The flavor is equal to the raspberry, a very mild, rich sub-acid, pronounced by most people delicious. It may be served with sugar and cream or cooked winter use. It is splendid canned for sauce, and is used in a variety of flourishes in all soils and is a prolific bearer. It grows very stocky and makes a nice hedge. The shining dark green leaves and the blue fruit make a pleasing contrast. The demand for the fruit is great, and usually brings 15 cents per quart. #### Further Particulars of the Shooting Near Salem.

NAME OF THE MAN SHOT.

He Will Probably Recover—The Man Who Did the Shooting Not Yet Caught.—Supreme Court Cases.

Special to the Herald.] SALEM, Jan. 16.—The name of the man shot on the train near Gervais last night is Frank A. Avery, instead of Pearson, as given by himself. He still maintains he does not know who shot him, or for what it was done. There are few developments yet different from those already given, but officers are on the track of information that will clear up the mystery. Avery sat up all day and had his wounds dressed. He talks cheerfully, but nothing about himself. He says he is American by birth, and raised in California. The doctors have not yet taken out the bullet from his back. Walter Drennan is the name of the man spoken of in yesterday's dispatches, instead of Albert Glandon, as given. He is supposed to know something definite of the affair. The officers are reticent of their movements until further developments. The man who did the shooting has not been found.

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### CONVERTING THE HEATHEN.

#### A Hopeless Task for the Missionaries—Some Statistics.

As it is right to judge a tree by its fruit, so it is fair to judge of any undertaking by the results which it can show, and to measure the probability of its ultimate success by the magnitude of the task set before it. Some statistics recently compiled and set forth in a recent number of the Fortnightly Review, afford an opportunity to inquire into the actual results of the efforts of missionaries in what it pleases us to call the heathen lands; and also to measure with some degree of accuracy the probability of eventual success in converting "heathendom" to Christianity. The best attainable estimate places the "heathen" and Moslem population of Asia and Africa at 920,000,000 or even fifteen times the population of the United States.

Persons who have investigated the subject with great care estimate that the annual increase in this population by the excess of births is not less than twelve per 1000, which would give for the 920,000,000 an annual increase of 11,000,000. Now, the highest estimates which well-informed missionaries place upon the number of conversions annually is 60,000, and it is admitted that of these not a few reapse into heathenism. But supposing that they all remain steadfast, it will be seen that the increase in Christians is insignificant as compared with the net increase of population by birth. At the rate named it would take 183 years to convert one year's increase. To state it in another way, for every additional Christian there are 183 additional heathens and Moslems. It is evident that, as time goes on, if no better progress than this is to be made, while the actual number of converts to Christianity in heathendom will slowly increase, their relative number, as compared with the total of heathendom, will steadily and greatly decrease.

But it will be argued that this estimate does not take into account the fact that converts, and because of the better life which it causes them to lead, many are induced to follow their example. Unfortunately for this theory, it is by no means borne out by facts. The increase in happiness in a convert does not seem to be sufficiently conspicuous to be observed by the "heathen" in his blindness. Neither does it appear, on the testimony of the missionaries themselves, that the converts as a class do lead better lives than before conversion. On the contrary, it is noted in a great many cases that they learn European vices much more easily than Christian virtues, and in far too many cases the fact becomes apparent that conviction had very much less to do with conversion than the hope of some immediate advantage to be gained. Upon this question of the quality of the converts much evidence is adduced. A well known African traveler says that in many important districts there the missionaries, after twenty years of work, "can scarcely number in honest statistics twenty sincere converts. In other parts," he continues, "their religion is discredited by numbering among its adherents all the drunkards, liars rogues and unclean lives in the colony." Three years since, in a nominally Christian village, a quarrel broke out and not a few were killed. The victors cooked and ate bodies of the dead, and as a punishment, the pastor of the village, a native announced that they were "suspended from church privileges." And concerning the very native pastors, the men so confidently relied upon to spread the Gospel, not only by their preaching, but by their upright and virtuous lives, the same traveler says: "With a very few rare exceptions these native pastors, teachers and catechists, whom I have met have been all more or less bad men. They attempted to veil an unbridled immorality with an unblushing hypocrisy, and a profane display of mouth religion, which to an honest mind seemed even more disgusting than immorality itself."

A missionary of the Church Missionary Society in Bengal says: "I must confess that neither reader nor schoolmaster has much influence with the people. Both are in the habit of drinking." Of another village he says: "But it must be remembered that all these are counted as converts in missionary statistics."

It is unnecessary to question the honesty of purpose of the vast majority of those who are to day engaged in missionary labor. But it may fairly be questioned whether their labor is, in the main, of any avail, or whether its fruit, such as it seems to be, is on the whole good fruit. The cost is enormous, and the return, taking quality, is next to nothing. Unless it can be shown, after all these years of endeavor, that a comparatively large proportion of the relatively small number of conversions that have been made benefited the converts, made them happier and better, and it is safe to look upon the enterprise as a failure.

O'Brien's article in the United Ireland, for which he was summoned to appear before the court, exceeded a fair discussion of the case, but he admitted some force in O'Brien's argument regarding the continued circulation of the Times' pamphlets, and he said he believed that no disrespect was intended toward the court by the article, therefore he will not punish O'Brien. Future cases of a similar nature will be more severely treated.
