Vancouver, W. T., Grants a Car Line Franchise.

NEWS EAST OF THE ROCKIES.

Board Appointed to Examine and Test the New Cruiser Being Constructed in San Francisco.

VANCOUVER (W. T.), Feb. 5.—The city council of Vancouver at its regular meeting last night passed an ordinance granting the Columbia Land and Improvement Company right to operate street cars from the ferry landing along Main street to the west, north and east boundaries of the city. The construction of the railway will be commenced at once and speedily completed to Vancouver Heights, a beautiful addition being laid out by that company. The franchise requires the road to be running from the ferry landing of the Portland and Vancouver railroad to the main entrance of the garrison by the first of July next. This will prove a great convenience to Portland people visiting our beautiful garrison.

THE NEW CRUISER.

Board appointed to inspect the same and conduct the trials.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The secretary of the navy has designated the following officers as a board to conduct the official examination and trials of the cruiser Charleston, now being constructed at San Francisco: Commodore George E. Belknap, Commander Henry Glass, Chief Engineer R. L. Harris and Lieut. E. T. Quailtrough, also the following board to ascertain her speed as developed: Chief Engineers K. L. Harris, T. A. Wilson and W. S. Smith, Past Assistant Engineers T. J. Hoffman, A. B. Bath, W. B. Dunning and E. T. Washburn, Assistant Engineers J. N. Hollis, G. W. McElroy, J. M. Rickerell, C. W. Dyson and W. F. Darran. An examination will be made as soon as the contractors inform Commodore Belknap that the vessel is ready.

THE TIMES LIEB SUIT.

It is Dismissed at the Cost of Pannell, the Plaintiff.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Two Children of Fred Bolleger Are Roasted Alive.

Flame and smoke have sent two young souls into eternity.

About 10 o'clock last night an alarm of fire was sounded from Shantytown and a moment later the sky was illuminated with lurid light. The firemen were out promptly, but when they discovered that the fire was in Shantytown they had about concluded not to go on account of there being no water in that district. When Chief Witherspoon arrived at the engine-house he ordered No. 1 hose company to proceed to the fire, which it did. The plug at the corner of Bernard and Third streets was found frozen and it was fully twenty minutes before a stream could be gotten on the flames.

The burnt house was owned and occupied by Fred Bolleger. It was a one story, plain board shanty containing three rooms.

Bolleger had left the house sometime before the fire and gone to a neighboring store. Shortly afterward Mrs. Bolleger went to find him. While she was absent the fire broke out and the house was a mass of flames before they could reach it. Their children, named Charles and Josephine, aged 3 years and 18 months, respectively, were burned to death.

"I saw the flames on the roof," said Mrs. Noble, who lives across the way from the Bolleger house, "and ran over to see if I could be of any help. I opened the door, but could not go in the house as it was full of smoke. I called and my heart sank within me when I heard the awful screams of the helpless little ones.

"The draught through the open door caused the flames to break out all over the house, it seemed to me. The Bollegers came running from the store and the poor father made a frantic effort to save his children, but could not get into the house for the heat and smoke.

"He acted like a wild man in his grief and threw himself in the snow and sobbed and moaned. Mrs. Bolleger seemed to have more control over herself, but cried hysterically. Everything the poor people had—their home their children—all burned.

When the hose cart reached the scene the roof had fallen and was burning fiercely in the mass of ruins. A great crowd had gathered and stood about the fire talking excitedly about the frightful death of the innocents.

When a stream of water had finally come it was played on the spot where the children were supposed to be and the fire was quickly extinguished.

In the northeast corner of the house upon the burnt mattress, amid the ruins of the desolated home lay the body of the little boy and close to his side were the charred remains of the little sister.

The bodies lay in a cramped position giving an idea of the frightful suffering, and agony suffered before death was extinct. Part of the little boy's head was burned off exposing the brain as it lay cocked in the lower part of the skull.

The sight was sickening, and the smell of burnt flesh dreadful, and many turned away in horror from the heartrending spectacle.

Later the coroner arrived and ordered the bodies to be removed to the morgue. Kind neighbors took the homeless parents in and cared for them.

The cause of the fire is a mystery some of the neighbors contending that it was occasioned from the explosion of a lamp, which Mrs. Bolleger says she lighted on the kitchen table. The theory of Mrs. Noble, who was the first on the ground, is that the fire originated from the stovepipe, which ran through the ceiling and roof. The idea seems to be borne out by the fact that the fire burned the roof off first.

CAUGHT BY A MONKEY.
