THE CORNER ON BEEF.

A Convention to Investigate the Alleged Combine.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 12.—Governor Hamphrey, of Kansas, has selected St. Louis as the place and March 12 as the time for holding an inter-state convention to investigate the alleged pork and beef combine. The convention will be composed of a joint committee of senators and five representatives from the legislatures of Nebraska, Missouri, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Arkansas, Texas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and Wyoming. Several of the states have already been heard from favorably, and there is little doubt but that all of them will be represented. The governor of Pennsylvania has expressed a desire to have that state represented, although Pennsylvania was not invited to take part in the movement.

C. B. Watson, of Ashland, and S. R. Irwin, of Portland, were appointed notaries public.

Sheriff Zoeth Houzer, of Umatilla county, brought to the penitentiary today Geo. H. Kelley, sentenced to three years and had his execution.

In the circuit court today the two indictments against Rosefield & Rosenthal, of the Portland Mercury were dismissed. The defendant filed an affidavit declaring true a statement published in last Sunday's Mercury, which acknowledges the articles heretofore published against Dr. J. C. Gilbert, and upon which the indictments were found to be false and unjust to Dr. Gilbert, whereupon the doctor, who is the prosecuting witness, filed an acknowledgment of satisfaction and the case was dropped.

The case of Ching Heng for damages against C. D. Smith, who struck him on the head with a pitchfork last harvest, was dismissed today. Smith compromised by paying the claimant \$100.

The committee was out a while today and obtained \$6,347 of the \$20,000 bonus for the women mill. No trouble is anticipated in getting the remainder in a few days.

SENATOR JUVINER'S BILL.

Act to Protect Contractors and Laborers against R. R. Combinations.

To any or all persons or persons who shall hereafter as sub-contractor material man or labor, furnish to any contractor to any railroad corporation any fuel, ties, materials, supplies or other article or thing, or who shall do or perform any work or labor for such contractor in conformity with any terms of any contract, express or implied, with which contractor may have made with any such railroad corporation, shall have a lien upon all property real, personal and mixed, of said railroad corporation; provided, such sub-contractor, material man or laborer shall have complied with the provisions in this act, but the aggregate of all liens hereby authorized shall not in any case exceed the price agreed upon in the original contract to be paid by such corporation to the original contractor; and provided further, that no such liens shall take priority over existing liens.

The person performing such labor shall cause a notice in writing to be served on such officer of said corporation as the service of summons may be made, which said notice may be in the following form, or any other similar form:

"To the (name of the company) You are hereby notified that I am (or have been) employed by— as a laborer (or have furnished supplies, as the case may be), on the property of said railroad company to secure my pay."

If there shall be a contractor or sub-contractor, material man or laborer, a copy of the original contract shall be served with such notice and attached thereto, which notice shall be served at any time within twenty days after the completion of such sub-contract or such labor.

If by any reason service of such notice can not be made in the country in which the sub-contract was made or labor performed, or material furnished the laborer or person furnishing labor or material shall file said notice in the office of the clerk of the circuit court, and such clerk shall keep a record of said notice and cause a copy of the same to be mailed to the head office of said company, and keep a list of the names of persons so claiming a lien, the names of the corporation against which such liens are claimed and the amount claimed.

If the money due the person having given notice as aforesaid shall not be paid within ten days after the money shall become due and payable, then such person may commence a libel in any court having jurisdiction of the amount claimed to be due against the corporation with which the original contract was made; or he may commence as aforesaid against such railroad corporation and original contractor jointly, and execution may issue thereon as in other cases.

Should the original contractor in any case fail to complete his contract, any person entitled to a lien as aforesaid may file his petition in any court of record in any county through which the road may be constructed against the railroad corporation and the contractors, setting forth the nature of his claim and the amount due, as near as may be, and the fact that the contractor has failed to complete his contract. The clerk of said court shall thereupon issue a citation directed to all persons or corporations interested in the matter set forth in the petition, to be published in some newspaper printed in and of general circulation in the county, for four successive weeks, setting forth that said petition has been filed, and the nature thereof, and that all persons interested may appear and file such claim as they may have at a time to be stated in such citation; and the court, on hearing said petition, and the claims of such persons as may interplead, may render such a decree against said corporation as may be due the petitioner and such persons as interplead; and such decree shall have the effect as other decrees against such original contractor and against said railroad corporation, and execution may issue upon the same to enforce said decree against either.

Whenever any suit so brought shall be determined in favor of the plaintiff or petitioner, the court shall allow such attorney's fees as may be reasonable to be taxed as costs.

Inasmuch as there is now no law upon this subject, and it is of importance to laborers and material men, this act shall take effect from and after its approval by the Governor.

Table Customs of the Ancients.

It was one of the ancient customs to recline at the feast; and the banquetting rooms were gorgeously carpeted, were fitted up with luxuries couches. Thus Plato—not the philosopher, but a poet of the same name says: "There the well-dressed guests recline On couches rich with ivory feet; And on their purple cushions dine, Which rich Sardian carpet meet."

And Anaxandrides: "Upon the supper rooms, and sweep the house, And spread the couches far." Heracles says that the Persians were the first who engaged artistic experts especially to arrange these couches; and that on one occasion Artaxerxes presented his friend Timagoras, the Cretan, with a tent of purple and gold, with a couch with silver feet, with an accompanying message saying: "I send you, O Timagoras, the couch and coverlets and a servant to arrange them, as this is a matter the Greeks know not of." It is related of this same Cretan, that he had so completely secured the favor of the Persian king, that the latter invited him to a banquet of the royal family, an honor never before paid to any Greek.

Here is another custom of the Ancients, and one in which we can see the origin of our menu cards. Each guest, as soon as he had settled upon his couch, was handed a paper upon which was written the name of every article to be served at the feast and in the order in which it was to be served—a convenient, if not an indispensable custom; indeed, in the present day we would be apt to look upon the omission as barbarous, for what could be more so than to keep a man of moderate gastronomic capacity in ignorance of some coming delicacy; and thus allow him, in the dark, to crowd it out with some previous dish or dishes which he may tolerate rather than fancy,—February Table Talk.
