The Congregational Church.

Increasing Business.

Like all other business in Albany the postoffice business during the past twelve months shows a marked increase over the previous year. The gross receipts during 1888 were \$5,389.26, the same for 1887 being \$4,653.69, showing an increase of \$735.57.

Leading Counties.

Grant county has the largest number of horses and mules of any county in Oregon, 16,825, and also leads in cattle with 47,118. Crook county has the most sheep, with 221,765. Lane county has the largest number of hogs, 7,624. Multnomah county has the most property, of course, and the greatest indebtedness, also. Multnomah has the smallest indebtedness, \$107,325. Unadilla county has \$1,702,683 in money, notes, accounts and mortgages and ranks second in none but Multnomah. Linn county ranks first in value of land, her assessment in dirt being \$4,594,258. Multnomah county stands first in the value of town lots and Marion comes in next. The above figures are taken from the abstract of the assessmentrolls of the several counties for the year 1888.
