HORTICULTURAL MATTERS.

The action of the lower house of the legislature, in re considering and finally passing Representative Condon's Horticultural Commission bill, is to be commended as the course of wisdom and sound judgment.

The fruit interests of this state are the most important matters to be looked after at present. The increase of destructive insects, during the last few years, threatens to damage very materially if not destroy the production of fruit, and it behooves every individual in the state to use every means within their power to eradicate the evil, and re-establish and maintain the reputation of Oregon as the greatest and most natural fruit producing country in the world.

A few enterprising and energetic men, who make the fruit business a study and an avocation cannot accomplish this end, for in the war of extermination against the destructive and obnoxious insects the action must be universal and effective, or its results will be abortive. If a single individual in a neighborhood retains the remnants of an old orchard without proper care and attention, the few trees will become the propagating hire that will infect the orchards for miles around, and destroy the most active and careful work of the most enterprising fruit culturist.

To meet the requirements of such cases as these and to place the culture of fruit, in the state, in a permanent, sure and paying condition, enhancing and enlarging the famous reputation already established, is the aim and objects of this bill, and it should become a law and its provisions enforced, and given a fair trial, when if defects are discovered they can be provided for by future amendments.

The opposition to the bill has been upon the grounds that it would be a hardship upon some farmers to be obliged to put their trees in a proper condition. This view of the case is clearly erroneous for it will certainly pay every farmer to produce good, healthy, marketable fruit, just as much in proportion as it will the man who devotes his entire time and attention to the production of fruit on a large scale. If a fruit tree is worth having it is worth giving the attention that will make it produce good healthy fruit, and no man has the right to harbor a hive of insects to infect his neighbors orchard, no more than he has to enter his neighbors house and carry with him some contagious disease.

When the intentions, scope, and undoubted results of this intended law are known, opposition will cease and it will receive the hearty and co-operative enforcement it deserves.

THE TERRIBLE WOMEN.

The pros and cons of women suffrage still continue to fret the writers and orators of the country. One of the latest sarcastic scorplings upon the subject is by the Omaha Herald in signing up the Pioneer Press of St. Paul. It says that the Pioneer Press believes that the long years of labor that Miss Anthony has given to the cause of women's enfranchisement have been thrown away, and that for forty years Miss Anthony has been leading her little band in the wilderness, and it claims that she is no nearer the coveted land than at the beginning. The Pioneer Press complains because Miss Anthony desires that all persons of legal age be recognized as citizens, and that if this were done we should at once have added to the aggregate of voters a vast horde of Indians, Chinamen and nondescripts. Just why the Pioneer Press should associate the women of America—by far the most generally cultivated half of the population—with Indians, Chinamen and nondescripts, can not well be imagined. The Indian and the Chinamen would not vote if the

consent were given. America has never ceased to deal with the Indian as a foreign race. The Chinamen never assimilate with us—that is why restriction has been put upon his immigration. Just what the pretensions and peculiarities of a "nondescript" are it would be impossible to guess. Surely, woman is no foreigner. Indeed, it is well known that she has a passion for loyalty; a genius for patriotism. Can she not master the problems of politics as well as the negro, the unwashed Italian, the Bohemian, the Anarchist, insane with illusions, the unbalanced fanatics of all sorts that go to make up the mass of masculine voters? If not, then the judicious lives of women speak for little. The civilization they have made is of no account. For the civilization of America is theirs. No portion of it has known religion, law, or schooling until woman has established a home. The Pioneer Press also fears that the lives of the tender voters will no longer be safe when women shall have entered the domain of politics. It says: "Shall we assume that the enmities engendered by politics will cease when the crime of poisoning and other methods of murder under conditions favorable to the more restricted activities of women are a little more frequent among that sex than among men? The revenge of women always takes the individual direction, and think of the revenges of politics!" Well, of course that is so. Human life will no longer be safe, if once these creatures have a right to say whether a Christian gentleman or a boodling saloon-keeper shall be mayor of the city. When women select the city council, then will they turn poisoners. The wife will no longer see to the furnishing of her table. She will fix philters to drive men mad. The maiden of twenty-one will graduate from her collegiate course to practice subtle ways to lure men to destruction. Five o'clock teas will be superseded by shooting matches, and the lioness of the occasion will be the one who has killed her thirty-first man. The Pioneer Press is right. We know the women, and realize they once in power our lives would no longer be safe. Let us pray for protection from Miss Anthony and her lawless, bloodthirsty crew!

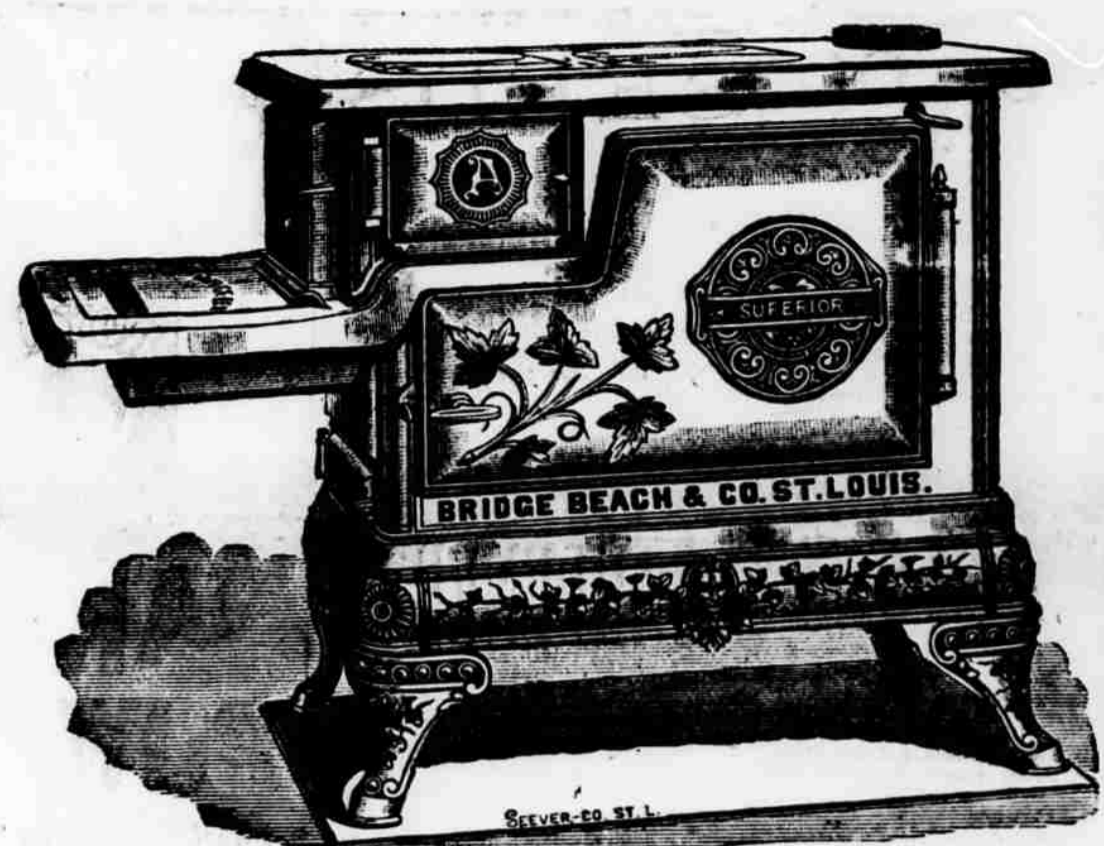
