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THE MAILS. Mails at the Albany postoffice close

For reasons not clearly apparent some of the neighbors of this country on the north and south, Canada and Mexico, are becoming unduly excited over an imaginary question of the extension of the territory of the United States, and judging from the fuss made by the people of those countries, they seem to fear that the well drilled militia companies of all the states of the Union are about to pounce down upon them and annex up this territory, and forcibly annex it to the United States.

In Kingston, Ont., a few evenings since, there was an entertainment known as the "National Representations," at which a young lady who represented England stood upon an American flag which had been spread on the stage, and the chairman remarked that the young woman on the flag represented the relation of Mexico to the United States. In Mexico the conservative press is attacking President Harrison and Secretary Blaine, claiming that they are ambitious to have the United States possess Mexico.

The San Francisco Chronicle on the subject says: Neither Canada nor Mexico need feel the slightest alarm lest the United States attempt to take forcible possession of their territory. They may rest assured that we do not meditate invasion, and that we have not the slightest desire to take into the Union any unwilling people or any element which would be hostile to the United States and its institutions and government. If it amuses the young women of Canada to make carpets and doormats of the American flag, the people of the United States would not for the world put any check upon their innocent merriment. If the Mexican press, in default of news, likes to fill its columns with abuse of the President and his Secretary of State, let them do it, it amuses them and does not hurt us.

But should the Canadian government and the Mexican government, or either of them, openly insult the flag, or seek to incite hostility to the United States, the question would be a very different one. Individuals have a vested and inalienable right to make themselves ridiculous in almost any way they see fit; but when the authorities go so far as to directly insult a friendly nation, it is a different and more serious matter. There is little fear of that, however. Sir John Macdonald, the Canadian Premier, may not love the United States very dearly, but he respects them immensely; and President Diaz has always shown himself well disposed toward us. It is certain that neither of them has the least desire to provoke the United States to actual war, and it is equally certain that neither apprehends any attempt at conquest on our part, so individuals in Canada and Mexico may rant to their hearts' content.

THE POSTAL SERVICE.

Perhaps no department of our governmental work presents such wonderful growth as does the postal service. In Washington's administration the Postmaster-General had but one clerk. There were only 75 post-offices and 1,875 miles of post roads in the United States. The cost of the mail transportation was \$22,081, the total revenue \$37,935, the total expenditure \$32,140, leaving a surplus of \$5,795. How wonderfully this great department has expanded since then is forcibly told by ex-Postmaster-General Thomas L. James in the current number of Scribner's Magazine. In 1838 Postmaster-General Barry pointed out the importance of utilizing the railroads in mail transportation. He predicted that the mail would in course of time be carried from Washington to New York in sixteen hours. The service is now performed in about five hours. Postmaster-General Kendall proposed that if wheels could be constructed which could be used alike

on railroads and on streets of cities the mail between Washington and Baltimore could be taken direct to the post offices of those two cities over the Baltimore and Ohio road. The present railway mail service was not inaugurated until 1864, when it was begun by Colonel Armstrong, authorized and encouraged by Postmaster-General Montgomery Blair, the original idea being that of W. A. Davis, of the St. Joseph, Mo., post office. The development that it has reached is shown in the fact that in 1888 the 5,094 railway postal clerks traveled 123,798,753 miles, distributed 6,528,772,060 pieces of ordinary mail matter, and handled 16,001,059 registered packages, and over a million through pouches and sacks. Did any other nation ever know such growth?

It will be a great satisfaction to every person interested, to note that President Harrison is following out the promised plan of appointing only residents of the locality named for official positions in the territories. His appointment of Miles C. Moore, of Walla Walla, to the position of Governor of Washington Territory is received with general satisfaction, Mr. Moore being an old resident of the territory and well known and exceedingly well liked. No better man could have been selected for the position.

DIED. ROWLAND At Jefferson, March 20, 1889, Mrs. David Rowland, aged 80 years. The deceased came to Oregon in 1852 from Danville, Illinois, accompanying the family Mrs. Moore across the plains. She took up a homestead claim at Jefferson and has lived there since that time. She leaves two sons, Charles and John, who are merchants at Jefferson. Her husband died at that point in 1871.

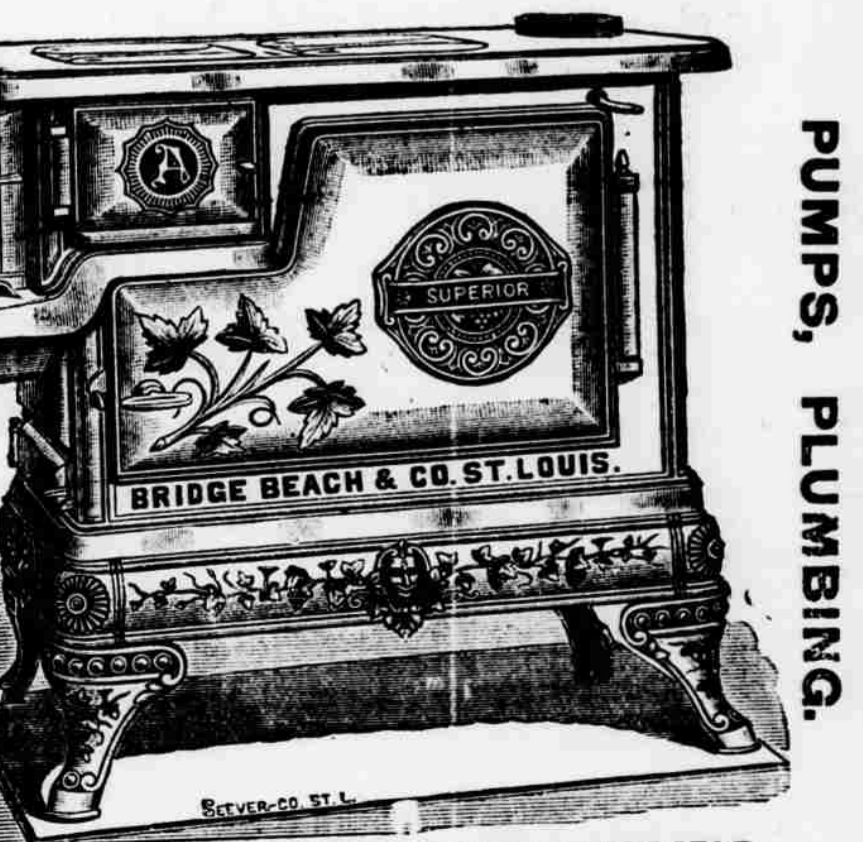
