GENERAL NEWS.

The Nicaragua Canal Bill Now Goes to the President.

CONSEL SEWELL MUST RESIGN.

President Cleveland Does Not Like His Views on the Samoan Trouble—Eastern and Foreign News.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—In the senate to-day the conference on the bill to incorporate the Maritime Canal Company, of Nicaragua, was presented by Sherman and agreed to. The bill now goes to the president for approval. The committee on woman's suffrage reported back favorably the joint report proposing a constitutional amendment to prohibit denial of right to vote by the United States, or by one state, on account of sex. It was placed on the calendar. The minority report will be made soon.

CARS AGAIN RUNNING.

The Street Car, Strikers Again at Their Posts and All is Serene.

BROOKLYN, Feb. 7.—The strikers or those fortunate enough to secure re-employment, took out the cars this morning which they had abandoned fourteen days ago. Richardson was pleased when he saw all the lines operating, and promised, on their reinstatement they would have nothing to do with the Knights of Labor. As the new hands have been retained only about two-fifths of the old hands got back. The board of arbitration met again this forenoon and took testimony in the matter of the tie upon the Atlantic avenue line. Richardson was examined, but nothing elicited any public interest.

THE PARNELL INQUIRY.

The Attorney-General Talks of the Murders Outrages Committed.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Learson continued his testimony to-day before the Parnell commission during the controversy regarding the admission of certain evidence. Attorney General Webster remarked that he never prepared to suggest that Parnell or any other of the nationalist members of parliament were personally connected with the numerous outrages committed in Ireland. His contention was that they were allied to the people who they knew or who they might know had been for years prominently connected with murderous outrages.

A BULLET IN HIS BRAIN.

Secretary Walter Suicides in Governor Lee's Office.

RICHMOND (Va.), Feb. 7.—Capt. James C. Walter, secretary to Gov. Lee, was found dead in his office at the state capitol this morning, with a bullet in his brain and a revolver by his side. No cause is known for the act.

Sewell Asked to Resign.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The president this morning asked for the resignation of Harold Sewell, consul-general to Samoa, on the ground that his views are not in accordance with those of the state department and administration.

Sentenced to Imprisonment.

DUBLIN, Feb. 7.—Thomas Condon, member of parliament, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment for inciting boycott. Condon, appealed and has been admitted to bail.

Deal for U. S. at Samoa.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 7.—Secretary Whitney is negotiating for the purchase of 3000 tons of anthracite to be delivered at the United States coaling station on the Samoan Islands.

Disastrous Fire.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 7.—The North-Ohio Blanket Mill in this city was burned this morning. Loss \$100,000.

A German Appointment.

BERLIN, Feb. 7.—Count William Bismarck has been appointed president of the province of Hanover.

Nail Works Burned.

TIFFIN (Ohio), Feb. 7.—The Tiffin Nail Works, recently started up here, was burned this morning. Loss, \$50,000. The works will be rebuilt immediately.

The Reward of a Kind Deed.

The friends of General J. A. Williamson of Iowa, formerly Commissioner of the General Land Office will be glad to learn that he has recently fallen heir to a large fortune. The exact amount is not known, but reports vary from \$250,000,000 to \$500,000,000. General Williamson has been general counsel of the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad. Some years ago an Irishman named Casey, who had a large contract for construction on the railroad failed to comply with the conditions thereof, and the officers of the road directed General Williamson to prosecute his bondsmen. If this had been done, Mr. Casey would have been financially ruined, but General Williamson after looking over the ground decided that Casey's failure was more his misfortune than his fault, and earnestly recommended that he be given an extension of time to finish his job. The General finally obtained permission to compromise with Casey and the latter carried out his contract, making considerable money which was afterwards largely increased by other profitable contracts and good investments. He was a bachelor, and before he died in Albuquerque last June he made a will bequeathing his entire property to General Williamson in consideration of the latter's kindness to him. Most of the estate was in cash, stocks and bonds and was immediately available.

DESCRIPTION OF THE BLUEBERRY

The Blueberry is a valuable fruit and is reliable to grow in our Northern states, where the more tender varieties of fruits winter-kill. It is perfectly hardy, having stood 40 degrees below zero without showing any injury to the most tender buds. It ripens in this latitude about the 1st of July, and is borne in clusters like currants; shape, round; color, reddish purple at first, but becomes a bluish-black when fully ripened. The flavor is equal to the raspberry, a very mild, rich sub-acid, pronounced by most people delicious. It may be served with sugar and cream or cooked sauce, and is splendidly adapted for winter use. The plant seems to flourish in all soils and is a prolific bearer. It grows very stocky and makes a nice hedge. The shining dark green leaves and the blue fruit making a pleasing contrast. The demand for the fruit is great, and usually brings 15 cents per quart. They commence bearing the first year after setting out, and yield a full crop the second and third year after setting out. They are propagated from suckers and root cuttings. The plant is about the height and size of a current bush and very stocky, holding the fruit well up from the ground. Plants should be set in the spring, during March, April and May, in rows two or three feet apart, and five or six feet between the rows, making a perfect hedge, and no grass or weeds should be allowed to grow between rows.
