Repairing the Naval Vessels of the United States.
A SHARP ADVANCE IN WHEAT.
A Bank Clerk Defalcates in the Sum of Over \$60,000—Wines a Bottle, Montana, Shut Down.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—It was learned this afternoon that Monday work will be resumed at various navy yards in the repair of vessels under the recent appropriation of \$150,000 to be immediately available for this purpose. The vessels now being repaired are: Ironquois at Mare Island; James-ton and Pensacola, at Norfolk; Portsmouth and Saratoga, at the Portsmouth, N. H., yard, and the Boston and Yantic at New York.

OKLAHOMA BOOMERS.
Troops Sent from Fort Reno to Prevent Disturbance.
OKLAHOMA, March 16.—(Oklahoma) Hill has arrived in the heart of the Oklahoma country and is surrounded by hundreds of boomers. It is reported that troops have been ordered here from Fort Reno. The boomers are busy staking out claims and some have already begun plowing. Hill took the claim he selected twelve years ago.

Heavy Defalcation.
BOSTON, March 16.—Edgar Swan paying teller of the Lyon National Bank, is charged with being defaulter to the amount of \$68,595. It is alleged he has taken \$50,000 since February 28. He was engaged in stock speculations. He has made restitution to the amount of \$33,000.

Mines Shut Down.
HELENA (Montana), March 16.—Marcus Daly, superintendent of the Anaconda works, gave orders for shutting down the Syndicate Mines at Butte, which are a part of the Anaconda properties. This is rendered necessary by the fire which destroyed the lower works. Six hundred men are thrown out of employment.

Chicago, March 16.—Supt. Hubbard said today that he had received a word from the officers who are scouting the Northwest for Tescot since he left the city. He attached no importance what ever to dispatches stating that the fugitive had been arrested at Salt Lake.

Advance in Wheat.
CHICAGO, March 16.—There was a sharp advance in wheat this morning under the leadership of the brokers who were supposed to be buying in interest of a clique. There was a general rush to cover and within a short time the May wheat advance was nearly 2 1/2 cents.

The Report Infounded.
HELENA (Mt.), March 16.—Sam Ward, attorney for the Union Pacific, denies the rumor that the Union Pacific had sold the road bed in Jefferson canyon to the Northern Pacific.

U. S. Senator Resigns.
PROVIDENCE, March 16.—Gov. Taft has received the resignation of U. S. Senator Chase.

INSIDE FACTS ABOUT SAMOA.
A Secret Agreement Between England, France and Germany.
SAN FRANCISCO, March 15.—An evening paper prints an interview with a gentleman now in the city, claims to have official reasons for knowing the inwardness of the Samoan complication. He says: "This Samoan trouble is only the outcome of a policy long since agreed upon between England, France and Germany. Laying minor features aside, New Caledonia was to be allotted to France, Samoa to Germany and the Hawaiian islands to England." Many arguments are advanced for the purpose of showing that the policy of these governments from then until now has been to gain possession of these respective islands.

Speaking with special reference to the Hawaiian islands, this authority says: "A scheme is on foot by England to buy up one of the Hawaiian islands entire, and then lay the cable from Vancouver over to it, when the cable is laid. This is supposed to be in the interest of the English government."

A RISK IN NEGAR.
The Trust Advances the Prices One eighth of a Cent All Around.
NEW YORK, March 15.—The out put of refined sugar lately has been taken up freely, since consumers have looked for higher prices on account of the steady upward movement of the raw product, based upon the short crop in the West Indies, and the fact that England competes sharply with America in producing points for supplies. Governor Waterman, of California, Tired of Politics.
WHY NOT ACCEPT ANOTHER TERM?

Case of Small-pox on Shipboard at San Francisco—Tasoot Still at Large—Rabbi Cohen's Will.

SACRAMENTO (Cal.), March 16.—Governor Waterman authorizes the announcement that he will not, under any circumstances, be a candidate for re-election. "My experience of the legislative session," he says, "only confirms me in my determination never to be involved in politics again. My circumstances are such that I can take life easily. My ambition is satisfied and therefore is no inducement, not a million dollars that could ever tempt me to again submit to the annoyances, cares and anxieties of office. I do hope to leave behind me a record of an honest and upright administration, but it is with no hope or desire to secure another term of office for myself."

The estate is as follows: To his daughter, Eva Coleman, \$2500; to his son Isador Cohen, \$2500; to his daughter, Ophelia Gunst, \$1000; to his daughter, Rosa, his residence property on Hyde and Bush streets and the remainder of his estates.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16.—On the arrival of the steamer from Portland this morning the health officer, Dr. Barger, discovered a young girl afflicted with a light case of small-pox. The vessel will be placed in quarantine until she is fumigated. The patient was removed to the pest house.

THE BATTLE OF THE FUTURE.
The Effect of the Elimination of Noise from the Field.
Lord Wolseley's picture of the Battle of the Future, in his review of Colonel Maurice's article of war, is remarkable, chiefly because of the confidence with which he relies upon the elimination of noise. "One remarkable change will be the absence of nearly all that terrific noise which the discharge of 500 or 600 field guns and the roar of musketry caused in all great battles. We shall have practically no smoke to mark the position of the enemy's batteries and troops in action. The sound of the cannon will be slight, and will no longer indicate to distant troops where their comrades are engaged or the point upon which they should consequently march."

What with smokeless powder and noiseless artillery all our ideas of battle will be revolutionized. But it is not possible that now and then, at the proper psychological moment a commander who suddenly served out some of the genuine old roaring kind of powder might do more by the sudden outbreak of the battle thunder to demoralizing the enemy than the unmasking of a whole park of artillery?
