Officers for the New County of Sherman Appointed—Notaries Appointed.

SALEM, March 4.—Articles of incorporation were filed to-day in the secretary of state's office by the Hood River Co-operative Co., Geo. F. Prather, J. R. Rankin, O. L. Stranahan, A. J. Rand, incorporators; object, building a toll road, building hotels and boats and to improve Hood river; principal office, Hood River, Wasco county; capital stock, \$50,000.

Northwest Cold Storage and Ice Co., John C. Lewis, Wm. McGuire, C. N. Dolph, incorporators; principal office, Portland; capital stock, \$100,000.

The following notaries were appointed: J. M. Boiver, Portland; C. A. Sehlbrede, Roseburg; J. W. Roland, Jefferson; A. W. Gowan, Joseph; D. B. Monteith, Albany. Death of Eli Carter.

The tolling of a church bell on Sunday conveyed the sad intelligence to the citizens of Albany that another old pioneer had passed the great majority beyond the river. Mr. Eli Carter had been suddenly stricken with heart disease, and breathed his last. Although he had been ailing for several days he was better and his death came as a sudden shock to the family.

Mr. Carter was born on the 6th of March, 1816, and was one of the oldest members of the Masonic fraternity in the state, being a member of Corinthian lodge and one of Albany's old and active business men, being formerly the owner of the planing mill now owned by Hochstetler & Sears.

The funeral will be held in the M. E. Church South at 10 o'clock this morning, and the burial ceremony will be conducted by Corinthian Lodge, A. F. & A. M. He leaves behind him that best of all epitaphs, that of being an upright, honest and worthy citizen.

YAQUINA HARBOR.

Its Facilities, Depth of Water and Railroad Connections.

Yaquina Republic! There are only three first-class harbors along the Pacific coast from the Gulf of Mexico to Vancouver Island. They are San Diego, San Francisco and Puget Sound.

Next in rank as to accessibility comes the Columbia river and Yaquina bay of the minor harbors, the bay of Coos bay, Tillamook bay, Gray's harbor and Tillamook. The Pacific coast is not indented with good harbors like the Atlantic coast. Yaquina bay is one of the easiest harbors for a vessel to enter or depart from on this coast. A million dollars properly expended in improving this harbor will give thirty feet of water on the bar at high water.

A government engineer who has considerable knowledge of this bar told us recently that almost any depth of water can be secured on the bar by jetties and a break-water. The bed rock is a soft stone and can be easily blasted and moved from the channel. The current would then keep a deep channel after it was once dredged out. Inside of the harbor vessels can ride at anchor with perfect safety, in any storm ever liable to visit this coast. In fact the water in the harbor scarcely ever gets so rough that the bay cannot be crossed safely in a small boat.

There is not a single point on the Pacific coast between here and San Francisco that offers equal advantages to make a seaport. This bay now has in operation a standard gauge railroad reaching the most fertile section of Oregon, and inside of two years it will form a connection with the Chicago & Northwestern road and in a year it will reach the Union Pacific, Oregon Line, giving the bay practically a trans-continental line. There is no better site in Oregon on which to build up a large commercial city than on Yaquina bay.

The Santiam Mines.

The Oregonian expresses firm confidence in the value of the mines on the Santiam district. It says: One of these days the history of the Santiam mines will be written up, and there will be a strange tale of early discoveries, and how, as far back as 1860, people went into the mountains prospecting, and that in the summer of 1865 Angus McDonald, a Scotchman, made the astonishing discovery of the White Bull ledge. How companies incorporated to build roads, a sawmill, and set up and operate a quartz mill, and that it proved that their discoverer lit upon a "chimney" very rich in gold, but the main ledge did not pay. Then the mountains were abandoned, and for years nothing was done. In the course of time other prospectors and workers went there, and work recommenced and at length good mines were found, and the enterprise of the faithful was rewarded. About the year 1890 there will be live towns planned in those mountain gulches, and railroads will reach them, and there will be the everlasting din of machinery pounding and grinding all through the twentieth century, cleaning up millions of treasure. People will wonder how it ever was that so many years passed and so many prospectors could find nothing, when the mountains were fairly filled with treasure. There has been a great deal of prospecting done one the headwaters of all the streams that put into the Willamette from the Cascades, and it is well known that gold, silver, lead, copper and iron exist there in abundance. In course of time there will be better reduction methods and the Cascades mountain mines will do a good part for the future of our state.

Booming Oregon Towns.

It is stated that the Southern Pacific railroad has a clerical engagement hunting for good localities to lay out towns. During 1888 the agent kept still, and actually laid out no towns, but he tells the world that he expects to be very busy in 1889, laying out towns through Oregon. Laying out towns is a regular business and is conducted on well defined principles. Of course there is money in it, and the towns have to be boomed a la Tacoma in a smaller way. If any place possesses peculiar advantages they make the most of them and the boom is quietly put in motion. If the Southern Pacific really shall make a business of running booms along its line it is to be hoped they will be of the slowest kind, and not extravagant and dangerous. Such a boom as was inaugurated in Southern California two years ago would leave any country desolate and bankrupt. From the fact that Haskell was idle through 1888, it may be fair to judge that the business was overdone in 1887.

A Bare Relic.

Col. Kelsey showed us the other day a continental bill of the United States of the denomination of one dollar, says the Benton Leader. It has the imprint of the printers who printed it. It was issued in 1779. It has on it the motto in Latin, "Aut mors aut decora vita," which means "either death or an honorable life." The colonel thought he had lost the bill, as it had been mislaid among some papers. It is worth more than the dollar it calls for. One almost wishes it could talk. What a story it could tell of the dark days when it circulated among the republic.

A Severe Wound.

Scott Crossen, little son of D. L. Crossen, while jumping in the basement of the public school building the other day, cut a severe gash on his forehead falling against the brick masonry. Lycopodium has set in and the wound is proving much worse than it was at first thought to be.

The annual school meeting of the Albany district was held at the court house last evening.

The meeting was called to order by John Foshy, one of the directors, and the reports of the board of directors and the clerk, C. G. Burkhardt, were read as follows: CLERK'S REPORT.

To meet the expenses there will be the following available funds: Cash on hand, \$914 67. State and County funds, estimated, 5000 00. Total, \$5914 67.

We would therefore recommend that there be no tax levied this year, as there will be sufficient funds to meet all purposes.

The reports were adopted. No other business was transacted and the meeting adjourned.
