## GENERAL NEWS.

### Work on the Nicaragua Canal to Begin at Once.

### THREE BRITISH SEALERS SOLD.

### They Were Seized by the American Authorities Two Years Ago—A Canadian Sensation.

New York, Feb. 23.—The news of the passage of the Nicaragua bill was received with much satisfaction at the office of the Nicaragua Canal Construction Company, which has taken the contract of constructing the canal for the Maritime Canal Company of Nicaragua. A representative of the former company said: "We will begin work as soon as we can close the contract we have now and make other arrangements necessary. There will be no diplomatic difficulties, as treaties have been concluded between the United States and Nicaragua and Costa Rica, allowing the construction of the canal. The total distance from ocean to ocean at Nicaragua is 166 miles, of which fifty-six and a half is by lake, eighty-one and a half by river and basin navigation, leaving only twenty-eight miles of actual canal. The estimated total cost of the work by the surveying expedition of 1885 was \$40,000,000, and \$15,000,000 for contingencies, making \$55,000,000. It is said that the whole work can be completed so that the canal will be open for navigation by 1895."

### THE BRITISH NAVY.

### A Recommendation That It Be Greatly Strengthened.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Extracts from the report of the committee on the naval maneuvers in 1888 say that the main lesson is that Great Britain is far from being as strong as she should be on the high seas. While they believe the navy strong enough to engage any maritime power, they are of the opinion that no time should be lost in placing it beyond comparison of the combined naval forces of any two countries.

### A Canadian Sensation.

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—In the Quebec legislature last night Trudell created a sensation by giving notice of a resolution of sympathy with the pope, and embodying a suggestion that Queen Victoria be urged to use her influence to restore the temporal power of the pope. The motion was subsequently withdrawn, it is supposed under pressure from the premier.

### British Sealers Sold.

OTTAWA, (Ont.), Feb. 23.—The dominion government has been advised of the sale by the American authorities at Sitka, Alaska, of three British schooners—the Onward, Caroline and Thornton—seized over two years ago for fishing in Behring sea.

## CHRISTIAN SCIENCE.

### Several Victims of the Latest Craze at Buffalo.

CHICAGO, February 20.—The Times Buffalo (N. Y.) special says: This city is so full of the Christian-science craze that the clergy are beginning to preach against it. It has obtained a strong hold in the western part of the city and is making inroads on the churches. What is worse several converts have died within a few days under the care of these praying doctors. As they claim to use no medicine, it is hard to get hold on them as practitioners without a license, but since fatalities have come to light the District Attorney has begun to look up the question.

### To-day Mrs. W. H. Chamberlain was buried from a hospital where she was sent after being treated for pneumonia by a Christian scientist named Hardy. Blood-poisoning had set in and she could not be saved. The District Attorney promises to bring Hardy to justice, and said today that he should at once take steps to present his case to the Grand Jury. The feeling against the Christian scientists is becoming strong, yet they are so well entrenched in their practices that it will not be easy to dislodge them.

### THE WAR SHIP MONONGAHELA.

### She Leaves Mare Island En Route for Samoa Amid Anticipation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22.—The United States war ship Monongahela which left port yesterday, is under orders from the secretary of war to sail without delay for Samoa, and there to report to Admiral Kinkaid, of the man-of-war Trenton, who is in command of the fleet.

The Monongahela was formerly a steamer, but has been changed into a sailing vessel, and the place where the engines were has been decked over and berths, etc. built. It has a bark rig; a steam boiler and a condenser have been placed on the ship, and as Commander Wingate says, the vessel is in first-class order.

The Monongahela, although intended as a supply ship, is fitted with two eight-inch guns, one twenty-pound howitzer and plenty of small arms. Her cargo, in addition to the usual supplies, consists of ordnance and ammunition valued at \$100,000. The Monongahela was given quite a farewell by the Thetis going down to the wharf and playing national airs, and all of the vessels in the bay saluting the departing war ship.

### CAPTAIN KIDD'S ELUSIVE COINS.

### Taey Have Been Located in the Mariana River.

Buffalo Courier. After all that has been said and written about Captain Kidd's gold, who knows but that it will yet be found on Grand island. It certainly looks as though that was really the land of the buried treasure. At various times old French coins have been found on the island, but the greatest discovery yet is that made by William Webb last Sunday. When there is a strong eastern wind the water is lowered considerably on the American shore of the island, so much that it is frequently possible to walk on the beach at least thirty feet from the ordinary water line. It is here on the beach that the old relics have usually been found.

Recently Farmer Webb was walking along the beach when he suddenly came upon several dozen old copper coins. They were partially buried in the sand in such a shape as to show conclusively that they had been buried there. Many are so old and well worn that it is impossible to make out their date or design. One of them is a medal bearing on one side of the inscription, "Success to the Commerce of Upper and Lower Canada," and on the other side the words, "Sir Isaac Brock Bart, the hero of Upper and Lower Canada, who fell at the battle of Queenstown Heights Oct. 13, 1812." Some of them are American coins and have only the twelve stars.

A society is soon to be formed among the Grand island people for the purpose of collecting and preserving the many valuable relics of the island. The society will make an effort to raise the two French men-of-war that were sunk just off the shore in the French and India war. On clear days the hulls of the old vessels are easily seen.
