DESCRIPTION OF THE BLUEBERRY

The Blueberry is a valuable fruit and is reliable to grow in our Northern states, where the more tender varieties of fruits—Water-melon, etc.—is perfectly hardy, having stood 40 degrees below zero without showing any injury to the most tender buds. It ripens in this latitude about the 1st of July, and is borne in clusters like currants; shape, round; color, reddish purple at first, but becomes a bluish-black when fully ripened. The flavor is equal to the raspberry, a very mild, rich subacid, pronounced by most people delicious. It may be served with sugar and cream or cooked sauce, and is splendid for winter use. The plant seems to flourish best in the spring, and makes a nice hedge. The shining dark green leaves and the blue fruit making a pleasing contrast. The demand for the fruit is great, and it brings 15 cents per quart. They commence bearing the first year after setting out, and hold a full crop the second and third year. For setting out, they are propagated from suckers and root cuttings. The plant is about the height and size of a currant bush and very stocky, holding the fruit well up from the ground during March, April and May, in rows two or three feet apart, and five or six feet between the rows, making a perfect hedge, and no grass or weeds should be allowed to grow between rows.

GENERAL NEWS.

Newsy Notes From the National Capital.

THE SUSPENSION OF JUDGE SWAIN

Important Land Decision Rendered by the Secretary of the Navy—Foreign News.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Judge Advocate David G. Swain, under sentence of suspension from duty, appeared to-day before the army returning board for examination for retirement in obedience to an order by the secretary of war. Mr. Swain stated that he had requested the president to restore him to his former status, after which he would be willing, but he did not care to be examined before being pardoned. The physicians stated to the board that he had indications of kidney disease, which would unfit him for active duty, but asked for more time for investigation.

IMPORTANT DECISION.

The Secretary of the Interior Decides a Big Land Case.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The secretary of the interior has rendered a decision in the case of Jas. K. Martin, guardian for Calvin James, and the city of Cheyenne, Wyoming, vs. Francis Leon, which involved liens near Cheyenne, and is used for waterworks. The decision sustains that of the commissioner of the general land office, rejecting no land application, but leaves the claim of Cheyenne undetermined.

Bismarck III.

BERLIN, Jan. 17.—Bismarck is suffering indisposition in consequence of his exertion in the reichstag Tuesday.

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

What Governor Penneyer Says in His Message.

From the Governors Message.

This state institution has now an endowment of more than one hundred thousand dollars, the proceeds of the sale of the Agricultural college lands donated by the General Government to the state. It also receives \$15,000 per annum from the Federal government under the Hatch act. It has a commodious building, erected by the generosity of the citizens of Corvallis. All that is now needed to give it a fair start is to furnish it with necessary land for its farm. It would be proper therefore, for the legislature to appropriate \$10,000 for such a purpose. When this shall have been done, together with the abolition of free scholarships, the Agricultural college at Corvallis, like the State University at Eugene, will be able with frugal management to enjoy a prosperous existence, without being a perpetual pensioner upon the taxpayers of the state.

And the great fact should be impressed upon the legislature that it will be compelled, sooner or later, to choose between the alternative of supporting no higher schools at all than our common schools by taxation of the people, or that the number of such high schools, supported by tax, will be indefinitely increased. The people of other sections of the state will argue, and with justice, too, if high institutions of learning are supported by the public treasury at Corvallis and Eugene City, that it is no more than just or proper that normal schools should be supported by the public treasury in other cities in different parts of the state. This latter course would open the door of the treasury to an unlimited expenditure of money for the support of an unlimited number of unindustrial schools. The safe course to pursue is the just course. No general tax should be levied for the support of any school, but those of general benefit.

The fear that the state, which is now in possession of the Agricultural college building and grounds, may lose such possession is entirely without foundation. By authority of law the governor has accepted the college buildings and grounds for and in behalf of the state, and as such property is unalienable, and in the event of a change of title and possession, no suit can be maintained against the state in regard to it, because, as no statute of officer of the sovereign can regard the sovereign, so no court can have the jurisdiction (which word implies superiority of power) over the state requisite to oust the state from such possession. As no provision has been made by general law for bringing suit against the state, as might have been permitted under our state constitution, any party aggrieved by the state's possession of the Agricultural college will be compelled to appeal, as every other party having claims against the state must, to the legislature in order to persuade the sovereign to do that which no subject or officer of the state has power to compel it to do. If there be any justice in their demand the legislature should grant it; if there be none, it should deny it.

A WAR CLOUD.

Trouble Brewing Over the Samoan Difficulty.

STATEMENT OF NAVY SECRETARY

He Says It Now Rests with Congress Whether or Not War Shall Be Declared—Foreign Affairs.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Secretary Whitney says the state of affairs in the Pacific all hinge on the Samoan matter. It now rests with congress, which alone has the power to declare war.

The correspondence accompanying the president's message on Samoan affairs, which was laid before the 16th inst., discloses the fact that Germany has made a declaration of war against Samoa, and has entered official complaint against the United States because an American named Klein led the Samoan forces which killed twenty and wounded thirty of the German marines. Action by congress on the subject is expected. The German government also begs the United States to join in an active way to restore calm and quiet in the island. The American government disclaims any responsibility for Klein's action, claiming he was not nor never had been connected with the United States public service.

The correspondence also contains instructions to Admiral Kimberly, from Secretary Whitney, in which the latter says: "You will at once proceed to Samoa and extend full protection and defense to American citizens and property. You will protect against the subjugation and displacement of the native government of Samoa by Germany as in violation of the positive agreement and understanding between the treaty powers, but inform the representatives of the German and British governments of your readiness to cooperate in causing all treaty rights to be respected and in restoring peace and order on the basis of recognition of Samoan rights to independence, and you will inform your government as soon as possible after your arrival in Samoa of the condition of affairs and prospect of peaceful adjustment, and whether Germany posing forces when the late conflict occurred."

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

What Governor Penneyer Says in His Message.

From the Governors Message.

This state institution has now an endowment of more than one hundred thousand dollars, the proceeds of the sale of the Agricultural college lands donated by the General Government to the state. It also receives \$15,000 per annum from the Federal government under the Hatch act. It has a commodious building, erected by the generosity of the citizens of Corvallis. All that is now needed to give it a fair start is to furnish it with necessary land for its farm. It would be proper therefore, for the legislature to appropriate \$10,000 for such a purpose. When this shall have been done, together with the abolition of free scholarships, the Agricultural college at Corvallis, like the State University at Eugene, will be able with frugal management to enjoy a prosperous existence, without being a perpetual pensioner upon the taxpayers of the state.

And the great fact should be impressed upon the legislature that it will be compelled, sooner or later, to choose between the alternative of supporting no higher schools at all than our common schools by taxation of the people, or that the number of such high schools, supported by tax, will be indefinitely increased. The people of other sections of the state will argue, and with justice, too, if high institutions of learning are supported by the public treasury at Corvallis and Eugene City, that it is no more than just or proper that normal schools should be supported by the public treasury in other cities in different parts of the state. This latter course would open the door of the treasury to an unlimited expenditure of money for the support of an unlimited number of unindustrial schools. The safe course to pursue is the just course. No general tax should be levied for the support of any school, but those of general benefit.

The fear that the state, which is now in possession of the Agricultural college building and grounds, may lose such possession is entirely without foundation. By authority of law the governor has accepted the college buildings and grounds for and in behalf of the state, and as such property is unalienable, and in the event of a change of title and possession, no suit can be maintained against the state in regard to it, because, as no statute of officer of the sovereign can regard the sovereign, so no court can have the jurisdiction (which word implies superiority of power) over the state requisite to oust the state from such possession. As no provision has been made by general law for bringing suit against the state, as might have been permitted under our state constitution, any party aggrieved by the state's possession of the Agricultural college will be compelled to appeal, as every other party having claims against the state must, to the legislature in order to persuade the sovereign to do that which no subject or officer of the state has power to compel it to do. If there be any justice in their demand the legislature should grant it; if there be none, it should deny it.

A WAR CLOUD.

Trouble Brewing Over the Samoan Difficulty.

STATEMENT OF NAVY SECRETARY

He Says It Now Rests with Congress Whether or Not War Shall Be Declared—Foreign Affairs.

Special to the Herald.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Secretary Whitney says the state of affairs in the Pacific all hinge on the Samoan matter. It now rests with congress, which alone has the power to declare war.

The correspondence accompanying the president's message on Samoan affairs, which was laid before the 16th inst., discloses the fact that Germany has made a declaration of war against Samoa, and has entered official complaint against the United States because an American named Klein led the Samoan forces which killed twenty and wounded thirty of the German marines. Action by congress on the subject is expected. The German government also begs the United States to join in an active way to restore calm and quiet in the island. The American government disclaims any responsibility for Klein's action, claiming he was not nor never had been connected with the United States public service.

The correspondence also contains instructions to Admiral Kimberly, from Secretary Whitney, in which the latter says: "You will at once proceed to Samoa and extend full protection and defense to American citizens and property. You will protect against the subjugation and displacement of the native government of Samoa by Germany as in violation of the positive agreement and understanding between the treaty powers, but inform the representatives of the German and British governments of your readiness to cooperate in causing all treaty rights to be respected and in restoring peace and order on the basis of recognition of Samoan rights to independence, and you will inform your government as soon as possible after your arrival in Samoa of the condition of affairs and prospect of peaceful adjustment, and whether Germany posing forces when the late conflict occurred."
