ALBANY AWAKE.

Will Build a Road to Astoria-Company Organized for That Purpose. Under the above headlines the Astorian of the 9th inst. says: The enterprising citizens of Albany are alive to the advantages to be derived from communication with the seaboard, and are looking this way, where they expect mutual co-operation in a matter that must redound to the common good.

The following dispatch was received yesterday afternoon: ALBANY, Jan. 8, 1889. Editor Astorian: An incorporated company of leading and wealthy citizens of Albany is being organized in this city for the purpose of building a railway line to Astoria. What is the feeling of the Astoria and South Coast Railway people concerning co-operating with the citizens of Albany in this undertaking? Answer.

DAILY HERALD. To this was sent the following reply, at 4 P. M.: ASTORIA, Jan. 8, 1889. Editor Daily Herald: The general feeling and desire of the people of Astoria and Clatsop county is for railroad connection with the Willamette valley and the ultimate object and intent of the Astoria & South Coast Railway Co. is to build on to reach such a connection. While not authorized to speak for the company, it is certain that the company is favorably disposed to such railroad co-operation. A communication from your Albany company to the board of directors of the Astoria company would doubtless receive prompt and favorable consideration. The company advertises this morning for bids for grading ten miles of track south of Skipanon, heading toward Tillamook.

J. F. HALLOMAN. Astoria sends greeting to Albany and hopes at no distant day Oregon's seaport will be connected by rail with that and other lines stretching eastward.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

Articles of Incorporation Filed Salem's Street Railway. SALEM, Jan. 10.—Articles of incorporation were filed in the secretary of state's office today by the Salem, Tillamook & Astoria railway company; John C. Wright, J. W. Maxwell, B. S. Cook, W. F. Boothby, L. A. Manning, incorporators; capital stock \$100,000 in shares of \$100; the object is the building and operating of a railroad from Salem, via Tillamook, to Astoria. The principal office will be at Salem.

The Crown Point mining company, with Samuel Coulter, W. T. Hume and James F. Watson incorporating company, same incorporators. Capital stock of each company \$1,000,000. The principal office of each company will be in Portland.

The Shumagin Packing company, Frank M. Warren, Wm. D. Smith, Thos. N. Strong, incorporators; capital stock, \$30,000; principal office Portland. J. M. Upton, Coos; L. A. Manning, Marion; appointed notaries. Marion County Pomona grange, in session today, passed resolutions condemning the change in school books, and asking the legislature to arrest the proposed change and provide against such a possibility hereafter. Also resolutions favoring a law giving laborers the first lien on tools used and work done in railroad and other public improvements.

Work on the street railway is being pushed vigorously and cars will be running by next Tuesday. Men are working nights at the crossings under the electric lights to hasten completion.
