**Funeral Services of the Late Justice Stanley Matthews.**

**A WIFE BEATER PUNISHED.**  
**A Young Lady Takes Strychnine Because Her Parents Refuse to Allow Her to Marry Her Own True Love.**

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The funeral services over the remains of the late Associate Justice Stanley Matthews were held this afternoon at his late residence, Dr. Hamlin and Dr. Leonard officiating. The president and cabinet, justices of the supreme court, many members of congress and other prominent persons were present. The remains were then carried to the Baltimore & Ohio station and conveyed to Glendiva, Ohio, for interment in the Spring Grove cemetery.

**SERVED HIM RIGHT.**  
**A Wife Beater Thrashed and Ordered to Leave the Country.**

WASS VALLEY (Cal.), March 25.—At 1 o'clock Sunday morning Gilbert Harris of Boston Ravine, gave his wife a severe whipping and struck her on the forehead with a lamp, making a dangerous wound. The woman's cries aroused the people of the Ravine and a party of young men assembled and dragged Harris into Wolf Creek, dunked him in a watering trough and whipped him soundly. Harris does not leave before next Saturday night. Harris served a term in the county jail a year ago for wife beating.

**THE SAMOAN AFFAIR.**  
**What the Cologne Gazette Has to Say of the Case of Klein.**

BERLIN, March 24.—The Cologne Gazette says neither criminal nor civil procedure is applicable to the case of Klein in America. It only remains for Germany to bring evidence against him before the tribunal of Apia, including the American consul. It may be assumed that when Herr Streubel, the newly appointed German consul, arrives in Apia satisfaction will be demanded from Mataafa.

**Railroad to Coeur d'Alene.**  
SPOKANE FALLS, March 24.—Track laying on the Northern Pacific extension from Wallace to Mullan, up the south fork of the Coeur d'Alene river was completed this evening. It is understood a road will be built on an air line from Coeur d'Alene City to the old mission, the present starting point of this new road, and extended from Mullan to a point west of Missoula, when the whole line will be converted into a standard gauge, thus avoiding the circuitous route around the lakes and shortening the main line from Spokane Falls to the East. The extension just completed will greatly facilitate the shipment of mineral from the Gold Hunter, Morning Central and other big mines in the vicinity of Mullan.

**New U. S. Gunboat.**  
WASHINGTON, March 25.—Orders have been sent to Philadelphia to have the new gunboat Yorktown, now at the Cramps works, delivered to the United States authorities at the League Island yard.

## THE MARKET-STREET "MAGAZINE."

**Parsons Harcourt Warns Women of the Dangers of Street Filtration.**

In his lecture on the marriage relation last week, in San Francisco, Rev. Dr. Harcourt, pastor of the Howard-street M. E. Church, said: "It is the common impression that women like to be noticed, bowed to and smiled at by the opposite sex, and many men, who imagine they possess irresistible charms, look for some token of recognition. No one can walk through Market and Kearny streets without being disgusted by the effrontery of the brazen-faced, well-dressed, army of young and old studs, who strut the street in front of the cigar stands and drinking saloons. Any lady who possesses a becoming toilet is liable to be made to blush by some shallow-brained fop, who imagines every lady he meets is struck with his fine personal appearance and good clothes. "A woman who feels flattered by or will return the recognition of a stranger is either possessed of a degree of vanity; very likely to prove her ruin, or is already beyond the possibility of such a change in her morals. "Some women claim that the only attraction possessed by street flirting is that 'there is so much fun about it,' and nothing more serious likely to follow. It may be fun at first, for the girls, but men rarely waste so much time and devote so much labor to the simple quest of fun, as unscrupulous dowdies woman can trace their ruin to what they considered at first an innocent flirtation. No young innocent who desires to avoid the appearance of evil, and no married woman who desires to escape the divorce court, should be guilty of even an innocent flirtation."

**THE SEAL FISHERIES.**  
**A Proclamation to be Issued by President Harrison.**

NEW YORK, March 25.—A Washington special to the Evening Post says: President Harrison will soon issue a proclamation relative to the Behring sea, which cannot fail to attract international attention. This proclamation will be the first information which most people have that in the closing hours of the last session of Congress an amendment was incorporated in the Territorial Salmon Fishing act, which in effect declares that the Behring sea is a closed sea. The amendment in its terms extends the provisions of the salmon fishing act to seal fishing in the Behring sea. This is to say, the act forbids the taking of seals by any one not authorized by the act in the waters of Behring sea, and does not exclude them merely from fishing on certain islands. The amendment is of course of the greatest importance to the Alaska Fur Seal Company, as it will preserve the seal fisheries for them. It is also of great importance to American and Canadian fishermen who may have been planning to engage in seal fishing in the open waters of Behring sea this season, as so many of the Canadian vessels did last season. The act authorizes the seizure of such vessels by the United States revenue cutters, and the proclamation of the President will call attention to this fact. The act may give rise to important international complications. It is an attempt by legislative enactment to settle an international question which the great power interested may consider still an open one.
