THE LEGISLATURE

Governor Penney Vetoes Dawson's R. R. Commission Bill

THE SENATE VOTES THE VETO

The Portland Water Bill Also Passed Over the Governor's Veto—Adjournment Will Occur Friday.

Special to the Herald. Albany, Feb. 19.—The senate this morning concurred in the adoption of the house amendment of Senator Norval's bill for relief of Union county.

House concurrent resolution providing for the final adjournment of the legislature on Saturday m., amended to 10 p. m. Friday; adopted.

Special committee reported favorably on Fullerton's bill to establish an agricultural society for Southern Oregon.

Tongue's bill to license stallions kept for public service; passed.

President appointed Senators Watts and Dawson to assist in examining records of the senate.

Senclair's bill to allow Coos county to construct certain bridges; passed.

Carson's bill establishing a state board of immigration; lost.

Raley's motion to suspend rules and make the assessment and taxation bill a special order for 2 o'clock; adopted.

SENATE—AFTERNOON SESSION. A special committee of senators from Union county reported favorably on Raley's bill to re-locate county seat of Union county.

On motion of Watts the rules were suspended and this bill was made a special order for 8 o'clock to-morrow morning.

House amendments on Senclair's bill to promote drainage were concurred in.

Assessment and taxation bill introduced by joint committee on assessment and taxation was taken up as a special order; postponed till to-morrow night at 7:30.

Veto of the governor of Dawson's bill creating railroad commission was read.

The senate then proceeded to vote, the question being should this bill pass notwithstanding the veto of the governor. The vote stood 22 to 8 in favor of the bill.

Wager moved that a thousand copies of the governor's veto be printed for use of the senate; amended by Watts adding for political purposes; lost.

S. C. R. by Gray that a committee be appointed on assessment and taxation to offer five amendments to the existing assessment law; laid on the table.

Communication from the state superintendent of public instruction recommending that the legislature pass a resolution recommending that the ways and means committee make an appropriation so that the state may be properly represented at the National Educational Association held at Nashville, Tenn., July 16, 17, 18, 19, 1899.

GENERAL NEWS.

2,500 Workmen Discharged from the Panama Canal.

ALL IS QUIET AT NARVA. Attempted Robbery of a Car Load of Silver Dollars—Half a Million Dollars Destroyed by Fire.

ATTEMPTED TRAIN ROBBERY. A Car Load of Silver Dollars Escapes the Robbers' Clutches.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 19.—The statement published that the fast train on the Louisville and Nashville road, carrying a car load of silver dollars and one hundred passengers, ran into a lot of ties placed on the track by robbers near Walon, Kentucky, Friday night, but the force of the shock broke the obstruction and the train passed safely on.

AN IMPORTANT MEETING. Jay Gould Retires as Director of the D. L. & W. Railway.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railway was held to-day. The only change in directors is caused by the retirement of Jay Gould, whose place was filled by Henry A. C. Taylor, son of the late Moses Taylor, whose estate is still the largest holder in the company's stock. The retirement of Gould is in accordance with his wishes.

DISASTROUS FIRE. Half a Million Dollars Swept Away Within an Hour.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 19.—Rudolph Blankenburg & Co.'s large importing house was burned this morning. The flames spread rapidly and adjoining buildings in Strawberry and Bank streets were deluged with water to save them, so that the destruction by fire is probably the smaller item. A rough guess puts the loss at \$500,000, fully insured.

TAKING SIBERIAN AFFAIR. The United States Will Take No Further Steps at Present.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The senate committee on foreign relations has decided that it was not politic to take further steps in regard to the Sannan matter, pending the proposed Berlin conference. This determination was reached as a result of a telegram from the editor of the New York World, asking of the committee to take testimony of its correspondent J. C. Klein, now in San Francisco.

A CYCLOPE IN ALABAMA. Many Persons Said to Have Been Killed and Injured.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 18.—It is reported that a cyclone passed through Bibb county, fifty miles south of here, last night, doing great damage. Several persons are said to have been killed, and many injured. It is impossible to obtain full particulars to-night.

CAUSALITIES IN GEORGIA. ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 18.—A cyclone passed over Banks county this morning. Thomas Stevens and son and Mr. and Mrs. Meadell were killed. Another son of Mr. Stevens was injured.
