Another List of Appointments by President Harrison.

AN OREGON MAN REMEMBERED
Lee Moorehouse Made Indian Agent at the Umatilla Agency—Garrett and Party Among Mexican Brigands.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—The president sent the following nominations to the senate to-day: Francis E. Warren, of Wyoming, to be governor of Wyoming Territory; Benjamin White, of Dillon, Montana, to be governor of Montana Territory; Lee Moorehouse of Oregon to be agent of Indians at the Umatilla agency. Oregon Robert V. Bebe, of Maryland, to be assistant commissioner of Indian affairs. Postmasters, Geo. Buld, of Bozeman, Montana; James M. Moore, of Anaconda, Montana; J. D. Hogue, of Tacoma, W. T.

FILED IN NEW YORK.
It Was Caused by an Explosion in a Factory. Many Injured.

NEW YORK, March 26.—A fire caused by an explosion occurred at 1 o'clock to-day in a factory at the corner of Kent Avenue and South Second street, Williamsburg. It is reported that sixteen people were injured. All the ambulances and four patrol wagons were telegraphed for and rapidly hurried to the scene.

G. GARRETT AND PARTY.
A Silly Story About Mexican Brigands Being After Them.

BALTIMORE, March 26.—Robert Garrett and party stopped on their journey to Mexico at San Antonio, Texas, to-day about noon and started for Thompsonville, Ga. A special dispatch says this action was taken on the information that Mexican brigands had laid their plans to capture the party and hold them for an immense ransom. The friends of Garrett say the change of plans was merely a fancy.

Will be Accepted.
PHILADELPHIA, March 26.—The gain boat Yorktown has been delivered to the naval authorities at League Island. It is expected that Secretary Tracy will formally accept her to-day. She is all complete except the electric light plant which will be done in ten days.

U. S. Man of War Yorktown.
WASHINGTON, March 26.—Cramp & son have notified the secretary of the navy of their agreement to conditions on which the Yorktown is to be accepted.

A Gentle Prize Fight.
NEW YORK, March 26.—Joe Donahue of New Jersey and Mike Murray of Clifton, Staten Island, fought thirteen rounds of a most brutal aspect yesterday. When neither were able to come to time the fight was declared a draw.

THE WEST VIRGINIA CONTENT.
General Goff Confident That He Will Ultimately Triumph.

WHEELING, W. Va., March 25.—General Goff, the republican gubernatorial candidate, who received a majority of the votes cast at the recent election in this state, and who is now engaged in a contest before the legislature with Judge Fleming, to establish his claims, arrived here this morning for a conference with his friends in this part of the state. In an interview this morning he asserted, in the strongest way, his determination to push his claim in all possible ways, and before all possible tribunals, and said he felt confident that the legislature would, from evidence he should place before a special committee, finally acknowledge the justness of his claim.

ISLAND EMPIRE NOTES.
Large Shipments From the East—Success of a Surveying Party.

WALLA WALLA, March 25.—For the first time in the history of the city, a majority of spring shipments of merchandise come from the East. This is made feasible by the advent of the Oregon & Washington Territory, and reduced rates offered by the O. R. & N. and Eastern connections.

Captain Doughman, of Lewiston, and associates, claim to have discovered a very rich bed of black sulphur near Asotin, assaying \$200 to the ton.

The Oregon & Washington Territory engineers returned Saturday. They claim to have found a practical route to the Grand Ronde, via Milton and Linkton mountain. A fully equipped party will leave Thursday, to continue work.

Snow is three feet deep on the summit of the Blue mountains. The Watsburg Board of Trade have raised over \$10,000 in the city alone toward the subsidy of \$25,000 to be given Hunt to come to the city.

Guy Guthridge has been confirmed by the governor as the head of the supply department of the penitentiary.

E. B. Comen, of this city, has been appointed chief train master of the O. R. & N. Co., vice Ed Lyons resigned.

Troop F, Second United States cavalry, recently sent to the Umatilla Indian agency at the request of the special agent, are expected home to-morrow.

It is reported that Robert McCally, retired miller and a prominent republican, is making an active canvass for register of the land office here.

Among fifty or more candidates for warden of the penitentiary are V. D. Lambert and Daniel Ganey. It is reported that a 3 story hotel and 20-stall round house will be erected this summer at Pasco by the N. P. R. R.

SAVED BY A TRICK.
A Forger Escapes Prison Through a Keen Lawyer.

Several well-known lawyers of this city were discussing a case in which they were engaged recently, some features of which were extremely interesting to the legal profession. After a while the argument became wearisome and the party was about to break up when one of them said: "This case reminds me of one in which I was engaged years ago. It was in this State, somewhere up near the Canada line, that a young man had been arrested for counterfeiting. The case looked pretty black for him when I was sent for to defend him."

"No one denied his guilt, for the case had been thoroughly worked up and enough evidence against my client secured to insure his conviction by the most favorably disposed jury. That is, that's the way it looked when I took hold of the case. I was young and had a reputation to make, so I set to work with a will to find a flaw in the indictment or a loophole in the evidence that might be addressed at the trial. The bank note which was alleged to have been counterfeited was of an almost extinct issue. But after a search which I was several times inclined to give up in despair, I found one sufficiently well preserved to answer my purpose."

"The counterfeit was admitted to be perfect in all respects except the signatures, which were clumsily executed. But when I compared the genuine note with it I made a discovery which caused me to feel that I had already won the case. Between the signatures on the genuine note only was a vignette so small as to escape notice except upon the most careful and searching examination. Well, to make a long story short, the day set for the trial came. The first witness for the prosecution was the detective who made the arrest, and who was admitted to be an expert in the matter of bank notes. He told his story and offered in evidence the note that had been found on the person of my client when he was arrested. He swore to its being counterfeit. He knew this was so by the signatures. I had my genuine note lying on the table under a piece of paper beside me, and when I began the cross-examination I asked for the counterfeit that I might examine it. While putting questions to the witness I laid it down on my table, and by a neat slight of hand trick picked up the genuine note without being detected and handed it to the witness, at the same time asking: 'Is this bill counterfeit?' He looked at it carelessly, and said it was for the reasons he had before stated. 'That will do,' said I. 'Now, your Honor, urging to the Magistrate, 'I want you to take this bill and mark it so that you will know it again.' He did so. After calling a number of people, who testified to the good character of the prisoner, I called the cashier of the bank that issued the bill and asked him if the marked note was genuine. His examination of it was very careful, but he finally swore that it was genuine. The detective was recalled, and this time was not so positive that it was a counterfeit.

"I submitted the case to the jury without argument, and the Judge, unhesitatingly directed a verdict of 'Not guilty.' What became of the counterfeit? Oh, I had that stowed away in a safe place, and it is in my possession now."

Niagara Falls Measurements.
The following are the latest statistics concerning the cataract. The outline of the American Falls, is about 1000 feet, and the height about 165 feet. The descent in the rapids above the American falls is about 40 feet to the half mile. The outline of the Horse Shoe fall is about 2600 feet, the height about 158 feet, and the descent in the rapid above about 55 feet to three-quarters of a mile. The volume of water passing over both falls is about 15,000,000 cubic feet per minute, or about one cubic mile per week, or 52 cubic miles per year.
