be pleased to confer with any delegation the Salem board may send on the subject of connecting a road from Salem with the Astoria & South Coast road at Tillamook.

The date of the conference was left to the convenience and pleasure of the Salem board. It is very likely that a delegation will be sent to the conference held at Astoria immediately after the holiday season. An effort will be made to make the road an assured fact.

**SALEM'S STREET CARS ARRIVED.**  
The cars for the Salem street railway arrived here to-day and were housed in the company's stables. The iron for the track has not arrived yet but is expected daily. The road will be in operation by Jan. 1st.

**FOSTER WOMAN'S DEATH.**  
Mrs. Harrison Brunk, wife of a well-known pioneer, died at her home near Eola, Polk county, last night, aged about 70 years. She was a member of the Waller family and came to Oregon in the forties.

THE STATE WILL RECEIVE \$75,000.  
A direct tax bill which is now in the hands of the president will bring \$5,125,42 into the state treasury, providing it is not vetoed. This is to reimburse the state for moneys furnished the general government to carry on the civil war. Claims prepared by the secretary of state during the current year for indemnity expenses incurred by the state during the Indian war of 1877-78, are now being considered by the war department and the state will probably receive about \$40,000 from the general government upon the final settlement. John Mullan, agent for the state of Oregon at Washington, has informed Secretary McBride that it is doubtful if this claim will be audited in time for the appropriation during the present session of congress, so it will not be available before June, 1890.
