A Negro Labor Contractor Lynched in Mississippi.

THE SAN FRANCISCO PEDESTRIANS

Nowy Items from the State Capital—The Reported Bombardment of Sagallo Confirmed.

ARTESIA (MISS), Feb. 22.—D. H. Smith, a negro from Forest City, Arkansas, who has been collecting negro workmen and shipping them to a farm, was lynched by being hung to the limb of a tree yesterday. At the coroner's investigation the evidence so far indicates that the hanging was done by two citizens of Oklabeha county and one from Loupdeux. They are men of standing in their communities.

SAN FRANCISCO PEDESTRIANS.

Progress of the Six Day's Walking Match—Howarth Ahead.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22.—The pedestrians are making good progress in the six day match at the Mechanics' pavilion. Howarth made the first fifty miles in seven hours and thirty-eight minutes. Gus Guerrero, who was expected to do good walking, was taken sick after the first thirty-three miles, and was off the track for several hours. The score of the ten leaders at 9 o'clock this morning stood: Howarth, 66 miles; Cartwright, 65; Hart, 64; Moore, 62; Guerrero, 61; Davis, 60; Vint, 57; Compana, 53; Taylor, 49; Morsarity, 48.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Our Usual Budget of News from the State Capital.

SALEM, Feb. 22.—Articles of incorporation were today received in the secretary of state's office from the Henrietta Mercantile and Milling Co., F. W. Hendly, John Barker, Jas. H. Koontz, James Taylor incorporators; object, buying and selling grain and merchandise, establishing a system of irrigation, operating an electric light plant and engaging in pork packing; principal office, Echo, Umatilla county; capital, \$50,000.

In the case of John F. Foley against John Barnes for \$3000 damages on account of his leg being broken by a capsizee hack at Gervais last 4th of July, the jury this morning returned a verdict of \$500.

In the case of John Patterson against Clell Hayden for the seduction of his daughter, the jury gave a verdict of \$2000. A new trial was today denied and time given until Wednesday to file a bill of exceptions.

Geo. Lawton, pleading guilty to drugging and robbing a man, was today fined \$100.

Bombardment of Sagallo.

LONDON, Feb. 22.—A report that a French cruiser had bombarded Sagallo, where the Cosack expedition under Atchinnoff had settled temporarily, killing or wounding five of the expedition and capturing the remainder, is confirmed. The bombardment was the result of a refusal of Atchinnoff himself to lower the Russian flag, which he had hoisted at Sagallo.

YOUNG MRS. BLAINE.

The Preparations for Her Debut in Washington.

NEW YORK, February 19.—From present indications the debut of Mrs. James Blaine Jr. in Washington next season will be productive of a certain amount of excitement in theatrical and society circles of that city. Mr. Blaine has just purchased a house there and intends to permanently locate there. His social prestige at present is strong, and should he secure the portfolio of the State it will be greatly increased. Meanwhile Mr. Frohman is arranging dates for a certain Washington theater and preparations for Mrs. Blaine's debut go steadily on.

AN AWFUL DEATH.

A Living man's Foot Burned Entirely Off in a Brush Fire.

Last evening a messenger came to town seeking Drs. Lewitt and Wallace, stating that George W. Clyde had met with a terrible accident, having been burned in a brush fire. Dr. Lewitt answered the call, and found the injured man at the home of his brother on California street. Upon examination it was found that the right foot had been burned to a crisp, the bone protruding, and the leg actually roasted clear to the hip. The under portion of the left leg where the circulation is, was also roasted while the upper part did not show the marks of the fire. His hands were badly burned and the right side was scratched. The doctor at once discovered that Clyde was passed all human aid, and that it was but a short time before death would claim him. At 10 o'clock last evening George Clyde breathed his last. The particulars of the accident will never be known, as Clyde was unable to talk and could not tell the tale. He had recently purchased a piece of land back of town, and at odd times worked clearing. Yesterday he went out on the property to work. Nothing more was known until some boys playing in the neighborhood discovered a man lying on his back and a fire burning around him. One of the boys called some men who were working near by and they came to the rescue, finding that the man whom the boys had seen was none other than George W. Clyde. The supposition is that while engaged in clearing the land chopping down trees, either a tree or limb struck him unconscious and throwing him into the fire. He certainly must have been unconscious, as the physicians state that no person could stand the pain consequent from such an injury without crying out, and should a call have been made the men working near by would certainly have heard it.

MYOPHOBIA.

Two Serious Cases in an Illinois Town.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 19.—Brooklyn, Ill., is all wrought up with two cases of myophobia. James Moran, a boy of 16 years, was bitten by a rabid dog. On Thursday he was in convulsions and while his mother was attending to him he suddenly turned and bit her. To day both mother and son are suffering with rabies and it is thought that neither can recover.
