NORTHWESTERN INTERESTS.

Appointments of Brownville and Other Oregon Postmasters—Applications for Office.

The following appointments of Oregon postmasters have been made: At Junction City, Lane county, N. L. Lee, vice Wm. S. Lee, resigned.

At Hubbard, Marion county, Joseph L. Calvert, vice Hugh C. Caldwell, resigned.

At Newberg, Yamhill county, Charles M. Moore, vice Joseph Everett, resigned.

At Brownville, Linn county, George A. Dyson, vice Charles E. Standard, resigned.

At Oeburg, Lane county, M. H. Skinner, vice James Riley, resigned.

At Cottage Grove, Lane county, Frank Whipple, vice James Curran, resigned.

At Harney, Grant county, N. W. Briery, vice W. Lessing, resigned.

At North Powder, Union county, Orrin D. Thomlinson, vice George H. Bobier, resigned.

Representative Herrmann had an interview with the postmaster general and the superintendent of the railway mail service in which he urged the reinstatement of the four railway mail clerks—Wetzler, Holloway, Fawcette, and Pierce—who were removed just prior to the late election, it is said, for participating in a republican torch-light procession in Portland.

These men were employed on the lines between Portland and San Francisco, Corvallis, Helena, Huntington. The department promised Herrmann to give the matter early and careful consideration.

The Pacific coast delegation has recommended to the president the name of W. W. Upton, of Oregon, for his old position as second controller of the treasury.

Government Works Enjoined.

The city of Newport, on Yaquina bay, some time since leased to the United States government, through Captain Young, United States engineer, a portion of the water front of the city, where a wharf and tramway are being erected, for the use of the engineers in constructing the north jetty at the mouth of the bay. Recently the foreman on the work has been summoned to appear before the circuit court of Benton county at the suit of Samuel Case, who wishes to enjoin the construction of the wharf and tramway and to get possession of the water front. The state deeded the water front to the city of Newport, but Mr. Case alleges that the state had no right to do this, and that he is entitled to possession of the property. Such cases are usually brought in the United States court, and this will probably be there before it is decided. It is not probable that Mr. Case wishes to interfere with the improvement of the entrance to Yaquina bay, but if he owns the property in question desires to be paid for it or for the use of it.

Salem and Astoria R. R. Items.

The railroad that is considered certain of crossing the country from Astoria either to Salem or Albany, or both, in the Willamette valley, will traverse a portion of Columbia county.—West Shore. Work has been commenced at Astoria on the Astoria & South Coast railroad, and it is proposed by citizens of Salem to unite with those of McMinnville in bringing the road into the valley to Salem by the way of McMinnville. When the time comes for action there is no doubt that the business men of the city will take hold of the matter with the same energy they have exhibited in other enterprises.—West Shore.

THE OREGON PACIFIC.

The Old Directors Re-Elected at the Annual Meeting of the Stockholders.

The Benton Leader says that on Tuesday the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Oregon Pacific railroad company and of the Willamette Valley and Coast Railroad company were held at Corvallis.

Fully nineteen-twentieths of the stock in both companies was present or represented. Unanimous votes of approval and confidence in the directors and officers of the companies were passed and the retiring officers were all re-elected. The stockholders who were not personally present, both in the East and abroad, sent their proxies to Col. T. E. Hogg, president of the road, and they were voted by Mr. William M. Hoag as his substitute, and the Leader adds: This fact amply refutes the statements that have been made in the newspapers that the present management was unsatisfactory or that the road was about to be run under another management. It is safe to say that the road in which all our people have such a vital interest, will be continued to a successful termination under the management that has developed the enterprise from nothing to its present standing among the railroads of the country. In this connection, we are informed that the current debts of the company including all not adjusted, are now being paid off up to the first of March ult., and that Mr. C. C. Hogue goes over the line this morning for the purpose of making the payments. While much has been printed by publications which are against the road under all circumstances; these facts speak louder than words in defense of a company that has pursued an unflinching course towards a successful completion of its line. The fact that all the debts of the company which are adjusted are being paid off, is proof that the other obligations which are still unsettled would be paid as well, if there were not differences about them. The road will be built to Boise City by the people who are now building it, and there will be no change of management.

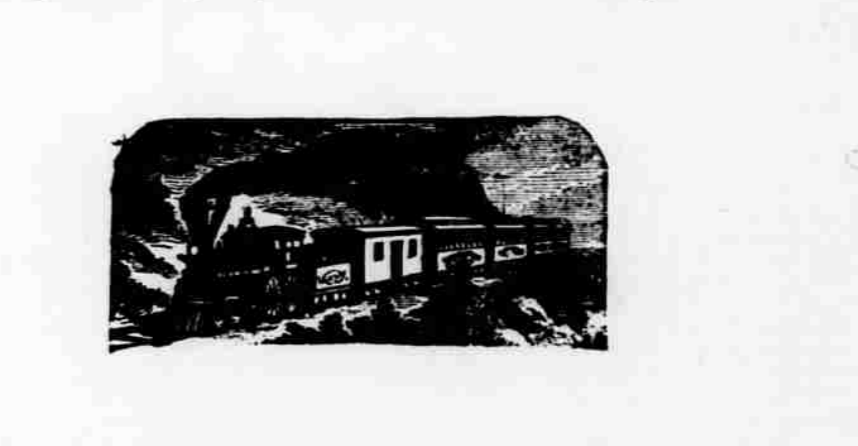

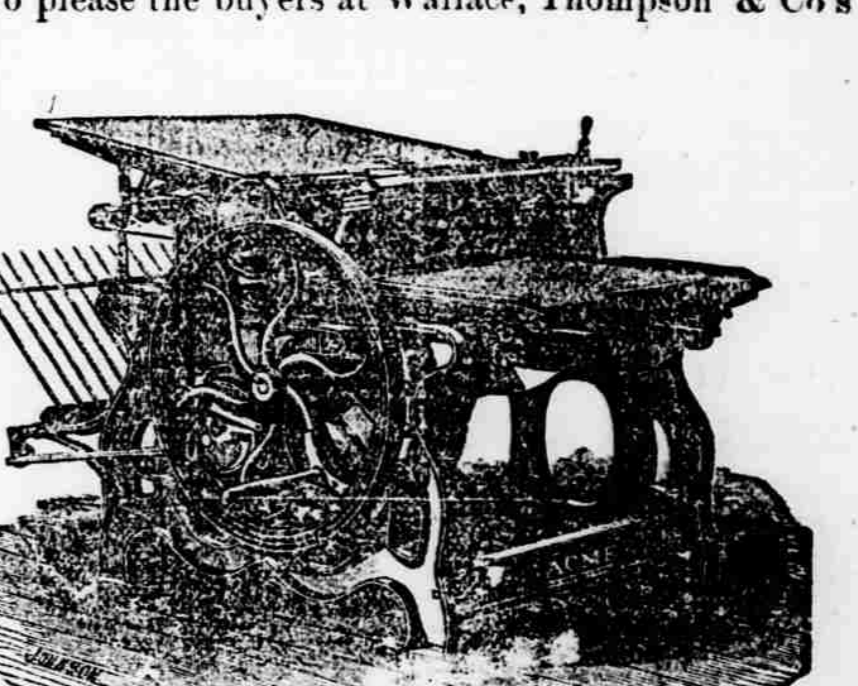
