A BIG ENTERPRISE.

A syndicate of Albany Men and Others Purchase All of West Yaquina.

A syndicate composed of Wallis Nash, Dr. Farra, of Corvallis, J. S. Cooper, of Independence, R. S. Strahan, A. Hackleman, E. W. Langdon, L. E. Blain, J. W. Casick, C. J. Stuart and Curran & Monteith, of this city, have purchased the entire town plat of West Yaquina, situated opposite the docks at Yaquina City. The price paid for the same was \$15,000. It embraces 1000 lots and an undivided half interest in 75 acres now owned jointly by this syndicate and the Oregon Development Company. They propose to place the lots upon the market this summer.

Some of the men in this syndicate are in a position to know the future movements of the Oregon Pacific Railroad Company, and this purchase, in connection with the Oregon Development Company, may be taken as an indication of the early resumption of work toward the completion of this road to its eastern connection.

New Land Company Organized.

A company consisting of some of the solid men of Albany, has been organized in this city for the purpose of dealing in real estate, purchasing large tracts, subdividing the same and selling in quantities to suit. It will be known as the Willamette Land Company, and consist of the following stockholders, with a capital stock of \$20,000: C. E. Wainwright, Geo. W. Wright, J. L. Costan, Geo. E. Chamberlain, J. W. Casick, A. Hackleman, G. W. Maston, E. J. Lanning and Curran & Monteith. The company has been duly incorporated, and will assist in making things lively in and about Albany this summer.

EXCITEMENT AT LEBANON.

A Scotchman on a Lark Armed With a Revolver, Defies the Town Authorities.

Yesterday morning a young Scotchman named Crawford Jameson, who has been engaged in a surveying party on the W. V. & C. M. Wagon Road, came down from Lebanon and left on the south bound train. A gentleman from Lebanon states that Jameson and some of the city officers afforded the citizens of Lebanon a whole picnic Monday evening. Jameson became somewhat hilarious from over indulgence in the flowing bowl, and started out to paint the town a carmine hue. He became over boisterous in the livery stable of W. C. Peterson and Police Officer Shaw, with the aid of a man named Morgan, attempted to arrest him. Jameson coolly drew a revolver and covering the two officers, told them he was not to be taken. The officers quickly withdrew and Jameson and his companion continued to hold the fort. Considerable excitement was occasioned over the matter, and nearly the whole town turned out to get a glimpse of the man whom the city authorities could not arrest. He finally withdrew and quietly went to bed, and the officers declared they would arrest him in the morning, but when the nervous surveyor, who had cool gray eyes and showed that he was very handy with a revolver, proceeded to the depot to take the train, no one interfered with him. It is said the officers afterwards felt like kicking themselves to think that they let a small man like he was defy the whole town authorities.

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CITY COUNCIL.

The Albany Street Railway Company File Its Acceptance of the Franchise.

Regular meeting of the city council last evening. Mayor in the chair; councilmen all present. In the absence of the city recorder, Councilman Burkhardt appointed recorder pro tem. Committee on accounts and current expenses reported several bills.

Committee on streets and public property asked further time on matters referred, which request was granted.

The marshal recommended several sewers, which recommendations were referred to the committee on streets and public property.

A petition for a sidewalk on lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, block 78, Monteith's addition, read and referred to committee on streets and public property.

The formal acceptance of the street railway company of the franchise and its requirements was read and ordered recorded and placed on file.

Ed to build the foot bridges advertised for was awarded to James Shahan at \$55 for the three bridges, to be completed in 15 days.

Street commission authorized to put in a new six-foot crosswalk on Fifth and Jackson streets.

Petition for a sidewalk on Fourth street on lots 3 and 4, block 9, referred to committee on streets and public property.

G. W. Hochstedler asked in reference to the location of sewers in blocks having no alleys, as he wished to commence his new house and wished to make arrangements for proper future sewerage from the basement.

The Machinery Arriving.

The first lot of machinery for the woolen mills arrived in this city yesterday. It was about \$5000 worth which had been shipped from Brownsville, but after the decision of the company to remove the mills to Albany, and it arrived yesterday. This certainly looks as if Messrs. Moyer and Craft meant business when they said the woolen mills would be built here within six months.

A New Postal Card.

A new postal card is soon to be put into circulation. It is very much like a double card. The back fold is split diagonally and opened like a four-pointed star. The four corners are folded and joined in the center with a piece of gummed paper. It will not contain any more writing space than the present card. It weighs less than half an ounce. The only advantage will be a greater privacy.

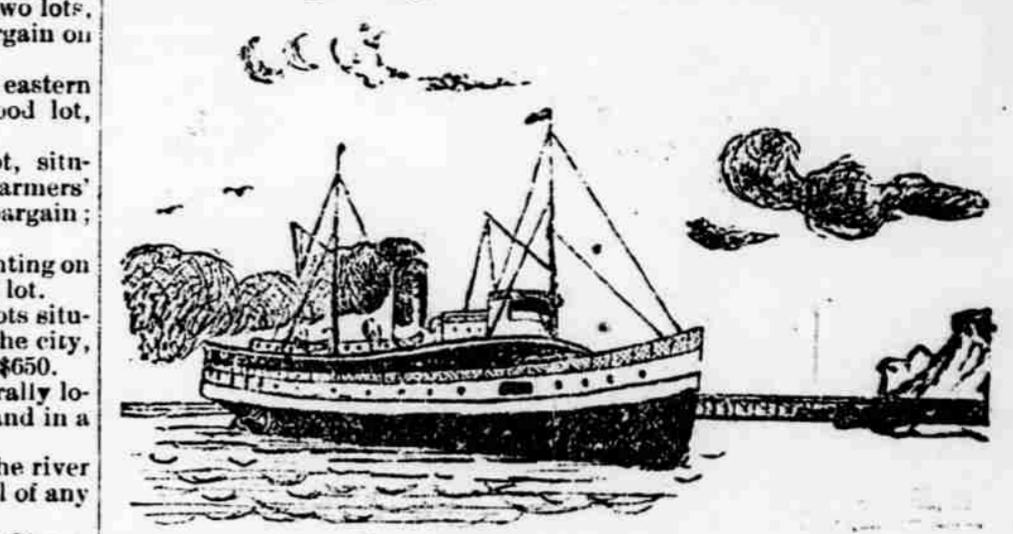

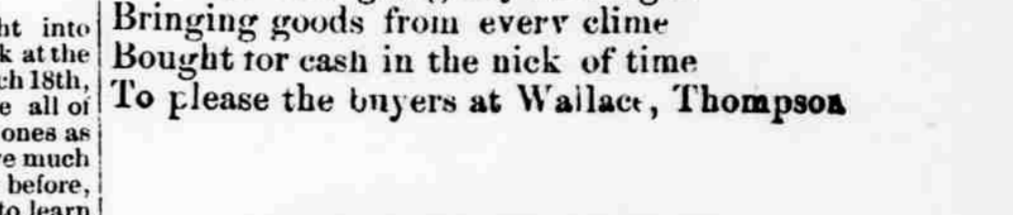

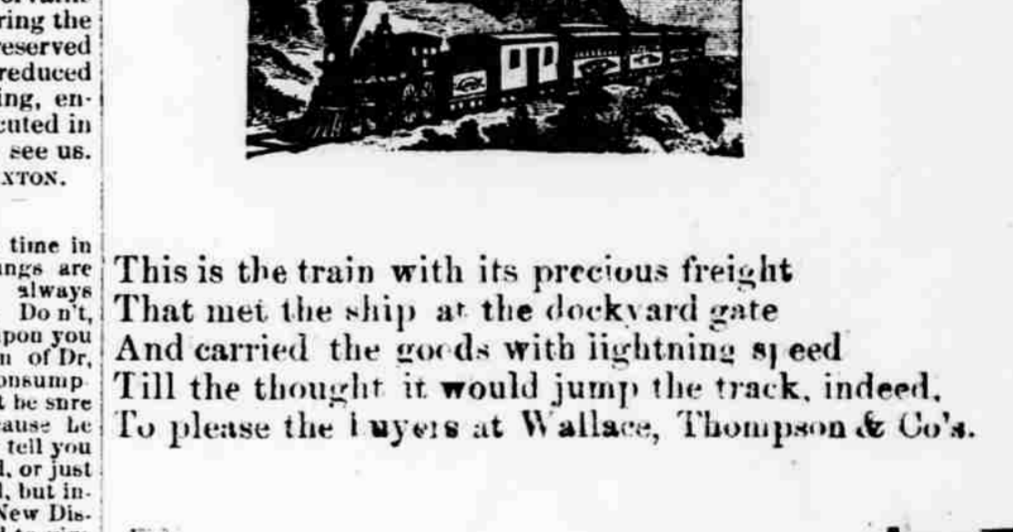
