## THE LEGISLATURE

The House Passes the Railroad Commission Bill.

OVER THE GOVERNOR'S VETO. Detailed Report of the Day's Proceedings in Both Houses—The Session Drawing to a Close.

SALEM, Feb. 20.—In the senate this morning the reading of the journal was dispensed with.

The report of the committee to examine books of the board of school land commissioners, was ordered printed.

Report of the committee to investigate books of state treasurer, read and adopted.

Committee appointed to visit school for the blind, reported with recommendations; adopted.

Gilham's bill creating county of Harney out of Grant county; passed.

Raley's motion to reconsider vote by which Cauton's bill for appropriation for a representation at National Educational Association was lost, adopted; resolution adopted.

Committee on military affairs reported favorably on Northrup's bill for relief of indigent soldiers; engrossed.

Watts' bill to prohibit deduction for indebtedness in assessments; postponed until to-night.

Barin's bill to confirm title of settlers to certain swamp lands; passed.

Gray's bill authorizing L. R. Abercrombie to construct a log boom across Nekanicum creek in Clatsop county; passed.

Norval's bill giving Oregon and Washington railroad company a grant through certain lands; passed.

Tongue's bill to prevent the spread of infectious diseases among domestic animals; lost.

Gray's bill fixing pilotage rates on Columbia and Willamette rivers; indefinitely postponed.

Joint committee to visit the home reported with recommendations; adopted.

Wager's bill providing for cancelling of county warrants seven years after issuance; passed.

Watt's bill for construction of a bridge across Willamette river between Portland and East Portland; postponed.

Moore's motion to suspend rules and take up house bill for Northrup for the same purpose; adopted.

Northrup's bill was read three times and passed.

SENATE—AFTERNOON SESSION. Tongue's motion to reconsider vote by which Tongue's bill to prevent the spreading of infectious diseases among stock; was adopted and bill passed.

Armstrong's bill for relief of Mrs. N. J. McPherson; passed.

Condon's bill creating state board of horticulture; passed.

Wager's bill regulating foreclosure of mortgages and other conveyance; postponed until to-night.

Fullerton's bill to create board of agriculture for Southern Oregon; passed.

House amendments to stock bill by committee on agriculture; concurred in.

Report of special committee on mileage read and adopted.

Bill by committee on counties fixing fees of clerks in certain counties; passed.

Tongue's bill to increase efficiency in public schools; passed.

Condon's bill fixing fees of bailiff of supreme court; passed.

HOUSE—MORNING SESSION. Reading of journal dispensed with.

Thompson called up Cogswell's bill to create the county of Hamilton out of Grant; read first time.

## GEN. AL NEWS

An Outbreak Feared on the Flat Head Indian Reservation.

GERMANY DEMANDS SATISFACTION. Exciting scene in the Indiana Legislature—A Father Murders His Wife and Children had Killed Himself.

THE HERALD'S Special Dispatches. HELENA, Feb. 20.—The latest reports of the trouble on the Flat-head Indian reservation are conflicting. The Missoula people look for serious trouble. At Ravalli it is said the stage has arrived and that Clifford and Cunningham are safe.

TWO MEXICAN FIGHT SEVENTY-FIVE ROUNDS AT LOS ANGELES. LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20.—A four ounce glove fight, under the auspices of the Athletic club, for \$150, between George Clark, of Santa Barbara, and Kid Barnes, of Denver, ended at 3:45 this morning in a draw. Seventy-five rounds were fought, taking about five hours. Neither was in better condition. Nothing was done in the first eighteen rounds as the crowd got disgusted. In the next three rounds Barnes rushed and it looked like Clark would be knocked out, but he rallied. The fight was according to London prize ring rules.

AN EXCITING SESSION. A Conflict Among Members in the Indiana Legislature. INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 20.—There was an exciting scene in the state senate this morning. The republicans claimed that they were subjected to a gag rule, and Senator Johnson protested. The sergeant-at-arms threatened to remove him, but other republican senators gathered around him and defied the sergeant-at-arms. A general conflict seemed imminent, but quiet was soon restored. It is rumored that all the republicans will resign and leave the senate without a quorum.

AN ATROCIOUS MURDER. A Drunken Husband Kills His Wife and Children, Then Himself. ASHLAND, (Wis.) Feb. 20.—A most atrocious murder and suicide occurred at Upon this morning. A laborer named Joseph Brogan killed his wife and two children aged respectively 5 and 7 years, and then committed suicide. Brogan had drunk heavily and had a heated quarrel with his wife this morning. He finally attacked her with a razor and nearly severed her head from her body. The little boys awoke and were horribly cut by their raving father, who then cut his own throat.

Germany Grows Irrational. BERLIN, Feb. 20.—The Cologne Gazette says: "Germany will demand the United States the arrest and punishment of Klein, the American correspondent, on the charge of leading the Samoans against the Germans."

Treaty With Japan. WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The secretary of state is informed that the supplementary treaty of commerce and navigation between the United States and Japan was signed in Japan to-day.

For a Naval Station. TANGIERS, Feb. 20.—It is rumored that the Sultan of Morocco has granted the request of Germany for a piece of coast near the Algerian frontier for a naval station.

SALEM NEWS. The Railroad Commissioners Selected Salem Court Notes. SALEM, Feb. 20.—A caucus of republican members of the legislature was held this evening to consider the question of the election of railroad commissioners under the new law. The caucus elected Colvig, of Southern Oregon, and Farrell, of Eastern Oregon, and Robert Clow, of Salem. They also recommended the appointment of Geo. A. Waggoner, of Corvallis, as clerk. These men will without doubt be the new board of railroad commissioners.

Frank A. Avery, who was shot on the train this side of Gervais on the evening of January 15, and has been here since, left on the overland train for San Francisco this evening fully recovered.

"Doc" Shackelford was acquitted on a charge of attempted rape by jury in the circuit court to-day. The unsupported testimony of the girl was not sufficient to convict.

Studd and Burke, evangelists, are still holding interesting meetings in the afternoon and evening. The woolen mill subsidy is increasing at a very encouraging rate. The end of the week will see the \$20,000 raised.
