THE CITY COUNCIL.

Contract for Ferry Street Bridge—Ordinance for the Street Railway Franchise.

Special meeting of the council was held last evening. In the absence of the mayor Councilman Gradwohl was elected mayor pro tem; councilmen all present; Recorder Henton in his place.

The recorder reported that E. B. Davidson had accepted the \$140 voted him by the council for nursing small-pox patients.

The bid of W. E. Kelley for the construction of a bridge upon Ferry street, over the Santiam water ditch, where the bridge had given down, was accepted at \$90, the work to be completed within ten days.

The committee on streets and public property recommended a new sidewalk upon Ellsworth street, west side, between First and Water streets, within five days; also a new walk on Water street, adjoining lots 2, 3 and 4, within ten days; also that a ditch be dug from the north line of Ellsworth street to the alley in block 5, with a catch basin at the end of the ditch within five days; also that a cross walk four feet wide be built across Sixth street on the west line of Montgomery; also that Second street from No. One's engine house to the catch basin on the Cannon corner be graded, and from the opera house to Broadalbin street be graded to carry off surface water. The recommendations were adopted.

The request of Wm. Vance for further time in grading and changing alley until his building operations would permit the work completed, was granted.

The city marshal recommended new sidewalks in various places, which recommendation was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

C. E. Wolverton presented the matter of an ordinance granting an exclusive franchise for 25 years for a street railway to the Albany Street Railway Company. The matter was referred to the committee on ordinances, to report at the next regular meeting.

Adjourned.

A Train Stopped by the Sheriff.

At 7 o'clock Monday evening, says the Oregonian, Sheriff Kelly and Deputy Sheriff Marquam arrived at the P. & W. V. R. R. depot on an important mission. They were armed with a writ of execution. Twenty minutes later engine No. 1 arrived from the south and was switched on to the passenger coaches for the 8 o'clock out run. The sheriff and his deputy speedily boarded the engine and took charge of it, much to the disgust of the company's officials and the assembled and waiting passengers. The writ upon which the engine was seized was issued upon the strength of a judgment obtained February 9 by Thomas Callahan in Judge Shattuck's court for \$561 13 and costs. It is the old Ray's landing boat controversy and an intention has been given out to appeal the case to the state supreme court.

An Error.

Saturday's Oregonian made the mistake of editing the ownership of the Capital mine to Albany men, and the Statesman in copying the article made the correction and placed the ownership where it belongs, to Salem men. The Herald copies the Oregonian without correction. The fact is that of the million dollar stock in that mine, nearly all is owned in Salem, only a comparatively few shares being held by outside parties in the immediate vicinity of the Capital mine, there is also another rich tract of land owned by Salem capitalists, men who have means and energy to develop it.—Statesman.

Well, let's not quarrel about it. The facts are that there is a big mining region on the Santiam, and wealthy men of Albany, Salem and Portland have claims there, and are doing much toward developing these mines.

It Will Convene in This City at 2:30 O'clock To-Day.
