Capturing Chinese Pheasants.

Chinese pheasants are worth \$4 a piece in Arizona. They are wanted there for breeding purposes. A Corvallis youth has begun to make a business of catching them. The Corvallis Times says that a few evenings ago he sprinkled some wheat in a secluded spot about a quarter of a mile from the city. Monday evening he set a figure four trap, the covering being made out of wire netting, about two feet square. In the morning, bright and early, he slipped out to the trap and to his astonishment found seven of these beautiful birds under the netting, while eight others were around the cage, some sitting on top of it, apparently aggravated that they too were not under the net-work before the trap was sprung. The seven will be shipped to Arizona where he has contracted to sell them for \$4 a head.

The Lenten Season.

Yesterday was Ash Wednesday the first day of the lenten season, which lasts until Easter Sunday, the 16th of April this year. This period is observed in the Catholic, Protestant Episcopal and some of the Lutheran churches as a season of fasting and devotion in commemoration of Christ's forty days' fast just before his passion and death. The Catholic church, especially, enjoins strict rules for the observance of the lenten season, forbidding the attendance at balls, theaters or like amusements, and refusing the sacrament of matrimony during that time. Ash Wednesday is so called because the ashes of the palms used on the previous Palm Sunday—the next Sunday before Easter—are sprinkled in the Catholic churches on that day, on the foreheads of those present.

A Mixed Case.

Last week Fred Hamer was fined \$25 and costs at Lyonsville for breaking into the house of Jacob Sing and helping himself to a square meal. Mr. Sing had found the intruder in the house and captured him, using a club in a forcible manner. For this he was arrested and fined \$5 and costs for assaulting Hamer.

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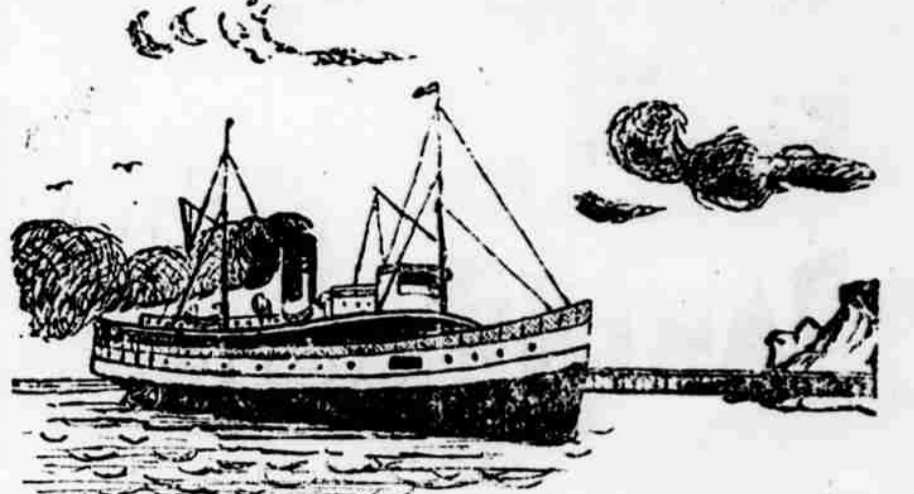
