### ALBANY'S WATERR POWER. Description and History of the Santiam Canal.

Albany has the best supply of water for manufacturing purposes of any town in the valley. This water is obtained from the Santiam river, which is one of largest water courses ALBANY COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE. of this part of the state. The stream empties its waters into the Willamette, below the city of Albany, and is The Public Schools of the City - The Cathnavigable for a distance inland of about twelve miles from its mouth.

The Santiam makes a more rapid descent as it nears the end of its course than does the Willamette, and the result is that the stream furnishes an abundant supply of water for all inland fifteen miles or more from its mouth. The availability of this supply was early brought to the attention of the large property owners of Alpleting this important work was far in excess of the first estimates, and the result was that a loan of \$35,000 | was affected by the promoters of the scheme with Mr. John Crawford, one of the leading capitalists of the valley. On the completion of the important piece of work the company had become so heavily indebted to Mr. Crawford that ne was compelled to take the completed job off the company's hands and he is to-day the ewner of this tine water supply.

The water of this river is brought to Albany by means of a canal, which tops the Santiam river at a point fourteen miles east of the city. The topography of the country so favored its construction that the canal is practically straight, it having been found necessary to make no long detours whatever. This canal is twenty feet wide at the bottom and is three feet deep. There is a uniform fall for for most of the diatance from the Santiam river to Albany of four feet; to the mile. The former branch furnishes a head of thirty-two feet, while the branch emptying into the main river gives a working head of thirty-six feet.

The importance of this power to the town will be appreciated when it is stated that the capacity of the canal is 20,000 running feet per minute. From the point in the city limits where the west branch of the canal empties into the Calipooia, tthe point of the junction of the canal with the Willamette is a distance of over a mile, and for this entire intervening distance the banks of the Willamette are high, affording excellent sites for manufacturing purposes. At any point within these working read uf from 25 to 35 feet of water can be obtained from this conal, and even beyond the lower mouth of the canal water can be carried down the river for a distance of at least one-half mile further, and this water can be made equally as available for the purposes of manufacture. In addi ion to these splendid opportunities for obtaining the best of wa er power within the limits of the city for atmanufacturing purposes desired, at a point a quarter of a mile south of Albany there is a fall in the same cana known as Elkin's falls that furnishe a power of 200 horse. It is perhapunnecessary to state that but a small proportion of this large and available water power is used to-day, and i can be further stated that should occasion ever demand it, the flow of this stream can be easily doubled thus supplying the city of Albany a power from this source that would run any desired number of factories

This canal is one of the best reg ulated water supplies in the Uni en States. The flow of water is regulated by means of gotes at the head o the canal, and this flow is at all times uniform. Even during the freshet of the winter months, when all the other streams are overflowing their banks, the water of this canal is running along in the even tenor of 15 way, not disturbed in the least by the high stage of water in the main stream

The steady current of the water in this stream prevents it from freezing even during the most severe winters. and it never gets outside of its banks. This canal can be utilized for the purpose of floating logs or merchandisc down to Albany from the Santiam. water.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The public school building, con-

structed in 1885, is a fine two-story structure with ten rooms, and a basement, which, together with the spacious grounds, occupy an entire block in the central portion of the city. The building is heated and furnished after the most modern and approved methods, and accommodation is afforded for 600 students. School is taught nine months in the year, the average attendance being 364 during the past year. The public school is graded by an excellent system and the expenses for running the same is maintained from the public school fund of the county, and by an ananal tax, so that it is free to all children living in the district. 




