EDITORIAL NOTES.
A PORTLAND commission merchant
has received a shipment of
apples from New York. This is
bringing coals to Newcastle with a
vengeance. That Oregon, the land
of big red apples, should be re-
duced to such a strait as to buy
apples from this frozen up, cyclone
stricken empire state 3000 miles
distant, is something our orchard-
ists ought to rustle to prevent.

THE wretched attempt of Pigott,
the renegade who forged the Parnell
letters which formed the founda-
tion for the London Times out-
rageous charges, to cast opprobrium
upon the Parnellite Irish party,
found a fitting end in his miserable
suicide at Madrid, Spain. The oc-
currence bears such a similarity to
the Judas Iscariot episode of
sacred history, that the detestible
name will associate with the name
of Pigott in future Irish annals.

THE office of vice-president has
not been regarded as conspicuously
honorable, and most incumbents
of the position have not excited
any great influence while they
were vice-president. It is possible
however, that Levi P. Morton, by
his individuality, may bring the
office into greater prominence.
Mr. Morton is more than likely to
take a conspicuous position in
Washington society, and it is not
improbable that he may carry
more weight on that account, than
some of the bachelors, and quiet
men, who have filled the position.

THE Chronicle answers a sub-
scriber who wants cremation
advocated that it has frequently
advocated this mode of disposing
of the human body after death,
but seems to have made little im-
pression on the public. We greatly
fear that so long as people remain
so constituted that they think with
horror of having their bodies con-
sumed by flames, and yet regard
with complacency the idea of being
devoured by worms, that the great
sanitary idea of cremation will not
make much progress. Unquestion-
ably the world would be greatly
benefitted by resorting to cremation,
but so long as sentiment
continues more potent than the
common sense the present mode of
interment will remain in vogue.

PRESIDENT HARRISON in his in-
augural address says concerning the
prospective new states: "It is a
subject of congratulation that there
is a near prospect of the admission
to the Union of Dakota, Montana
and Washington territories. This
act of justice has been unreason-
ably delayed in the course of some
of them. The people who have
settled in these territories are in-
telligent, enterprising and patriotic
and the accession of these North-
west states will add strength to
the nation. It is due to settlers in
the territories who have availed
themselves of the invitation of our
land laws to make homes upon the
public domain, that their titles
should be speedily adjusted and
their honest entries confirmed by
patent.

THE death rate in England for
1888, statistics of which have
recently been published, shows
the remarkable fact that it was the
lowest average since 1857, when
the government first undertook the
keeping of accurate records. In
1887 the ratio of deaths was 18.8 to
the thousand, and this was the
lowest known till that time. But
for 1888 a still better showing is
made, the ratio being but 17.8 to
the 1000. What this decrease in
the death rate means can be better
understood from the fact that more
than half a million persons were
alive in England and Wales at the
end of 1888 whose deaths would
have been recorded during the
eight years 1881-88 had the rate of
mortality in those years equalled
that which prevailed during the
ten years 1871-80.

THE liquor question will continue
to be one of paramount importance
no matter what the action of indi-
viduals or committees may be upon
the subject. The Chicago In-

Open recently spoke out upon the
subject with no uncertain tone,
and from its utterance we glean
thoughts that have weight and
pertinence. It says that the liquor
question will burn so long as there
are great wrongs occasioned by
the sale or use of liquor. As things
are, the largest part of all the
crime, poverty, lunacy, and
anarchy that trouble the country
for their cure or suppression is
found in close connection with the
use or sale of intoxicants. Some
thirteen thousand kegs of beer
were consumed at one memorable
gathering of the Anarchists of
Chicago; and soon afterward there
was an explosion of bombs. There
is not a group or assembly of An-
archists or extreme Socialists in
America that does not soak its
silly and dangerous resolutions in
beer. Nor is there a single revolu-
tionary or communistic assembly
of total abstainers. The connec-
tion between prostitution and
drunkenness is intimate. There is
not a brothel conducted on total
abstinence principles in the world.
It may not follow from these facts
that prohibition would insure a
millennial era to society, or even
that it would reduce the evils fol-
lowing the use of intoxicants to a
minimum degree. It certainly
does not follow that the prohibi-
tionists are empowered to "deal
damnation round the land on each
they judge their foe." But neither
does it follow that because the pro-
hibitionists have rushed into one
extreme it therefore is wise for the
Personal Rights League to hasten
yet another.

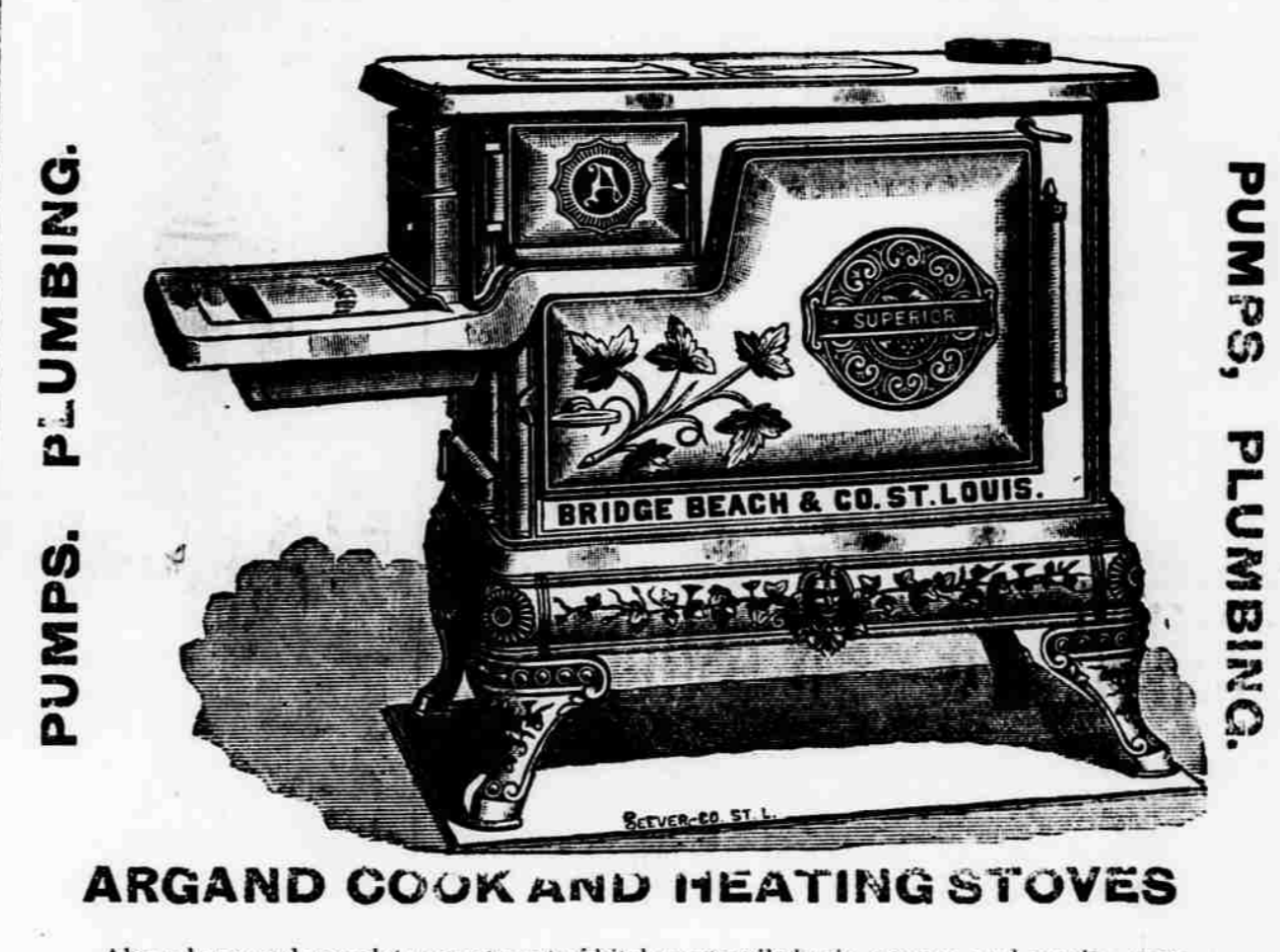
