GENERAL NEWS.

President Harrison Appoints His Cabinet.

BLAINE IS ON THE LIST.

And the Others Are as Already Reported—Notes from the State Capital—Eastern News.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—President Harrison to-day sent to the senate the following nominations:

Secretary of state—James G. Blaine, of Maine.

Secretary of the treasury—William Windom, of Minnesota.

Secretary of war—Redfield Proctor, of Vermont.

Secretary of the navy—Benjamin F. Tracy, of New York.

Secretary of the interior—John W. Noble, of Missouri.

Postmaster general—John W. Wainwright, of Pennsylvania.

Attorney general—W. H. H. Miller, of Indiana.

Secretary of agriculture—Jeremiah Rusk, of Wisconsin.

The cabinet was confirmed by the senate.

THE APPROPRIATION BILL.

It is Twenty-Five Million Dollars Less than Last Year.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The amount carried by the general appropriation bill passed at this session of congress was \$281,879,000, against \$306,986,000 for the current year.

EX-SENATOR SLATER SINKING.

It is Now Thought That He Can Not Possibly Recover.

LA GRANDE (Or.), March 4.—There has been a slight improvement in the condition of ex-Senator Slater, and this morning there was a hope of his ultimate recovery, but a change for the worse has occurred and he is sinking rapidly. His sons, Hank J. Slater, register of the land office in the Harney land district, Woodson Slater, deputy state treasurer, and John Slater, of Washington territory, and all others of the family are here.

CONTEMPT CASE.

David S. Terry surrenders himself and is held for trial.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—David S. Terry, for whom bench warrants had been issued by the United States district court on four indictments in connection with the contempt of court matter, surrendered himself to-day, and was released on \$5,000 bonds on each charge.

Another Earthquake Shock.

GUYAQUIL (Ecuador) via Galveston, March 5.—Another sharp shock of earthquake was felt here and at stations on the night of March 3rd. It began at 8:40 o'clock and lasted 8 seconds.

THE POWER OF A BEAUTY.

A Victory Won by a Woman from California.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—A Californian woman has won a victory here. In 1878 Alfred Hedberg of the Fifteenth United States Infantry was dismissed from the service upon charges preferred against him. He was serving in Arizona at the time. He had married a California girl, Miss Jennie Robbins; whose mother now lives in Berkeley. Hedberg's dismissal was due somewhat to the jealousy of his associate officers. He is a Dane by birth, and it is said, was too rigorous in enforcing discipline. His wife is a beautiful woman. He and she have been at the capital since 1878, seeking to get a bill through Congress restoring Captain Hedberg to the army. Hedberg got a place in the Pension Office and lived on his salary received there while trying to get his vindication from Congress. Mrs. Hedberg won to his support nearly every Senator and a big majority of Representatives. The bill restoring Captain Hedberg to his former rank in the army was at the last session, and Cleveland a few days ago nominated him and yesterday the Senate confirmed him as Captain of the Fifteenth United States Infantry.

AN OLD DEBT PAID.

But It Had Annoyed a Farmer for Thirty-one Years.

The following story is told about an illuminating an illustration of New England character as could well be given. It is the story of an old man who for thirty-one years was torn by a struggle between his conscience and \$16 50. For thirty-one years he endured remorse and unhappiness before he could wake up his mind to relinquish the \$16 50, but finally his conscience got the better of his greed and he did the right thing, and did it thoroughly and completely. Stern conscientiousness, combined with tenacity of spirit, are chief components in that sturdiness of character which has won for New England ideas a dominance over the whole country.

About six months ago a man 70 years old or more called at the office of the Providence and Worcester Railroad in Providence, and, finding the treasurer, showed him an old freight bill and asked if it was correct. The treasurer looked at the bill, which was dated December 3, 1857, and found that on a lot of apples no freight had been charged. After some talk the old man went out. A few days ago he returned and said to the treasurer that he had come to pay the balance on the thirty-one year-old freight bill, which by accident on the part of the company had not been charged and he wanted to pay it with interest at 6 per cent. He said the unpaid balance had fretted him for thirty-one years, and he discovered the error at the time, but (long ago) because some of the goods were damaged during transportation, he concluded to say nothing about it. But he soon overcame the vexation and intended to pay the bill, but never had done so, and now he could carry the load no longer.

The amount due was \$16 50, and the interest at 6 per cent amounted to \$30 69, a total of \$47 19. The treasurer offered to compromise, saying if the railroad company would be responsible, and made several propositions for abatement, but the repentant old man would accept none of them. Finally the treasurer offered to take \$30 in full settlement. The old man accepted this and a receipt was made out for that amount.

The man took it, read it over while, and then handed it back saying he thought he should be better if he had paid the whole amount interest and all. Accordingly a receipt was made out for the \$47 19, the whole sum was paid and the old man went away, leaving a thirty-one-year-old nightmare behind.
