### GENERAL NEWS.

#### Stanley Reported Killed by the Natives.

MANY PEOPLE BURNED TO DEATH

Congressman Thomas of Illinois to be Secretary of the Navy—Serious Fire at Eugene.

THE HERALD Special Dispatches.) PARIS, Feb. 18.—A correspondence of the Petite Journal at Saint Salvador Congo says: "A courier has arrived from the West Coast, who states that a report is current that Henry M. Stanley was killed in an engagement with natives near Wagamba. The courier reports that several instruments which have been identified as having belonged to Stanley have, been sold by natives."

#### FRIGHTFUL DISASTER.

A Hotel in Equis—Many People Burned to Death.

HARTFORD, (Conn.), Feb. 18.—The boiler of the Park Hartford hotel blew up at 5 o'clock this morning, wrecking the entire front of the structure, which was a fire brick building. The entire fire department and police reserves were summoned. The ruins took fire and the work of the firemen was greatly impeded by the blinding volumes of smoke and steam. The loss of life is estimated at from forty to seventy, but may be less.

#### HARRISON'S CABINET.

Congressman Thomas, of Illinois, to be Secretary of the Navy.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Reports from Indianapolis to-day are to the effect that Congressman John R. Thomas, of Illinois, has been selected for secretary of the navy. Thomas declines to confirm or deny the truth of the rumor. To a reporter he said that a telegram was received in Washington last night from Harrison's private secretary, Halford, saying that he had been selected. Custom telegraphed to Harrison this afternoon that if the report was true it would please him.

#### TEN MILLION POUNDS.

England Wants to Expand this Sum to Strengthen Her Navy.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—It is reported that at the coming session of parliament the government will propose a defense loan of £10,000,000, the proceeds to be devoted to the construction of twenty men-of-war, fifty cruisers and increasing the torpedo boats.

Sailed for Port Au Prince.

KEY WEST, Feb. 18.—The U. S. steamer Galeon, with rear admiral Gherardi on board, has sailed for Port Au Prince.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—A telegram received from Rear Admiral Selknap, commander at Mare Island and navy yard, California, says the United States ship Vandallia arrived at Honolulu February 2d, and was to sail for Samoa on the 7th.

#### FIRE AT EUGENE.

A Variety Theater, Hotel and Other Buildings Burned.

EUGENE, Feb. 18.—This morning at 3:30 fire broke out in the rear of the People's Theater, which quickly communicated to adjoining buildings, and despite all efforts resulted in the total loss of the theater, Coleman's hotel, Henderson's residence, and several barns in the rear of the buildings and the partial loss of Melson's blacksmith shop. Insurance, \$500 on Henderson's house, \$2,500 on the theater, and \$200 on the blacksmith shop. The fire boys deserve special mention for their bravery. The saving of Chas. Lauer's fine residence was wholly due to their efforts.

#### SALEM NEWS.

Circuit Court Notes—Real Estate Sales at the Capital.

SALEM, Feb. 18.—Articles of incorporation were filed in secretary of state's office to-day by the Interstate Building and Loan Association, John W. Godfrey, Charles L. Mendell, Neil McMillan, Campbell H. Sweeney and Chas. E. Holmes incorporators; capital stock \$7,500,000; principal place of business, Minneapolis, Minn.

An circuit court to-day the jury in the case against Wm. Holtzclaw for cutting Robt. Krebs at Gervais last Christmas, brought in a verdict this morning of guilty of an assault with a dangerous weapon, and recommended the prisoner to the mercy of the court. Judgment was served, probably to await the result of a case against Chas. Atwood for the same offense, which is now on trial.

### A BIG SCHEME.

A Novel Excursion Trip From Canada.

IN THE INTEREST OF ANNEXATION.

Domestic Lawmakers to Be Shown the Rights in the United States in May next.

CHICAGO, February 15.—It is stated here on good authority that the proposed excursion through the Middle, Southern and Eastern States for the purpose of enlightening the Canadian members of Parliament as to the actual condition and resources of this country is to be a fact and not a fancy. The matter has been much discussed in the newspapers of late.

Sir John Macdonald was interrogated regarding it in Parliament last week, but replied that he had heard nothing of it officially. Nevertheless the excursion has been planned and all the members of the Canadian Parliament have been invited. It is expected that about 400 of her Majesty's subjects will accept the invitation, and about half as many Senators and Congressmen will be asked to do honors as guides for the visitors.

About May 1st the proposed excursion will start. Three solid Pullman cars will leave the Boston station for Buffalo, where the tour of inspection of American citizens will begin. Arrangements will be made in advance for local Chambers of Commerce and kindred corporations to show the visitors everything of interest in the cities visited in as brief and thorough manner as possible.

The route of the proposed excursion will be via Buffalo, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Louisville, Chicago, Kansas City, St. Louis, Nashville, Atlanta, Birmingham, Richmond, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Harrisburg, New York, Boston, Montreal and Ottawa. Arrangements were made with the Pullman Car Company yesterday by S. J. Ritchie of Akron O., representing the parties interested in the movement.

Mr. Ritchie is a large property owner in Canada, and is on intimate terms with the leading statesmen of that country. He has been one of the foremost men in agitating commercial reciprocity between the two countries and his efforts are directed more at leveling commercial barriers than political ones. He had received the promise of many leading Canadian politicians of both parties that they would be pleased to take the trip.

The object of the excursion will be to bore in on the minds of the Canadian Congressmen. It is to make an appropriation for the purpose.

Later in the season it is proposed to have the Interstate Commerce Commissioners visit Canada, calling at every point where railroad communications exist, and the result of their investigation is expected to do a great deal towards settling over matters between the two countries. Senator Culbert will have charge of the later expedition.

KINGSTON, (Ont.), February 15.—Principal Grant, father of the Imperial Confederation scheme, having been asked if he thought free trade between Canada and the United States would be advantageous to both countries replied: "It certainly would, in my opinion, although I am sure on both sides of the line have its justly proved to their own satisfaction that it would be a matter as clear to me as the multiplication table, but it is equally clear that the Congress of the United States will not consent to this mutual benefit, unless we consent to our fiscal and political absorption as the price Canada will never pay either the half or the whole of that price."

Two other points are clear to me: First, that the more anxious we make ourselves to be for the advantage and the more loudly we clamor for it, the less likely we are to get it on fair terms. Secondly, that we are most likely to get it when we are in a position to offer our neighbors what they consider an equivalent. We will be in that position only when Great Britain, Canada and Australia make up their minds to speak on commercial matters with one voice.

What, then, is our first duty? Evidently a commercial understanding among ourselves, based on the acceptance of a principle that we should discriminate in favor of all within the empire.
