A Boat Sunk at Portland at a Loss of \$25,000.

FATAL SHOOTING NEAR EUGENE

Passengers from Yaquina—Severely Kicked by a Horse—The Samoan Conference—Columbia Pilots.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] PORTLAND (Or.), Feb. 11.—At a board of trade meeting this morning it was decided to maintain the pilot service. Manager Holcomb of the O. R. & N. Co. says he will keep the proposed low rates in effect for a period of two years.

This morning at 6 o'clock the O. R. & Co.'s wharf boat sank while moored to the Albina incline. She had 500 tons of merchandise, agricultural implements and a large stock of wines and liquors. A careful estimate places the loss at about \$25,000, all of which will be borne by the company.

O'BRIEN TAKEN TO JAIL.

A Mob Interferes and a Fierce Fight Ensnues.

DUBLIN, Feb. 11.—William O'Brien was conveyed from Clonmel to the Tralee jail this morning under a strong guard. At Clonmel the escort was attacked with stones by the crowd, and the police charged on them. At Tipperary the crowd surrounded the station and resisted all efforts to disperse it.

The Samoan Conference.

BERLIN, Feb. 11.—The resumption here of the sitting of the conference concerning Samoa will probably be delayed several weeks, awaiting the arrival of a special commissioner who is expected to be sent from Washington. Captain Wisman has arrived in Berlin. He will start for East Africa in a few days.

EDITED BY A QUEEN.

Marie Henriette of Belgium Enters the Field of Journalism.

St. James' Gazette. Marie Henriette, Queen of the Belgians, has since the beginning of the new year, joined the army of journalists, together with her youngest daughter Prince-a-Clementine, sister of the Crown Princess of Austria.

The monthly magazine which her Majesty has just started is called La Jeune Fille, and is intended to keep young girls au fait of household matters, and also of events in the world of art and literature. The Queen herself contributes all articles relating to household affairs, but the editorial news and criticisms appear also under her pseudonym of "Madame Reyer." Princess Clementine, as "Martha d'Orey," writes the critical articles on art and literature; Carmen Sylva has been "engaged" to contribute a poem to every number, and arrangements are being made with the Crown Princess Stephanie of Austria-Hungary for supplying the pictorial attractions of the new review. Archduchess Marie Valerie's assistance has also been solicited, and altogether the outlook is most brilliant. The noble ladies might, indeed, do untold good if they take their task seriously, since the majority of women would have implicit faith in the advice of a Queen or a Princess when otherwise they would scorn to give any attention to a matter.

Curious Facts About Immigration.

One-fifth of the immigration to this port from Europe last year was from two countries which have only recently begun to contribute to our population—Russia and Italy. The report from Castle Garden shows that out of 383,030 immigrants for the year 43,683 were Italians and 32,937 were Russians. The immigration from these two countries was as high as that from Germany, and the immigration from Italy alone was just about equal to that from Ireland.

We are informed that nearly the whole body of immigrants classified as "Russians" belonged to the Hebrew race, and that they find life here so much more desirable than they found it under the Czar of Russia that they are encouraging their brethren whom they have left behind them to follow their example in coming to America. There are several interesting features in the Castle Garden report this last year.—New York Sun.
