### DESCRIPTION OF THE BLUEBERRY

The blueberry is a valuable fruit and is liable to grow in our Northern states, where the more tender varieties of fruit winter kill. It is perfectly hardy, having stood 40 degrees below zero without showing any injury to the most tender buds. Its ripens in this latitude about the 1st of July, and is borne in clusters like currants; shape, round; color, reddish purple at first, but becomes a bluish-black, when fully ripened. The flavor is equal to the raspberry, a very mild, rich, sugary, pronounced by most people as being very delicious. It may be served with sugar and cream or cooked sauce, and is splendid canned for winter use. The plant seems to flourish in all soils and is a prolific bearer of fruit. The plant is about the height and size of a currant bush and very stocky, holding the fruit well up from the ground. Plants should be set in the spring, during March, April and May, in rows two or three feet apart, and five or six feet between the rows, making a perfect hedge, and no grass or weeds should be allowed to grow between rows.

### At 11:35 the head of the procession reached the capitol, and at 11:50 the presidential party alighted at the senate portico amid great cheering, though the rain was pouring its heaviest. Cleveland proceeded to the president's room and Harrison and Morton to the vice-president's room, whence at noon, as already described, they went into the senate chamber, preparatory to the inaugural address.

### TAKING THE OATH OF OFFICE.

At two minutes before noon Mr. Cleveland and his cabinet entered and took seats assigned them. Then Harrison on the arm of Senator Hoar appeared at the door and walked to a seat at Cleveland's right, the audience rising. The same ceremony was repeated with Morton. Before taking his seat the latter was sworn in by Ingalls.

### At 11:59 president pro tem Ingalls rose and closed the fiftieth congress. Then Vice President Morton called the senate of the fifty-first congress to order in special session.

PRESIDENT HARRISON'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

At 12:45 the president elect reached the platform, and after taking the oath of office, read his inaugural address, which was a lengthy document, full of lofty hope and patriotism and without modest expressions that well became the man. After an invocation to the Almighty God that He might bestow wisdom, strength and fidelity, and the people be imbued with a spirit of fraternity, righteousness and peace, he called to mind the first inauguration, contrasting it with the present. He favored protection and dwelled at some length on the retarding influence of slavery. He held that corporations caused mob violence. He suggested improved naturalization laws, and passing over our foreign policy he came out strong on the Panama canal question, holding that no foreign power should control it. He evidently favors the admission of the new states and expressed himself decidedly in regard to suppressing election frauds. He concluded with a magnificent peroration, full of exalted patriotism.

## AT WASHINGTON.

### Benjamin Harrison Is now President of the United States.

### THE INAUGURAL CEREMONIES.

The Greatest Thing Ever in Washington—The President's Inaugural Address—Scenes and Incidents.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—With solemn ceremony, in the presence of all the power and authority embodied in the co-ordinate branches of the government, and surrounded by representations of all the great nations on the face of the globe, Benjamin Harrison was today inaugurated into the highest office within the gift of the American people. Never was such a crowd in Washington before. It is estimated that half a million strangers camped in the city last night, filling every inch of space and boarding house accommodation and drawing to the full limit on private hospitality.

General Harrison, accompanied by the inauguration committee,

was taken in a close carriage, drawn by four gray horses, to the White House about half-past 10 o'clock. The rain was pouring in torrents and drove many of the streets and made sorry work of the decorations.

### AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

Arriving at the White House Harrison was received by Cleveland and his cabinet in the blue parlor, where they were soon joined by Morton. At 11 o'clock Cleveland, Harrison and Morton took carriage for the capitol. The first carriage, an open landau, contained Cleveland, Harrison and Hoar; the second, Morton and Cullum. Mr. Cleveland witnessed their departure from the window.

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## BLINDED BY VITRIOL.

### Revenge of Nihilists Upon a Russian Noble.

Berlin Letter to New York Tribune.

In the blind asylum at Steglitz, a short distance from Berlin, there lives a man who until recently was an mysterious personage as the famous "Man of the Iron Mask." Certain persons high in authority made application for apartments at the asylum which should be worthy of a wealthy occupant. He appeared a short time after, accompanied by a beautiful woman, who was addressed as his wife. The man was tall and well made, and dressed in the height of fashion, with hands that betokened gentility of birth. The woman was young and aristocratic in looks and bearing. About the face of the man was a linen mask, with an opening opposite the mouth and nostrils, which was never removed in the presence of attendants. He sat in a dark room to which the servants were rarely admitted, and conversed with a few. His food was given to his wife, and the inmates of the asylum knew nothing of their names and history further than the fact that they were from Russia. Rumors were rife, as was natural, and many ingenious stories constructed to account for the strange imprisonment. But the mystery has at last been solved, and the "Man of the Iron Mask" proved to be the hero of a strange and touching tale.

A year before the death of the late Czar of Russia, although the scion of a high and mighty family, the young nobleman, like so many of his class, became interested in the trials and hopes of the nihilists. Time and association made him one of their ardent sympathizers and assistants. When the murder of the Emperor was planned unfortunately the execution of the dreadful deed fell to him. The news staggered him. His oath bound to him to the nihilists, his family ties to the Czar. Thoughts of his people and the attendant disgrace influenced him and finally deterred him. He refused to commit the crime. A year passed by. Another revolutionist had thrown the bomb which he had declined to do, and Alexander was dead. He had forgotten almost that he had been a nihilist; but not so those whom he had forsaken. Passing along one of the principal streets of St. Petersburg, when about to greet a lady upon the opposite side, something was dashed into his eyes, and in a moment the light of day had gone. His mouth was deformed, his cheeks burned and disfigured. It was the work of a nihilist, before whose modern invention he had performed the work. Mad with pain, he was taken to his home, but the injury was beyond repair, and the doctor's aid in vain. The Government had confiscated his estates upon learning of his revolutionary sympathies, but he had declined to do so, and in return of the fate which had overtaken him, the mask was placed upon his head, for he was unpleasant to look upon.

But the heart of our woman was shown—the heroism of his fiancée. She was a countess and the daughter of a house famous and powerful in Russia as his own. She was told of the Russian case, and the meeting between the lovers was touching in the extreme. With the sorrowful and effort to break the engagement and make her free again. But the brave woman refused, and declared that she would remain with him till death took her away. And the wife married in the little church on the estate attended by their relatives and friends. And on their wedding day they started for the blind asylum in Steglitz, where they had hopes of restoring the poor man's sight. And here his wife attended him with unflinching devotion and prayer for the day when the afflicted nobleman can again look upon her face.

### QUALITY IN ALASKA.

Missionaries Criticized by Governor Swineford.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Secretary Tilden has sent to the Senate a report from Governor Swineford of Alaska upon the reported outrages upon women in Alaska. His views upon the subject have been published. Concerning missionary work in Alaska the Governor says: "I can but express the earnest hope that either the Government or the Board of Home Missions may be able very soon to find a field for some of our Alaska, in which the peculiar talents and altogether questionable methods of Rev. Dr. Sheldon Jackson can be more profitably employed." Governor Swineford says two or three of our missionaries are responsible for the violence upon white people of Alaska which have been so broadcast throughout the country, and he recommends the President to Board of Foreign Missions to make a thorough investigation of the management of its Alaska stations.

### AT PUBLIC AUCTION.

The Grave of Washington's Mother to Be Sold.

FREDERICKSBURG, (Va.) March 4.—Within the precincts of this city is the grave of the mother of George Washington. The old farmhouse in which she died is also in this vicinity. His father Washington came on his way to his first inauguration as President to bid his mother a last farewell before her death. It will shock the whole country to learn that the grave of Washington's mother is likely to be sold at auction this week. During the administration of President Jackson on the cornerstone of the monument was laid, but it has never been completed. Messrs. Colbert and Kirtley, real estate agents of this city, will offer for sale at Washington at public auction twelve acres of land on which is the tomb of Mary, the mother of Washington.
