LOCAL NEWS.

Lively Litigation Over the Santiam Mining Dispute.

NEWS IN AND ABOUT THE CITY.

A Stranger Found Insensible on the Street - A Case With a History Intertwined With Pioneer Reminiscences.

The result of the Santiam mining claim dispute between Messrs. Woodin, Rhodes, Strong, Massey & Co. and Dr. E. O. Smith, which was begun by the arrest and trial of Henry Massey for burglary, in removing ore from the disputed claim was decided in Lyonsville last Saturday by Justice Lyons holding the defendant to appear before the next grand jury, which simply means that the real litigation comes up on issue in the circuit court. Mr. Wolverton, attorney for Mr. Smith, received a telegram yesterday announcing that M. V. Bilyeu had also been arrested and will be tried this week. Some lively litigation is promised over the matter, and the Albany men say they will make a vigorous fight if necessary for the claim, which is thought to be valuable.

The New Councilmen Who Will Take Their Seats Next Monday Evening.

Next Monday the regular annual meeting of the city council will be held for the purpose of swearing in the newly elected city officers.

The retiring members are Councilmen W. C. Read, John Hoffman and J. O. Whitson. The council will stand for the ensuing year as follows: Mayor, unchosen, J. L. Cowan; Councilmen, first ward, B. F. Taber and F. M. French; second ward, Julius Gradwohl and C. G. Burkhardt; third ward, Virgil Parker and L. W. Doyce. Wm. A. Humphrey will succeed F. L. Kenton as city treasurer, and John Hoffman will succeed Isaac Hays as marshal. The city council for the year 1889 is composed of enterprising, progressive men, and good things ought to be expected from their administration of the city's affairs.

OREGON HEARD FROM.

A Case With a History Intertwined With Pioneer Reminiscences of the State.

In 1853 Dr. J. L. Hill, of Albany crossed the plains in an ox wagon taking six months to make the trip. He had not since been east of the Rockies until two years ago this winter, when he took a business trip through some of the eastern and southern states, making the journey in five and one half days that once took six months. While east he found many things to enjoy and admire, but on his return he said there was but one Oregon, and that was the garden spot of America, and he wanted his share of it. To prove his "faith by his good works" he added two more farms to his possessions in the Willamette valley, and declared himself a permanent fixture of Linn county. The late W. H. McFarland, who was also a firm believer in Oregon's future prosperity, while on a trip to the southern part of the state went out on the heights of Jackson county, and cut an elegant manzanita stick, or Oregon mahogany as it is sometimes called, which he presented to the doctor as a token of friendship, knowing that the recipient's enthusiasm for his own state would add greatly to his appreciation of the gift. Mr. G. L. Blackman, one of the leading business men of this city, who came here a few years since from the east, is also an enthusiast on Oregon, and likes to shake hands with any one who enjoys life here as he does. Recently he borrowed Dr. Hill's cane to take a spin around a block, and when he returned the cane it was fully mounted with an elegant heavy gold crook for the hand appropriately inscribed "Christmas 1888. Dr. J. L. Hill by G. L. Blackman, Oregon, the land we love." We are not informed whether the massive gold head was dug from Oregon's gold mines, but naturally suppose it was for our mines are numerous and rich. From beginning to end this was a most appropriate affair, and one that all parties concerned in enjoyed, because their feelings respecting "the land we love" was a unit to the greatest degree. Mr. McFar-

land has since been laid to rest in the land he loved last.

If immigrants desiring to know what Oregon is will call on Mr. Blackman or Dr. Hill, they will hear no cross-back talk. They will receive facts and figures that will soon be proven to the lasting gratification of all who live in Oregon for Oregon's good.

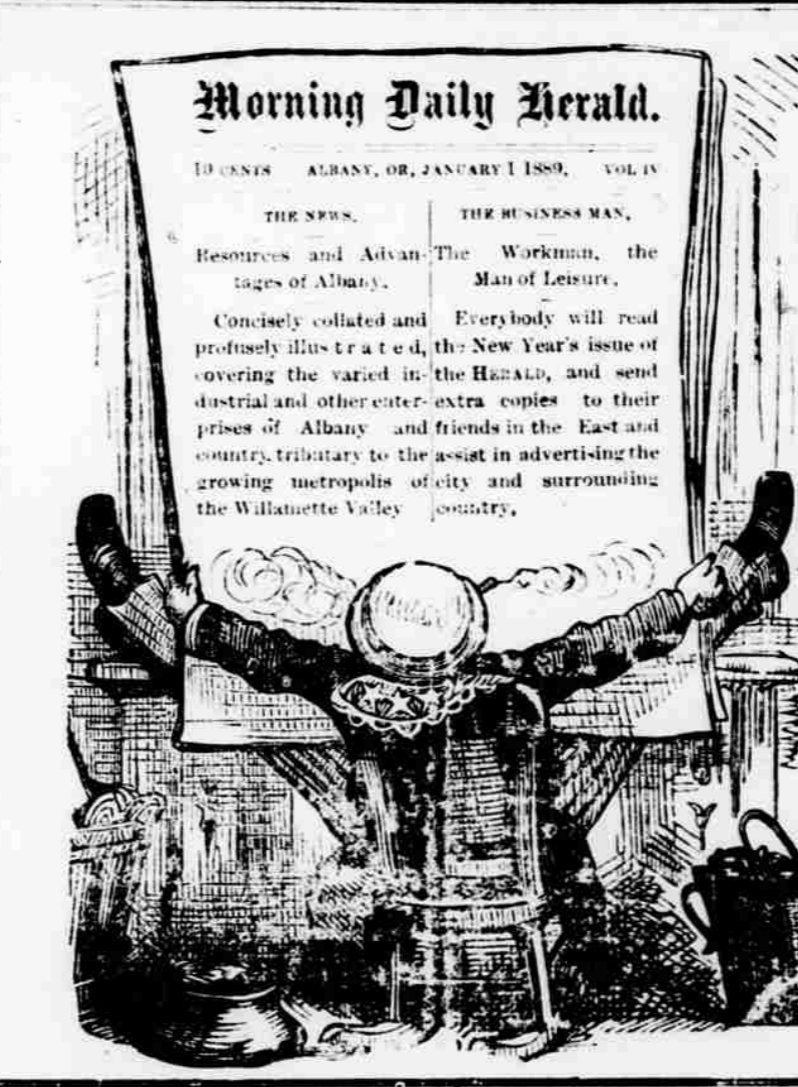
