NORTHWESTERN INTERESTS.

National Legislation in Behalf of Oregon and Washington Territory.

Representative Hermann appeared before the house committee on commerce on Tuesday and argued as to the necessity of a lighthouse near the mouth of the Siuslaw river, Oregon. The committee to day reported in favor of the erection of a "first order" lighthouse at that point.

Increased pensions have been granted James H. Adams, Winlock W. T.

Senator Mitchell presented an amendment to the river and harbor bill appropriating \$5000 for cleaning Tualatin river of logs.

He also introduced a bill to credit an additional land district in Washington territory, the proposed district to be called the Montezano Land district. It is to be composed of Pacific, Chehalis and Mason counties, and all of Lewis and Thurston counties west of range 3 west, and all of that part of Jefferson county lying west of the range line, northwest of Willamette meridian.

Mitchell also introduced a resolution, which was adopted, calling on the secretary of war to furnish the senate with the results of the investigation made by him of the organization known in Oregon as Captain Lawrence Hall's company of Oregon volunteers, organized in 1848.

Sight Destroyed.

A very unfortunate accident happened to Mr. Al Green yesterday, which may result in his total blindness. Mr. Green was engaged in grubbing on Mr. Beach's place, just across the river from Corvallis. While chopping a small twig flew up and struck him just under the right eye, inflicting a gash and it is feared has destroyed the sight. Mr. Green has been blind in his other optic for a great many years, which makes the accident unfortunate in the extreme. — Corvallis Times.

Not a Street Railway.

City surveyor E. J. O'Conner was engaged yesterday in surveying and staking off First street and many people thought it was the preliminary work of the street railway. It was not however. The surveying was for the purpose of leveling the street and trimming down the surface on the sides, to conform to the grade, forming a gutter to remove surplus water, when this is done First street will be a credit to the city.

New Fire Company Needed.

At the last meeting of the city council the matter of the formation of a new fire company to take charge of the hand engine was discussed. The city would no doubt purchase a hall for the use of such a company. The hand engine, which is always one of the best in the department in the early stages of a fire, ought not to be allowed to fall into a state of innocuous desuetude or to be sold. It is needed in the department.

Officers Elected.

The incorporators of the Albany Iron works met yesterday and elected E. F. Sox, president, and C. H. Stewart, secretary. The company have already secured the contract for furnishing the iron work for the new flouring mill that Levi Douglas contemplates putting in at Harrisburg.

THE LEGISLATURE

A Solid Day's Work on Bills and Memorials.

SOME BILLS ON FINAL PASSAGE.

Hon. John Minto to Present McLaughlin's Portrait—Congress Asked to Classify Lands—Eugene City Charter.

SALEM, Jan. 30.—A very busy day in the legislature, with solid work and no buncombe.

SENATE—MORNING SESSION. Yesterday's minutes dispensed with.

President appointed on the joint committee to investigate books of fish commission Senators Sinclair and Gray.

Gray introduced a bill for construction of a railroad bridge across Young's bay and Skipanon creek; second reading.

Judiciary committee recommended senate joint resolution to the senate requiring state superintendent to examine school books of other states and report to the next legislature; amended and adopted.

Senate bill was offered as a substitute to amend senate bill No. 9. This bill provides for times and places of holding supreme court. Southern supreme district, composed of Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Lake and Klamath; western district, composed of Marion, Lane, Linn, Polk, Benton, Tillamook, Yamhill, Washington, Multnomah, Clackamas, Columbia and Clatsop; eastern district, composed of Umatilla, Wasco, Crook, Gilliam, Baker, Morrow, Grant, Wallowa, Union and Malheur, lost; original bill was amended to read at Salem Pendleton and Grant's Pass and \$1500 allowed for additional expenses; engrossed.

Senate recommended the vote on motion of Wager yesterday to strike out \$1000 and insert \$1500 for additional expenses of supreme court; carried; engrossed.

ELECTIONS.

Committee reported on Wager's senate bill for re-districting counties of the state into senate and representative districts; engrossed.

CLAIMS.

Recommended Watts' senate bill for relief of Joel J. Hembree; amended and adopted; engrossed.

CORPORATIONS.

Recommended passage of Watts' bill that William Ball be allowed to construct and maintain a boom on North Yamhill river; engrossed.

Recommended that Irvine's bill to amend charter of Albany with four amendments; to senators from Linn county.

Moore's bill to amend charter of St. Helens; amended and adopted; engrossed.

Rayley's bill to confirm title to block No. 12 of Pendleton; not recommended and indefinitely postponed.

Wager's bill to amend Weston charter; indefinitely postponed.

Cogswell's bill to empower C. S. and R. S. Moore to construct a boom upon Link river in Klamath county; engrossed.

Recommended Fullerton's bill to allow Gardiner mill company to operate boom on Umpqua river, Douglas county; engrossed.

Eakin's bill to improve Fall creek and Little Fall creeks in Lane county and operate booms on same; amended; engrossed.

Bean—To confirm title of block No. 12 of Pendleton, recommended for passage; engrossed.

Cogswell's bill defining privileges of ditch and water corporations recommended for passage; engrossed.

Rayley—To amend Weston charter; recommended and engrossed.

Irvine—For protection of railroad contractors; to railroads.

Rayley—Empowering annuity safe deposit and trust companies to be appointed administrators, assignees, etc. amended to strike out line 4; engrossed.

Corporation committee recommended passage of Looney's bill for defining and punishing vagrancy; engrossed.

Recommended passage of bill by Sinclair for re-implementing J. Hacker; engrossed.

Committee on public lands reported favorably on senate joint memorial No. 4 asking for re-classification of public pastoral lands; adopted.

Committee on federal relations reported favorably on senate joint memorial No. 4 asking for surveys of lands in this state for settlement; concurred in.

Crook, Klamath and Lake, with privilege of reporting at any time. That committee reported that section 11 had been stricken out; bill thus amended passed.

Fullerton's bill relating to places of holding supreme court was amended after recommending vote to commit it to third reading; engrossed.

Recommending passage of bill by Dawson to prohibit selling of tobacco to minors; engrossed.

Committee reported a number of bills engrossed.

The committee on assessments reported senate bill No. 54, by Watts, for bridge across the Willamette; correctly engrossed.

Recommended Dawson's bill for certain exemptions to firemen amended; engrossed.

Chandler's and Hilton's bills were substituted and bill read first time.

Sinclair's bill for promotion of drainage was recommended not to be passed; engrossed.

The senate concurred in resolution No. 8 that the house meet in joint convention on Tuesday evening to witness the presentation of painting of Dr. McLaughlin; adopted.

Fullerton's bill providing for holding of circuit courts in the second judicial district amended; engrossed.

It was recommended that Watkins' water bill for The Dalles City pass; bill was amended and ordered engrossed.

Also to enable Dalles City to sell and dispose of certain lands; engrossed.

Joint committee to interview the secretary of the Pioneer Association for the arrangement of a programme for the presentation of Dr. McLaughlin's picture reported as follows: That the house meet in joint convention on Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. That Hon. John Minto make the presentation speech. That his excellency Governor Penney make the response.

HOUSE—MORNING SESSION.

Reading of minutes dispensed with.

Speaker appointed on committee to investigate fish commission Hahn, Crook and Bowditch.

Apperson from joint committee on acceptance of oil painting of Dr. McLaughlin recommended that at 7:30 on the evening of next Tuesday, February 5, both orators meet in the hall of the house, and that Hon. John Minto make the presentation speech on the part of the Oregon Pioneers, and Governor Penney the speech of acceptance on the part of the state; adopted.

A large number of bills were read second time and referred.

HOUSE—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Amendment to Eugene City charter, bill exempting \$50,000 sewer lands from taxation; lost by vote of 33 to 25—absent 2. Bill ordered engrossed and passed to third reading.

Senate joint memorial praying congress to reclassify public lands; concurred.

SECOND READING OF SENATE BILLS.

Dawson—Curing defects in deeds; judiciary.

Carson—The Portland water bonds bill; delegation from Multnomah.

Tongue—Defining heirships; judiciary.

SPECIAL ORDER. Northrup's bill requiring county courts to levy a tax not to exceed two-tenths of one mill for a fund for the relief of indigent soldiers and sailors, and to keep such persons out of poor houses. The house resolved itself into a committee of the whole, and W. B. Gilbert was called to the chair. The committee arose and reported the bill, with amendments, favorably; passed to third reading.

Cogswell's senate bill for a road from Paisley to the Oregon line; first reading.

Senate resolution that both houses meet in joint convention next Tuesday evening for presentation of picture of Dr. McLaughlin; concurred in.
